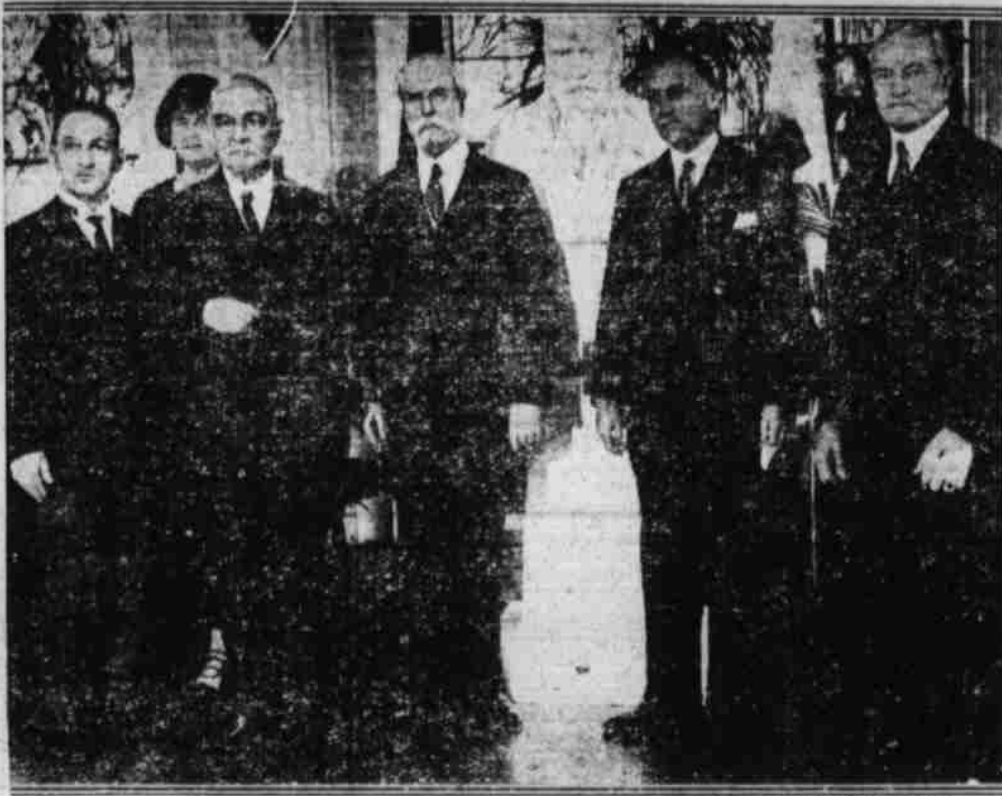

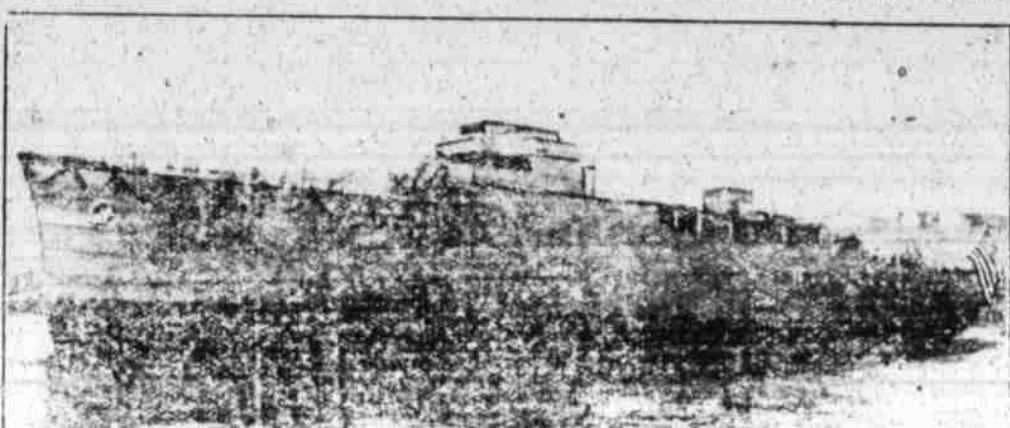

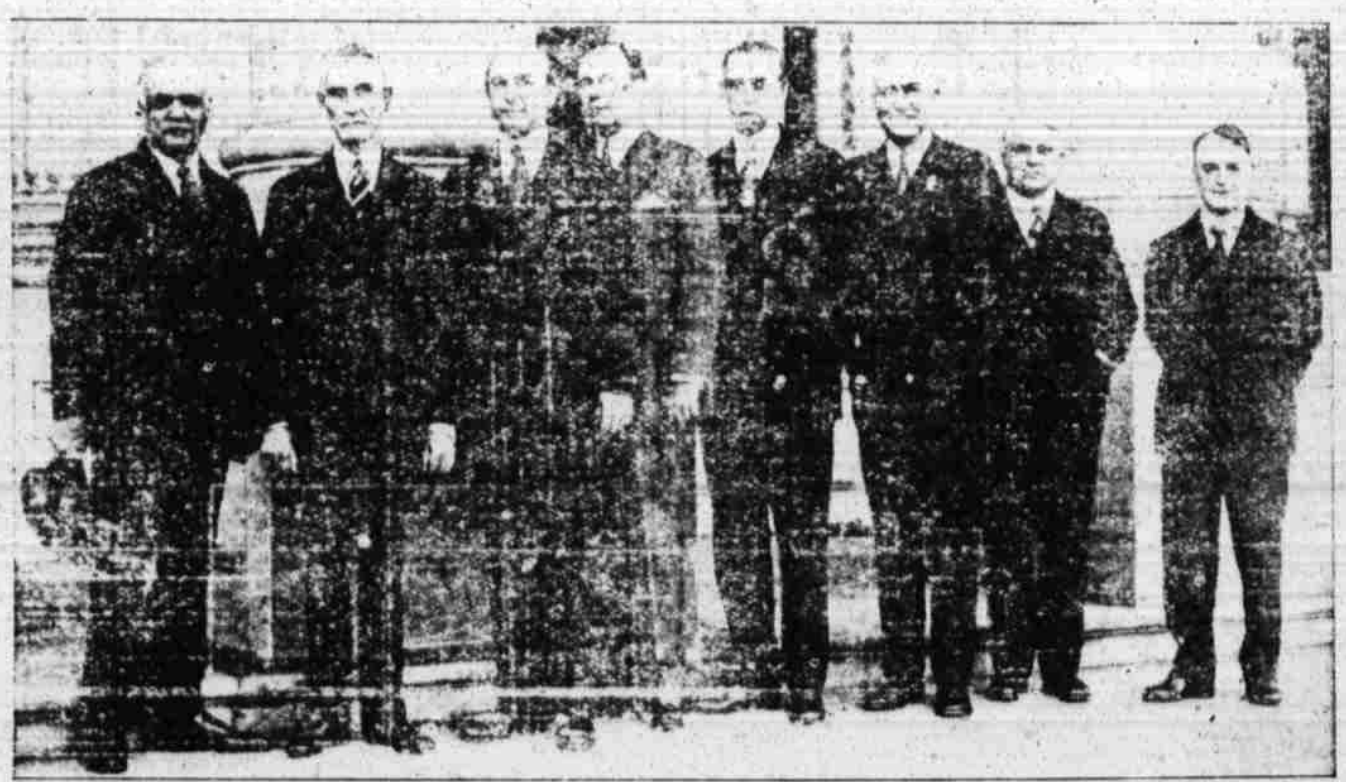

Railroad Commission Member Outlines His Position on Motor Bus Transportation Regulations

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 22.—(Special Correspondent.)—The railroad commission member, C. V. Terrell, of the Texas railroad commission, who is in charge of the motor transportation law, has a bracket of suggestions for changes to correct the motor transportation law and to remove the injustices, inequalities and uncertainties of present operation.

In connection with these are the changes he favors:

1. Truckowner who buys and sells products hauled by him should be licensed and required to carry insurance.
2. Contract truck haulers should have rates fixed, be licensed and be required to provide insurance for the owner of goods.
3. Class B truck line operators with permits to run over non-railroad line without schedule should have that rate fixed for haulage and should be prohibited from running over any Class A fixed route truck line.

