## HORSE FAllS ON L. R. BRASFILID Killing Hilm

A very sad accident which cast a gloom over the entire city and community occared in Slaton Sunday evening when L.R. Bras field, a young farmer near Slaton, was killed by a horse he was riding falling with him. The ac cident occured in town, and Mr Brasfield never regained consciousness, perhaps never knowing what happened. He received a concusson of the brain and a ruptured lung. His pulse was still when those who saw him fall went up to him but he was resusitated enough to start his heart and his respiration. Doc tors were called and they sus. talned his life for several hours before his constitution which had bad so hard a shock refused tion.
Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church Monday afternoon and interment was made in the Slaton Buena Vist cemetery. Mr. Brasfield had joined the Woodmen of the
World Lodge only a few days ago, and the burial services were conducted by the Slaton Camp, assisted by members of the Ta . hoka Camp and of the Lubbock Camp. The Rev, J. D. Lampkin preached the funeral sermon The Woodmen met at the ball and escorted the body to the church and after the sermon
