The dates for the 1925 convention will be set before adjournment of the present gathering


Five minutes each had been alloted o supporters of Omaha and Fort Worth to present their arguments to the convention, the Texans first taking the floor.

Poults should not be fed for 48 to 60 hours, then they should be given some fine grit or finely-chopped egg shell. Care should be exercised that an ample supply of sour milk, milk curd, or cottage eese is available.

For feeding the first few days, much the same feeds and methods as are used for baby chicks may be followed, the only difference being that In feeding little turkeys even greater care should be exercised not to overfeed. Oatmeal, hard-bolled eggs, crumbled shell and all, and johnny. cake square, phone 102. have been found satisfactory. The poults may be gradually changed to a good-grade chick scratch, sifted finelycracked corn, cracked wheat and pinhead oats, with a mash mixture such as is used for little chicks.
