LUBBOCK COUNTY WAS SELECTED TEXAS TECHOLOOGCAL COLLEGE
News reached Slaton Wednesday afternoon that Lubbock County was the unanimous choice of the Locating Board of Texas Technological College, and it is understood that the site is just west of the city of Lubbock
Lubbock County has long been in the limelight as one of the most progressive and most highly developed counties in the entire Plains country. Now the message is being carried in every newspaper of any importance that Lubbbock County has secured one of the greatest colleges in the South, following a six months' study of the briefs of thirty-five applicants and a three weeks tour of inspection. The board was in session only five hours.
Slaton is proud of the fact that this college was located in Lubbock County, and also proud of the fact that Hon. R. A. Baldwin of Slaton, State Representative, was a joint author of the bill creating this college and that he fought so valiantly and faithfully for its passage
R. J. Murray, president of the Chamber of Commerce, was extended an invitation from Lubbock to bring up a large party and help the town celebrate Wednesday night. A large number went up, and during the evening Messrs. Murray and Baldwin addressed a gathering on the court house square estimated at more than 4,000 people.
This great school does not belong to Lubbock County alone. It belongs to all Texas, and was created primarily to take care of West Texas.
It will be of untold benefit to every section of West Texas, and is destined to become one of the State's greatest educational institutions.
