CEANKEE STADIUM, N. Y., Oct. 6 (P)-Concentrating their heavy fire in one big seven run inning, the Yunkees whipped Carl Hubbell and the Giants, 8 to 1, today in the first game of the 1937 world series before close to 60,090 fans.






