



SALADS AND SANDWICHES FOR VARIOUS OCCASIONS.

A sandwich is never out of season, for it is the substantial part of a meal at whatever time



or place it is served. If one desires a

large quantity of filling for sand-wiches, the following recipe will be a good one to foi-

low. It may be easily divided. The dressing may be used on potato or o'her vegetable salads:

Cheese Sandwich Filling .- Mix together one cupful of sour cream, three eggs, one tablespoonful of butter, one tablespoonful of sugar, a few grains of cayenne, one tenspoonful of mustard and one teaspoonful of sait. Beat all together in a double boiler until the eggs are broken; set over hot water and stir until it begins to thicken. Add three tablespoonfuls of vinegar, hot, to the cream mixture. When cooked until it coats the spoon, set aside to cool. Put one and one-half pounds of cheese. two green peppers and two sweet red peppers through a meat chopper. Mix together, and add enough of the dressing to make the mixture spread easily.
Use on thir slices of bread.

Carrot and Nut Sandwiches .- Mix together one-half cupful each of ground earrots and nuts (peanuts, walnuts or pecans may be used). Add one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-half tablespoonful of olive oil, one teaspoonful of lemon juice. Mix thoroughly and spread on slices of buttered bread.

Pressed Egg and Ham Sandwiches. -Chop fine six hard-cooked eggs, one green onlon and one-half a green pepper. Mix with one-half teaspoonful of salt and one tablespoonful of prepared mustard. Place half of the mixture in a small, greased pan. Press down. then add a layer of chopped ham, using one and one-half cupfuls, finely chopped. Finish with the rest of the egg mixture; pour over two tablespoon-fuls of soup stock and place in a cool place until molded enough to silce.

WHOLESOME GOOD THINGS.

Frostings for various cakes have act been the usual thing during the



months of sugar shortage. The following are two desirable frostings which may be covered a bit of moisture or be ready for use:

Fondant.-This recipe has appeared before as candy foundation, but makes very satisfactory frosting. Use four cupfuls of sugar, one cupful of water and one tablespoonful of glucose. Boll until the sirup makes a soft ball when dropped in water. Set away to cool; when cool enough to bear the finger, stir until cresmy. Put into a jar or bowl, cover with waxed paper and let stand until wanted. Take out what will be needed for Icing, melt it over hot water, add flavoring, coloring or chocolate

and spread on the cakes.

Another Frosting.—Use confectioners' sugar and milk or cream. To two cupfuls of sugar add a tablespoonful of cream, adding a few drops more until soft enough to spread. Try it on a' small cake until of the right consistency; use what is needed and cover the rest, setting it in a cool place where it will not dry out. It will keep for three weeks or longer.

Bachelor's Buttons.-Rub together four tablespoonfuls of butter and ten tablespoonfuls of flour. Divide ten tablespoonfuls of sugar; stir five into the flour and the other five into two wellbeaten eggs; flavor with anise and add to the flour mixture. Make into small walnut-sized balls, place on a buttered baking sheet and bake in a hot oven. Dip in fondant and sprinkle

Sunshine Cake.—Take the whites of eight eggs and the yolks of six, one cupful of flour, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, salt and vanilia. Beat the yolks until thick, add vanilia; beat the whites until foamy, then add the cream of tartar; finish beating, until stiff; add the sugar, a little at a time, then add yolks and fold in the flour. ### INDUSTRIAL GROUPS STILL "PLAYING TAG"

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LABOR AND EMPLOYERS DEADLOCKS INDUSTRIAL MEETING.

### AGREEMENT IS SHATTERED

Employers Insist on Adding Clause Declaring for Their Right to Bargain Individually.

Washington.-Solution of the dif. culties seriously threatening the national industrial conference seems more hopeless than ever after the conference's central committee failed to conciliate the differences between

the labor and employer wings.

The tentative agreement reached
Saturday on the question of collective bargaining was shattered when the employer's group insisted on adding to the substitute resolution declaring for the right of "employers and employes to bargain individually" This clause was rejected un-qualifiedly by the labor delegates.

Previous to the introduction of the "individual bargaining" clause an apparent solution to the problem had been reached. The original Russell-Endicott resolution, providing for the recognition of the right to collective bargaining and the right of employes to choose their representatives at will, was revamped, divided into four sections and amended to read "the right to organize into trade and labor unions, shop and other industrial as-sociations." The section granting to labor organizations the right to choose representatives without restrictions was amended to read "by representatives chosen by a majority of their own members."

