war the British submarines dewar the Briusi submarines de-

cruisers,
Two battleships, two armored cruisers, two light cruisers, seven
destroyers, five gunboats, twent sabmarines and
auxiliary vessels.
Three battleships and one light cruiser were torpedoed,
reached port badly damaged. Other enemy crafts destroye were:
One Zeppelin, fourteen trans ships, two store ships, fifty three steamships and 197 sailing ships sunk at sight. 'Care was taken sunk at sight. Care was taken
that the crew aot away safely.
In addition to carrying out their attacks on enemy war crafts, th submarine played an importan part in convoy work.
