PAYING HIGH PREMIUMS Last spring we did a bit of com-
plaining about the fire insurance rates that are being held too high
in Texas by the State Fire Insur-
ance Commission of Texas. This Commission takes the salaries paid
it from the taxes taken from the
people of Texas. It has legal requirements set before it for set-
ting the rates. Texas statutes pro-
vide that fire insurance companies may earn not more than 5 per cent.
For the past five years they have
been earning 18.3 per cent on Tex-
as business. Naturally when there
is a state supported authority charged with the setting of the
rates, the insurance companies are not going to set their rates.
