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#### General rains fell throughout the Slaton territory during Sunday, Sunday night and Monday, reports from different areas have shown this week. The rain in Slaton measured about two and one-half inches, it is said by


some possessing rain gauges. The one-inch rain of the preceding Sunday brings the total fall for the eight or nine days to three and one-half inches here.

With a splendid supply of moisture in the ground, not only here but in practically every nock and corner of the South Plains country, farm and business prospects have been greatly. helped, according to general opinions expressed. Some have said approximately one-third of this year's cotton acreage neaf Slaton had been planted before the rain of Sunday and Monday. The moisture fell slowly, not packing the ground, and since then it has been cloudy so that the ground has not been packed or baked. Variety Store, W. E. Dorsett, Harry's All plantings done before the rains should get good results, it is believed. Other planting will likely go forward with considerable haste throughout this territory, farmers have indicated. The general opinion seems to be that the rain came in time for cotton to be planted and mature a good crop before frost. Feed crops, too, have ample time, it is reported. Prospects appear much brighter in this country than two weeks ago, all would probably agree.

DISAPPROVE BOND PETITION. If Slaton voters follow the advice of the Board of Directors of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, the road bond petition prepared in Lubbock and sent to Slaton to be signed, petitioning the Commissioners Court to call a one mil lion dollar road bond election, will receive no signatures in this section of the county.

The action was taken by the Board last Friday afternoon, with nearly a full attendance of the directors, and followed similar action taken earlier in the day by the Slaton Rotary Club. It is understood that the action of the unanimous in voting to disapprove the netition in its present form.

The petition prepared by someone in Lubbock and sent to members of the Steering Committee from Slaton, limit. without disclosing the writer, was looked upon by Slaton citizens who considered the petition as being not only in gross violation of the letter and the spirit of the Steering Committee's agreements and recommendations, but calculated to undo the work of the Committee and render it possible to work out a highway program that would be unwise and work perm anent and irreparable injury to this section of the county and to Slaton in particular. The result was that no one in or about Slaton would sign the petition.

The petition, after providing for the highways agreed upon by the Steering Committee, added what Slaton interprets as a joker, in these words, "and to build anyother highways or roads in Lubbock County, with said money if there be sufficient funds remaining after the construction of the roads named above."

That was thought to make it possible and highly probable that Lubbock would take advantage of the proing from the county seat to the south line of the county. 





The motion was promptly seconded, and then further discussion followed until it was found that the meeting period was exceeded by twenty minutes. When the motion reached a vote it was adopted by a standing vote with only two dissenting votes.
