

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, ORDERING THE IMPROVEMENTS OF PORTIONS OF GARZA STREET, LYNN STREET, AND TENTH STREET, IN THE CITY OF SLATON AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, THAT:

LYNN STREET from the west property line of Ninth Street to the east property line of 7th street.

NINTH STREET from north property line of Lynn to the alley, 140 feet north.

GARZA STREET from the east property line of Tenth street to the East property line of Seventeenth St.

TENTH STREET from north property line of Lubbock Street to the North property line of Jean Street.

In the City of Slaton, to be improved as follows, to-wit:

That same be graded, raised and filed, that the roadway of said street shall be improved, with brick pavement on concrete base.

That the City Engineer of the City of Slaton, is directed forthwith to prepare and file with the City Commission plans and specifications for the said improvement in accordance herewith.

That the cost of making the improvement shall be paid in the following manner, to-wit:

(A) The City of Slaton shall pay the whole of one-fourth, (1/4) of total cost of construction, exclusive of curbs.

(B) The owners of property abutting upon said streets named to be improved shall pay the whole cost of installing curbs in front of their property, and shall pay the remainder of said cost of the improvement of said street, after there has been deducted the amount payable by the City of Slaton under Section (A), above, provided, however, that in no event shall more than three-fourth (3/4) of the entire cost of such improvements, be assessed against such property owners and their property.

(C) That the portion of the said cost to be paid by the City of Slaton shall be payable upon estimates made by the City Engineer during the construction of said work, on the first day of each month after the beginning thereof, payable on the fifth day of each month, fifteen per cent (15%) of said estimate being held back and reserved and payable to the contractor to whom the work may be let upon the completion and acceptance by the City.

That the portion of the cost of such improvement payable by the owners of the property shall be paid in six equal installments, one payable within thirty days (30) after the completion of the work on each street and its acceptance by the City, one payable within one year, one payable in two years, one payable within three years, one payable within four years, and one payable within five years, after said date of completion and acceptance by said city, and to bear interest at the rate of eight per centum (8%) per annum, payable annually, provided, that said owners shall have the option to discharge any installment before the maturity by payment thereof with accrued interest.

That the proportions of said cost to be paid by owners of property shall be assessed against them and their property in accordance with the provisions of chapter II, Title 22, of the Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, 1911, and constitute a personal liability of such property owners and a lien against their respective property, and shall be assessed in accordance with the "Front Floor plan or rule", in proportion as the frontage of each owner on each particular street is to the whole number of front feet of abutting property to be improved on that particular street; provided, that if, in the opinion of the City Commissioners, the application of this rule shall be unjust or unequal in any case, then the City Commission shall adopt such rule of apportionment as shall be just and equitable and effect equality, between said property owners, having in view the equities of each owner, the benefit to each and the burden imposed upon each by means of such improvement; and in no event shall any assessment be made against any owner and his property in excess of the actual benefit to such owner in the enhanced value of his property caused by such improvement; and provided that no such assessment shall be made until after notice to such property owners and a hearing to them as provided in said Chapter II, title 22, of the revised statutes of the State of Texas, of 1911, heretofore legally adopted by said city.

That the personal liability of such owners and the lien upon their property, as fixed by said assessment, shall be enforced as is provided by said chapter II, title 22, of the revised statutes of the State of Texas, of 1911, by the sale of said property as for ad valorem taxes of the City, or by suit, any court having jurisdiction, together with all cost and reasonable attorneys fees, if incurred; and after such assessment the City Commission shall cause to be issued to the Contractor doing the work assignable certificates in accordance with said chapter II, title 22, of the Revised Statutes of the State of Texas, of 1911, setting forth the amount assessed against each property owner and his property, and the terms and time of payment thereof.

That the contractor to whom the work be let shall not be obligated to construct any improvement in front of the property of any owner which property may be exempt from enforcement of an assessment against the same, unless such owner shall secure to said contractor, to his satisfaction, the payment of the cost of the cost for such improvement.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, THAT for the purpose of construction on each street or portion thereof named to be improved

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, THAT Whereas, the fact that said streets are in such urgent need of repair creates an imperative public necessity for the immediate preservation of public health, safety and property which requires that the rule requiring three serial readings be suspended and that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 42.
An Ordinance of the City of Slaton, Texas, accepting bid of L. H. Howard for paving certain portions of streets in the City of Slaton, and approving contract between said city and L. H. Howard for the construction of said street improvement, and approving contract bond of contractor.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS.