The compromise measure as amended met with the approval of the labor and public groups and some members of the employers' wing when brought before the committee. Later, however, the employyers insisted on the addition of a fifth section, the individual bargaining clause which was promptly vetoed by the labor group. This left the central committee deadlocked just as it was when the conference adjourned Friday.

Flies Twice Across Continent in the Greatest Air Centest in History.

Mineola, N. Y .- Lleutenant Belvie W. Maynard was declared the victor in the army's air race across the continent and return, the greatest avia-tion endurance test of history, upon landing here. Lieutenant Maynard's official landing time was 1:50:05.

Dallas .- While endeavoring to surpass the aerial feats of Lieutenant Ormer Locklear, Captain Charles Theodore, aviator of Dallas, fell 500 feet to his death Sunday afternoon 400 yards northwest of the university of Dallas.



Pay to Jap Soldiers.

In the opinion of the Jui, the pay of Japanese soldiers is too small. At present it is 1.56 yen (78 cents) a month for first and second class privates, and 1.95 (98 cents) for corporals. Even if the pay be increased 50 per cent, says the editor, it will not suffice for the needs of the soldiers. At present they have to get money from home to make up the shortage, which is not right. The total pay of the soldiers amounts to \$2,150,000. If it is trebled, the government will need only \$4,300,000 additional.







Doubtless we shall grow a little tired of the emphasized trimming on the hips, but at this time it is well to recognize the fact that this sort of trimming is a distinct feature in the one-piece gown.

The coat dress simulating jackets or longer coats is ideal when developed in navy blue serge or duvetyn or tricolette. The latter fabric will probably be superseded as the season advances except in those cities where the climate permits lighter weight fabrics than the woolen.

I have observed a very charming coat dress of dark blue serge with a tight, narrow underskirt of the serge, ankle length, and over which there hangs a tunic of the serge somewhat tuller than most we see. 

> The act of Congress which, under the Constitution, provides for the taking of the Fourteenth Decennial census, makes it unlawful for any enumerator, special agent, supervisor or other employe of the Census Bureau to divulge any information whatsoever concerning the census returns. A heavy fine and possible imprisonment, or both, is the penalty prescribed for violation of this provision of the law.

The proper tabulated figures of the Census are given out nowhere but here in Washington, and then only upon the express authority of the Director of the Census Bureau.

Actual work by the enumerators in the various census districts will begin on January 2, 1920. It is expect-

Special programs are to be held at morning or evening services.

On Monday, November 3, the Governor's proclamation in each State will be made public, mass meetings will begin and the first check of the progress of the campaign will be made at a workers' dinner in the evening.

"Municipal Employees Day" has been set for Tuesday, November 4. On this day a proclamation from the Mayor of each city and town will be arranged for, while on the principal municipal building the Red Cross flag will be raised to be displayed throughout the remainder of the campaign.

Department store speeches will be made by "four-minute men" to be followed by lunch hour enrollment.

Wednesday, November 5, is to be 'Women's Day," on which special tribute is to be paid to the work which women are doing in the Red Cross. Meetings of women's clubs, special exercises in Red Cross workrooms and Chapters will characterize the day, which also will mark the peak of the house-to-house canvass that is to be an additional feature of the campaign.

Homage to the support which the laboring man is giving to the Red Cross will be paid Thursday, November 6, which is "Employees' Day." Noon meetinge will be held at factories and large industrial plants.

The school children of each city, town and county will be the central figures on Friday, November 7, when special exercises in the schools will be held. The following day is special feature day for business and fraternal clubs. On the second Sunday of the campaign, November 9, patriotic sermons will be preached. The new Katy freight depot at Smithville has been finished.

The state board of education has purchased \$275,000 in county bonds on behalf of the permanent school fund paying only one-third cash and agree ing to pay the remainder at future.

Good roads bond election for \$440, 600 held in road Precincts 1, 4 and 5 of Trinity County Saturday, which include Groveton, Apple Springs and Chite, respectively, carried by a good margin over the necessary two-thirds majority.

Sixty-four and two-tenths of sanitary sewer lines, reaching practically all unserved districts of the city of San Antonio, Texas, will be constructed from the proceeds of the \$500,000 bond issue recently author ized for sewers.

### SHANTUNG QUESTION SETTLED IN SENATE

14 REPUBLICANS IN PRO TREATY LINE-UP-LODGE SAYS HE WILL CONTINUE FIGHT.

Washington.-The long double-de bated Shantung amendment to the peace treaty, presented by Senator Lodge and approved by the foreign relations committee, finally was rejected in the senate with a majority of an even score against it. In the vote of 35 to 55, 14 republicans swung over to the pro-treaty forces, while three democrats lined up with those supporting the proposal. Of the six senators absent, two republicans were put on record as in favor of the amendment and one republican and three democrats as opposed to it.

