## County Agent To Be On KFYO Each Friday Morning

Beginning Friday morning December 16th County Agent, O. G. Tumlinson, will arrange a short program each Friday over the radio station KFYO at Lubbock. These talks will begin at 6:45 a. m. and will be on farm subjects and hints of the season, and will be in line with the work and demonstrations being carried on at that time. The first talk will be the discussion of farm poultry flocks. The next talk will be on farm butchering and curing meat.

Then in the very near future Miss Chitwood, Home Demonstration Agent, will talk on meat canning. Mr. R. N. McClain, Assistant County Agent, in charge of boy's club work will discuss club work and some of his leading boys will make talks from time to time. Farmers of various communities will be asked to talk on different subjects. Mr. J. M. Hill with the United States Biological Survey will give a talk soon on the control of rats and mice. Other county and Home Demonstration agents in this section will be asked to assist in this program. A very interesting and profitable program is expected to develop through this source.

## Becton Farmers Stage Hog Killing And Curing Demonstration

Twenty-five farmers and their wives took part in a hog killing and curing demonstration at the E. H. Moody place Thursday and Friday of last week. The killing, butchering and curing work was given by County Agent O. G. Tumlinson and the canning demonstration was conducted by Miss Isla Mae Chitwood, Home Demonstration Agent.

There were ten hogs used in the demonstration, each man bringing one to two hogs thereby practicing on his own meat. The A. and M. College methods was used. This method of sugar curing country hams and becons has proven very satisfactory and is becoming very popular to the general public. There seem to be quite a demand to buy this product at most all times of the year. Every one that attended the demonstration expressed themselves as liking the method and that they were going home and work up the year's meat supply in that way.

There are twenty of such demonstration Agents during December and January. A complete schedule will be published in the very near future giving places and dates.

## Agent To Conduct Hog-Killing Here

O. G. Tumlinson, county agent, who has been giving demonstrations on meat-killing and saving at different communities about the county, will be in Slaton on Monday and Tuesday, December 19 and 20, and will conduct a hog-killing at the home of E. E. Wilson. Mr. Tumlinson asks all farmers who have hogs to be killed to bring them to Mr. Wilson's place, and Mr. Tumlinson will demonstrate the scientific manner of killing hogs, and of dressing them and curing the meat. Everyone who brings hogs to be killed is requested to bring some kind of fuel that can be burned under a vat, wood, brush, coal, old inner tubes, or something similar.

## BANK PAYMENT WILL BE MADE

Good Christmas News Given Slaton Bank Depositors As Dividend Is Announced For Closed Institution

Hers' good Christmas news for depositors of the closed First State bank. Documents, in which an 8 per cent dividend for commercial depositors and a 60 per cent distribution for the savings department were authorized, were filed Tuesday in district court of Lubbock. Checks will be mailed within a few days.

The 8 per cent settlement will approximate \$5,600, the total deposits having been about \$70,000. Savings depositors will realize between \$1,100 and \$1,200, there having been about \$2,000 in this department when the bank closed early this year. This is the first settlement to be made.

First settlement from the Slaton State bank was 10 per cent.

**HALTING FARM FORECLOSURES**

One of the most practical efforts to stop foreclosures of farm mortgages occurred recently in Nebraska, one of the solid states that can not be accused of having Communistic tendencies. Most of the farmers in that state belong to the class of "klaks," the one class hated the most by the Soviet authorities. Kulaks are the most progressive of all Russian farmers and their prosperity incites the attacks of the Reds.

It is the American "kulaks" who are suffering most nowadays from the crushing load of debts and mortgages. And it is the Nebraska judges who are trying to meet this condition by blocking the flood of foreclosures. Judges in the Ninth District in that state recently declared a moratorium on all farm debts for an indefinite period. When it is known that one Iowa county recently reported something like 650 farm foreclosures during one term of court one can readily see that unless something is done to stop this trend, it will not be long before the ownership of all land in the United States will revert to the hands of the favored few.

