### to Make Race for Governor of Texas

Claiming that Texas womanhood is due another opportunity in the office of governor of Texas, Mrs. Edith Wilmans, a Dallas attorney and former member of the legislature from had decided to make the race for govmor in the state election next year.

"I am a candidate for the office," said Mrs. Wilmans, "and will announce my platform in a short time. If I am elected governor the formation of an advisory cabinet, composed, probably of the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the head of one or more state departments and at least three prominent Texas women, will be the first undertaking I will assume."

Mrs. Wilmans became prominent in political circles through her work for woman's suffrage for fifteen years and her efforts in the legislature to enact humanitarian legislation for state prisons and other institutions.

Among the measures she introduce and advocated were those relating to establishment of a domestic relations court in Dallas, the compulsory education bill, providing that no child should go to work until it has passed the seventh grade in school or is 14 years old, and the widows' pension bill.




