Cody, Wyoming. Friday the 19th, 1918. Friend Loomis:

You heard from us at Lander We camped one night in the shadow of Fremont's Peak. At Lander we found out that the road to enter the Park from the south was impassible on account of heavy rains washing out all the bridges. So we had to go north to the Cody entrance on the east. We left Lander at 2.00 p. m. and camped for the night at Thermopolis, 76 miles down the Wind River which runs due portheast. Here Uncle Sam has located a bath house to utilize the hot sulphur springs. On ac count of poor accommodations for tourists, we left next morning. We continued down the Big Horne River all day. On Though I was defeated I am every side as far as the eye could reach we could see great fields of wheat, oats, barley and emmer and some of the fields looked to contain a thousand acres of wheat, which I believe would yield 30 to 40 bu. to the acre. A wonderful agricultural country. this Big Horn valley.

> Arriving at Basin we camped for the night. Now let me say, no tourist should fail to stop at Basin when going to or 'coming from the National Yellow Stone Park, and camp a few days. The town furnishes free a camp ground with every convenience that could be wished for: four gas stoves with ten burners in a forty people, bath and laundry facilities, all free; and fine fishing streams close by. 
