The success that a farmer attains in the production of crops on his farm depends largely on his own individual efforts. It is hard for a farmer to pro-
teet his crop after it shows signs of drouth, for'water in the soll is the im
drens portant factor to the production of dry farm crops. Therefore, it is the duty of the farmer to study the con
dittons which lead toward his success, by preparing the sofl for the purpos by preparing the sofl for the purpos
of receiving and holding moisture. Experiments from Akron, Colo made in 1911, shows the amount o water required in the production of
three crops of alfalfa: First cro crops of alfalfa: First cro
trom May 13th to July 19th, an ave age of 1,008 pounds of water was used in the production of one pound of dry matter. Second crop from July 19t o September 18 th, an average
1,354 pounds of water was uked in the production of one pound of dry matter Third crop from September 18th to October 22 nd, an average of 520 pounds of water was used in the pro Muction of one pound of dry matter of one pound of dry matter during July, August and September, due to the high rate of transpiration from he alfalfa crop.
The cost of producing alfalfa hay on the dry farm is less than on the ir