Special permits should be available for express haulage. Class A fixed route truck lines, tariffs are made the same as railroads, should be limited to 10 miles to avoid the economic loss of longer hauls. Exemptions should be authorized by the railroad commission in case of such haulage by a truck line on a route operated by a railroad.

Lack of regulated rates for contract haulage seriously interfere with the effectiveness of rate tariffs for Class A and Class B motor truck service, Commr. Terrell has conceded. 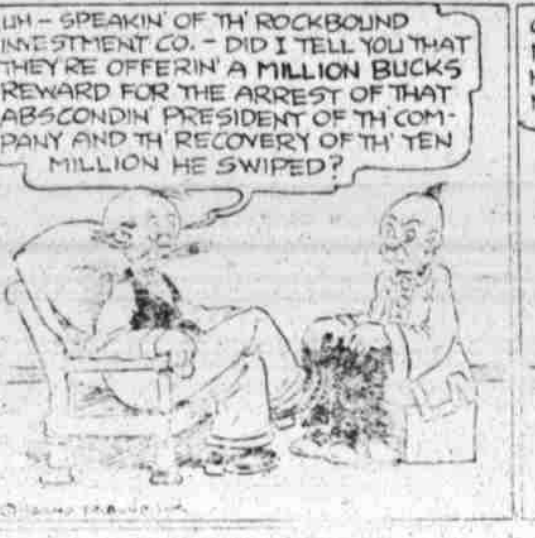

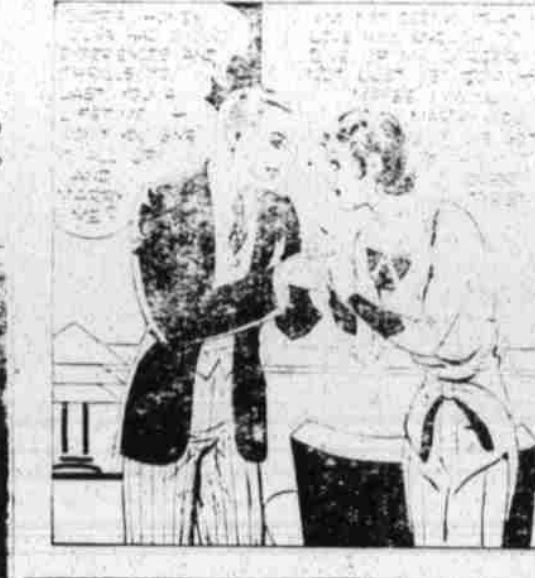

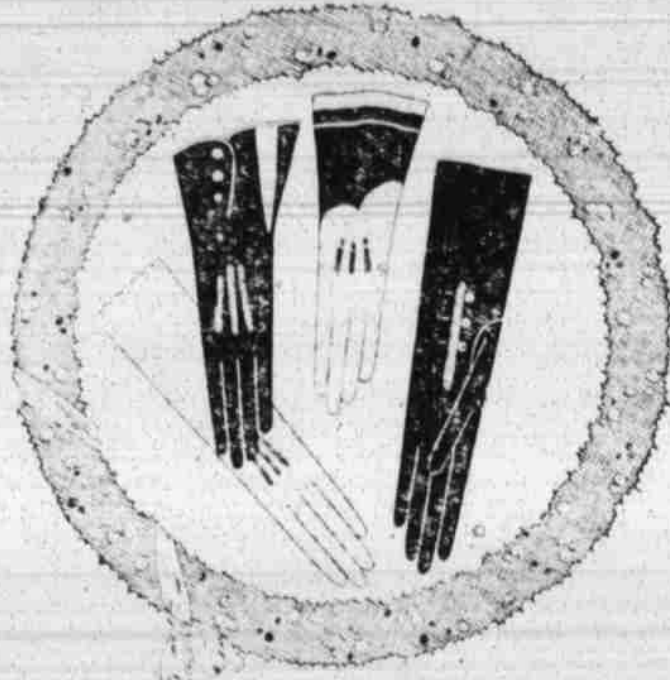
