

## SUPT. ANTON IS TRANSFERRED TO NEW MEXICO DIVISION POST

**Change Effective April 1; Is Promotion; Has Served Slaton Division Almost Seven Years.**

J. Fred Anton, superintendent of the Slaton division of the Santa Fe since August, 1920, almost seven years ago, has been named superintendent of the New Mexico division of the same road, with headquarters at Las Vegas, N. M. Mr. Anton is to assume his duties on the New Mexico division April 1. J. C. Barton, assistant superintendent of the Wellington, Kans. division, succeeds Mr. Anton as superintendent of the Slaton division, assuming his duties April 1, also. The two announcements were made here this week.

The work done by Mr. Anton on the Slaton division has demonstrated his ability as one of the ablest railroad officials in this section of the United States. His labors have been untiring during the nearly seven years he has lived here, and he is considered worthy indeed of the promotion he has been awarded. The New Mexico division is older and larger than the Slaton division and carries with it more responsibility. His numerous friends here and over this part of Texas will doubtless congratulate him upon his deserved advancement.

Going back to Las Vegas will be like going home for the Anton family. It was there that Mr. Anton began his railroad career, and it is Mrs. Anton's former home. Her father lives at Las Vegas now. However, Mr. Anton will not likely take his family to their new home until the present school term has closed, it was stated here. He will go in person to attend to his official duties there at this time, it is announced.

During the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Anton in this city, they have made a very large host of friends, and have been prominent in the civic and social life of Slaton. Mr. Anton is a member of the Slaton Rotary Club. Their leaving will occasion much regret on the part of their friends here, but all join in extending to them congratulations and best wishes.

Mr. Berton, the new superintendent, will no doubt be extended a hearty welcome as he becomes a citizen of Slaton, assuming a place of much importance in the life of this community, as well as of this entire section.

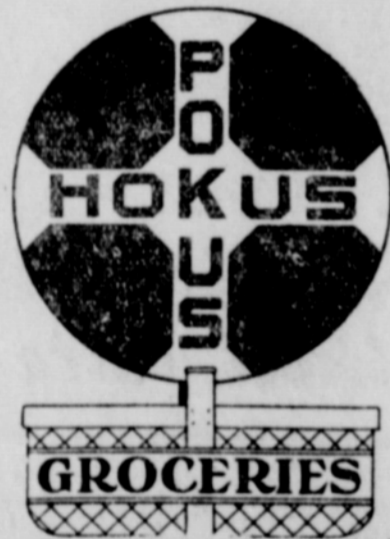

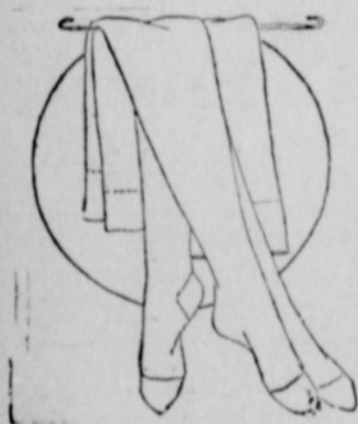

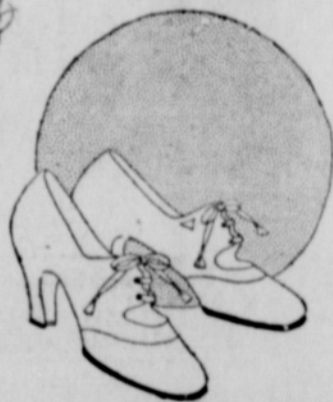
