prize of $\$ 50.00$ in class D, competing against 3,000 other farmers ing against 3,000 other farmers
in that class. His kaffir was in that class. His kaffir was
raised under ordinary farming raised under ordinary farming
conditions, and without irrigation, the yield being 14,122 pounds of headed grain with the stems cut one and one-half inches.
Last fall Mr. Paschall stated to the Slatonite that the total解 crop was $\$ 18.00$; this included teams, feed, labor, and all incidentals. The value of the crop when gathered was $\$ 119.00$. This represented a prefit of $\$ 101$, or $\$ 50.50$ an acre,-about th ree times the value of unimproved land that far from town.