Section 1. That the bid of L. H. Howard submitted to the City of Slaton, Texas, on this, the 5th day of Oct. A. D. 1926, proposing to construct in said city of Slaton certain street improvements, consisting of street paving, curb and gutter, which work is set forth in certain "Notice to Bidder," issued by said City of Slaton, and set forth in said bid, proposing to perform said construction for a total consideration of \$88,915.74, is hereby accepted by the City of Slaton, Texas.

Section 2. That the certain contract made and entered into on this 5th day of Oct. A. D. 1926, by and between the City Commissioners of the City of Slaton, Texas, as party of the first part, and L. H. Howard, of Post, Garza County, Texas, as party of the second part, relating to construction of street improvement in the City of Slaton, Texas, is hereby approved, ratified and confirmed.

Section 3. That the bond of L. H. Howard, Post, Garza County, Texas, as principle, and Globe Indemnity Co., Surety, payable to the City of Slaton, Texas, in sum of \$88,915.74, dated the 4th day of Oct. A. D. 1926, and more particular known as "Contract Bond" is hereby accepted and approved.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

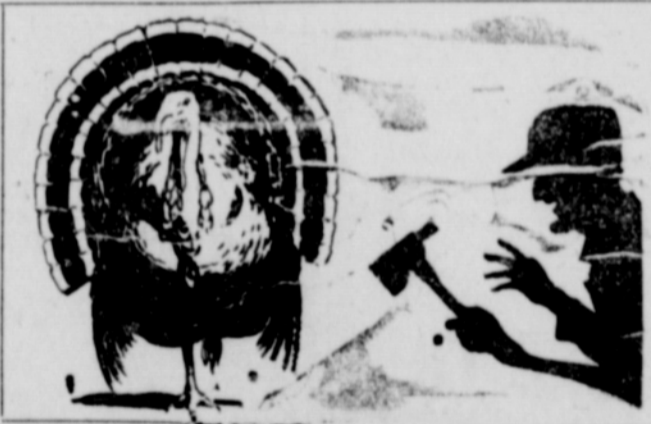

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS TOWNS

Stamford—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is making an effort to check a new form of "bootlegging" being practiced by unscrupulous hog dealers who are spreading hog cholera through their careless introduction of infected or exposed swine into West Texas and federal aid is being sought by the regional organization in the matter.

Graham—A novel storage system has solved the cotton problem for a farmer in this section. Asa Vaughn and sons of Wilbarger County are using a hay baler to put up their seed cotton as it is picked. Dispensing with the cost of ginning and storage, the cotton seed bales are to be held in Vaughn's barns during the present crisis, and will be released to the market at a later date. When ready for marketing, the cotton seed bales will be loaded and taken to the gin.

Fort Worth—The committee named by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to investigate the cotton situation in Texas went on record at its recent meeting here as endorsing the Texas Cotton Corporation to be organized with a \$5,000,000 subscribed capital stock by a special cotton committee of the Texas Bankers Association in accordance with plans adopted by six Southern States for the retirement of 1,250,000 bales of Texas cotton. The committee also adopted a resolution relative to a plan for cotton acreage reduction in the state of Texas to an extent of not less than 25 per cent.

Ballinger—The More Feed, Food and Conservation Campaign of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is to be launched at the Central West Texas District Convention of that organization which meets here November 15. The movement for living at home and encouraging thrift through more livestock for West Texas farms, involves a contest in which prizes aggregating \$2500 will be awarded by the regional chamber of commerce to farmers in its territory.

Plainview—A new addition to the Missouri hotel here to cost \$5,200 has been planned by its proprietor to consist of ten rooms of brick and tile construction. The improvement program will make the Missouri Hotel a first rate structure, fireproof throughout.

Tulia—In line with the increasing business in the local postoffice, a second regular clerk has been employed by the Tulia postmaster.

Robert Lee—Lights in this community are to be installed upon receipt of a transformer which was ordered some time ago.

Paint Rock—A new produce house has been opened up in this section. It will handle poultry, pecans, wool, mohair, furs and other products.

Big Lake—Conditional acceptance of a bid for the construction of a City Hall was made recently by city officials, and work upon the building is expected to start soon.

San Saba—Number 8, Volume 5 of the "Pioneer Pecan Press", the only magazine in the world devoted exclusively to pecan culture and questions related to the industry, has been released from the press here. The issue contains 24 pages of reading and

advertising matter, 21 pages being devoted exclusively to discussions of Texas' native nut. Celebration of "Pecan Coronation, King of Nuts" was held in San Saba November 8. Officials of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and prominent men of the state were invited to attend.