**CHARLES FIKE, JR. HAS UNIQUE BIRTHDAY**

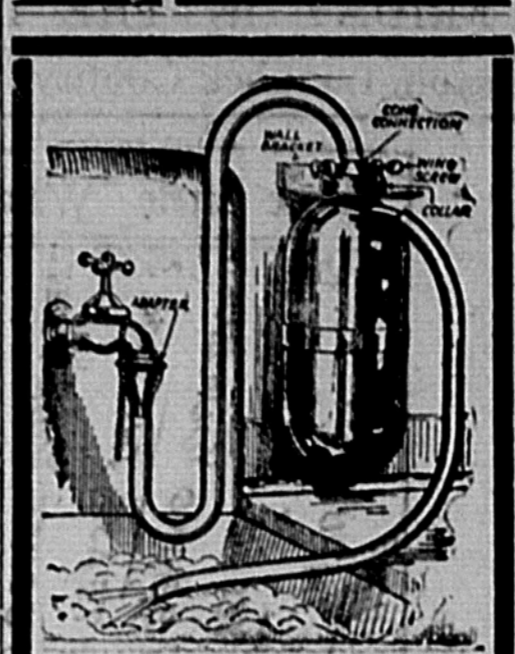

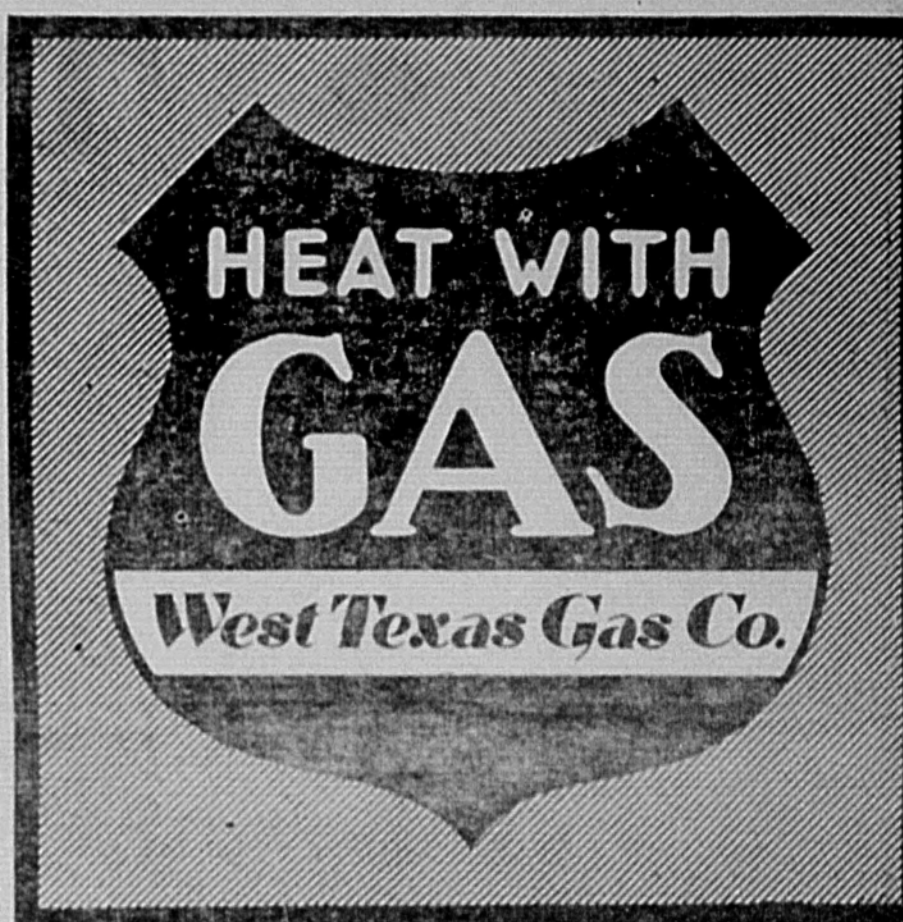