The roll call, which came at the end of another six and a half hours of sharp debate, in reality swept away six amendments instead of one. each change in the treaty text having been numbered separately by the committee in its decision to strike out the word "Japan" and substitute the word "China" throughout the sections relating to the Province of Shantung. By unanimous consent, however, the six changes were debated and voted on as one.

Only three of the committee's 45 amendments now remain to be acted on by the senate, 36 previously having been rejected. Of those remaining, one relates to American representation on the reparations commission and two to equalization of voting power in the league of nations assembly.

After the vote was completed Senator Lodge announced that later he would move to strike out entirely the sections awarding the Shantung rights to Japan. Notice also was given by a number of the republican senators who opposed the committee that they would present reservations dissenting from the Shantung award.

#### RUSSIAN BOLSHEVIK ARE BEING DRIVEN BACK

Armies Press in on All Sides and COAL MINERS' STRIKE Fall of Petrograd is Threatened.

Helsingfors. - The bolsheviki are evacuating Petrograd because the troops are unwilling to fight, according to a message received here.

London.-Forced back by the onslaughts of enemies on four fronts. the armies of the soviet government of Russia appear to be facing a period pregnant with disaster. General Denekine's cossacks from the south, Polish forces from the west; northwestern Russian legions on the northwest, and northern Russian troops from the north, have during the last few days forged ahead until it seems the bolshevik armies are between the upper and nether millstones.

Petrograd is doomed to capture, in the opinion of observers, General Secretary Wilson is hopeful that some Yudenich having passed Gatchina, amicable adjustment can be made. and is less than 25 miles south of the former Russian capital.

## VESSELS ARE DIVERTED TO

British Ships in North Atlantic to be Used to Expedite Texas Wheat.

Washington, - Ships headed for north Atlantic ports are to be diverted to Galveston for loading of wheat, outlined in a letter from Walker D. Hines, director of the railroad administration, to Representative Ferris of Oklahoma. Mr. Hines says that in order to secure a more rapid movement of grain through Galveston, it may be found necessary to erect temporary storage facilities in Oklahoma and Texas. In order to secure more rapid movement through Galveston, the government officials have been in cable communication with the British government, with the result of ships being diverted to the southern port.

According to records of the rail; road administration, 2,424,000 bushels of wheat are stored in Galveston's facilities, 2,147,000 bushels are on the tracws at Galveston, and there are in transit 1 207,000 bushels, a to tal of 5,777,000 bushels, whereas the elevator capacity at Galveston is only 2,900,000 bushels.

### STRIKE ARBITRATION PLAN IS OPPOSED

LABOR'S PROPOSAL DISCUSSED IN CONFERENCE. BUT AGREE-MENT IS NOT REACHED.

Washington.-After a heated session, devoted almost entirely to discussion of labor's proposal to arbitrate the steel strike, during which two attempts at postponement and a substitute resolution by Thomas L Chadbourne of the public group, met with defeat, the national industrial conference adjourned without having taken other definite action than the appointment of three subcommittees.

Another attempt to obtain action in the steel controversy, however, will be made by members of the public group, through a new compromise proposal.

The labor resolution was laid before the conference without recommendation by the central committee. but with an amendment proposed in committee by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, providing that the arbitration committee be chosen by the conference. In reporting the resolution, chairman Chadbourne announced that, while the resolution was favored by a majority of the members of the committee, it had received the negative vote of two groups, and, therefore, could not be favorably reported.

The climax of the tense sessions came when Samuel Gompers, leader of the labor delegation, made an impassioned plea for intervention in the steel strike and reviewed the negotiations leading up to the calling of the strike on Sept 22.

Given permission to speak on the arbitration resolution, Mr. Gompers described the labor proposal as the "most generous and comprehensive proposition ever submitted in the entire course of the struggle of labor to emerge from slavery to serfdom and thence to waged labor." Mr. Gompers said he believed that fair-minded employers, employes and public alike regretted the evident attempt to defeat the strike arbitration resolution.

### SCHEDULED FOR NOV. 1

Government Will Take Action Seek ing to Prevent Shut-Down of Mines

Washington. - Immediate steps to avert the threatened nation-wide strike of bituminous coal mine workers are to be taken by the federal government. After President Wilson's cabinet had discussed the situation, Secretary Wilson of the department of labor, announced that he would invite John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, and John L.