Paducah—The Cook Hotel, Paducah's new home for traveling men has thrown open its doors here. The new hostelry is rated as one of the prettiest buildings in this part of the country and is equipped with all modern fixtures.

Brady—Brady's third annual Turkey Trot Day, announced to be the greatest and most unique celebration undertaken in the Heart of Texas section, was staged here November 6. Cooperation of traveling men who united in the entertainment with the Peddlers' Jubilee made possible a number of stunts and features. The purpose of the day was to advertise Turkey as King in the Heart of Texas. Motion pictures of the parade was taken during the day.

Cowgirl Uses Chevrolet In "Bulldogging" Steer

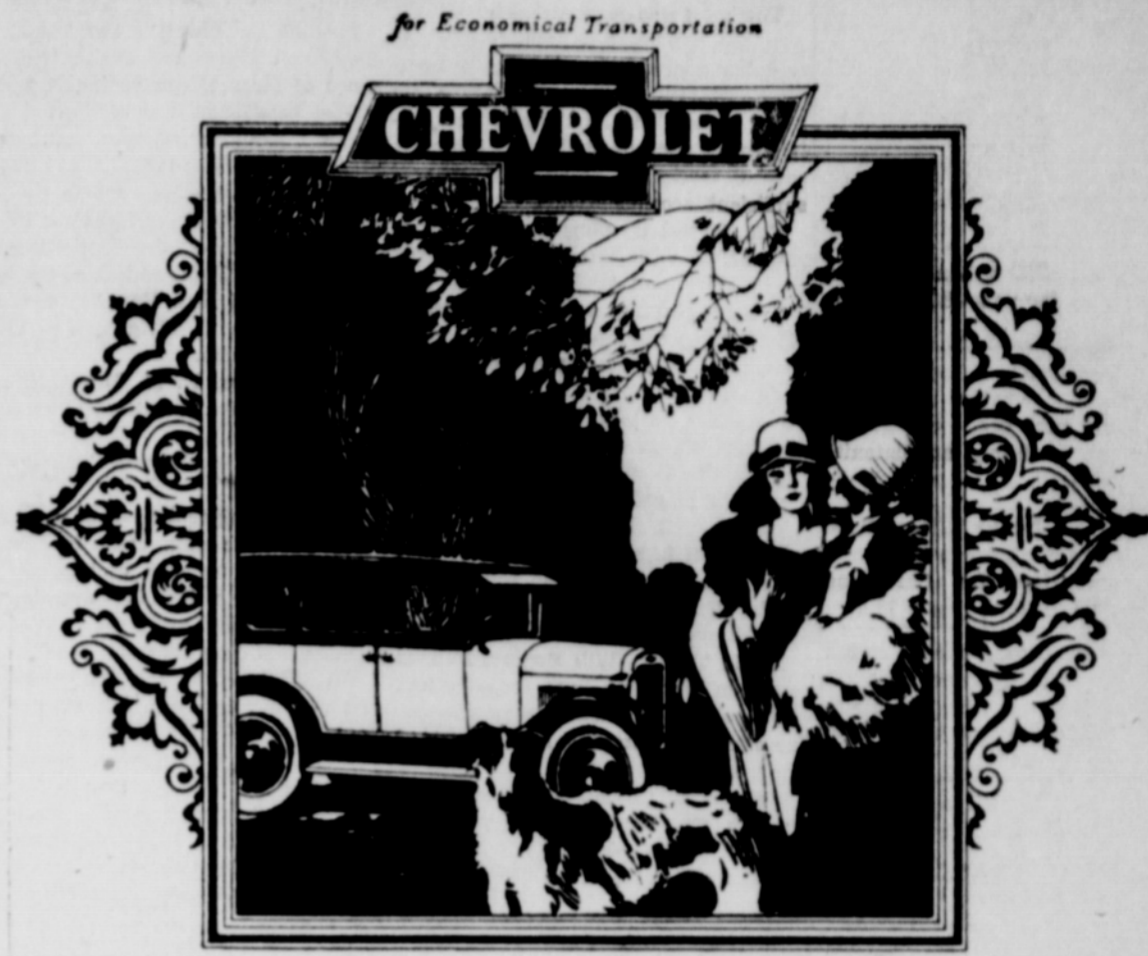
