# HERE ARE THE FACTS! 

Consider These Carefully, Then Vote for the PROGRESS of Lubbock County AS A WHOLE When The Road Bond Election is Held, Saturday, December 1.

## DON'T BE MISLEAD!

Give Due Consideration to the Following Statements:

On December 1, 1928 the property tax paying voters of Lubbock county will vote on the question of whether or not the county's bonds will be issued in the sum of $\$ 2,004,000$ for the building of a $\$ 4,000,000$ system of permanent roads in Lubbock county.

This total system of roads will cost approximately $\$ 4,000,000.00$. The total cost of state Highways Nos. 7, 9 and 53 will be right at \$3,$000,000.00$ The county will pay approximately one-third or $\$ 1,000,000.00$ of this amount. On highways Nos. 7, 9 and 53 northeast from Lubbook, these being both Federal and state highways the county will pay one-third the cost and the state and Federal governments twothirds the cost. On State Highways from Lubbock' west to the Hockley county Tine, these two highways being on the state system only, the state will pay one-half the cost.

On the other three roads, one leading from Lubbock east to the county line, another leading from the Lynn County line south of Slaton and on north through McClung, Acuff, Idalou and Becton to the Hale County line, and the third leading from Slaton west via Union to State Highway No. 9, none of which are on the State or Federal system, the county will pay the entire cost.

The vote will be on the entire bond issue for $\$ 2,004,000.00$. The vote will not be on separate roads, that is, a voter cannot vote for one road and against another. The vote will be on the entire system.

But now the opponents of the proposed $\$ 4$,$000,000.00$ county-wide system of good roads are fighting the bond issue of $\$ 2,004,000.00$ because they claim that Slaton, Union, McClung, Acuff, Canyon, Idalou and Becton, which are the most highly developed and most thickly populated sections of the county, are getting some roads out of the bond issueroads that by every test, by every measuring stick, they are entitled to.

The city of Slaton alone has a population of over 6,000 people. Idalou has about 1,500 . The rural territory in the eastern half of the
county is far more densely populated than is the western half. Likewise, property valuations in the eastern part of the county are much greater than in the western part. Our contention is that the eastern half of the county, under the proposed plan of road-building, is getting no more than we are entitled to, and that we have a perfect right to every road included in the proposed bond issue.

Most of the opposition to the bond issue at this time has developed in the western half of the county, due to the lateral roads that are proposed for the eastern part of the county. A campaign is heing waged to defeat this bond issue and the promise is made that as soon as it is defeated the opponents of this issue will immediately have another election called for a bond issue, with which to pave only the state highways. Which would you rather have, the present proposed system, or just have the state highways paved? WOULD THIS BE JUST? OUR ANSWER is "NO", for the reasons stated above, that is, difference between property valuations and the population to be served.

If this bond issue should be defeated, and if another should be passed to hard-surface only the state highways, the western half of the county, with a smaller population and smaller valuations, would receive THREE roads, while the eastern half would get only TWO. Would that be fair?

## The Tax Question

How much will taxes be increased if this bond issue carries? This is the big question everyone wants to know. The most that taxes can be increased will be 53c on the $\$ 100.00$ assessed valuation. This means that if a person owns 160 acres of land assessed at $\$ 15.00$ per acre, the most his taxes can be increased will be $\$ 12.72$ per year for this road bond issue. If his 160 acres of land is assessed at $\$ 20.00$ per acre, the most his taxes can be for this road bond issue will be $\$ 16.96$ per year. THE FACT IS, MOST LAND IN LUBBOCK COUNTY IS ASSESSED AT $\$ 12.00^{\circ}$
for county and state taxes, which would make the taxes less than either of the above figures quoted.

As a matter of fact, the taxes for this road bond issue should never be this much. In the first place, the bonds can only be sold as contracts are let or aid received from the state and Federal governments. It will takerseveral years to let the contracts and get state and Federal aid for these roads. The bonds will be sold only as they are needed and taxes will be levied only to pay the interest and sinking fund on the bonds as they are sold, which means that it will be several years until we will be paying taxes to pay the interest and sinking fund on the entire issue of $\$ 2,004,000.00$.

The taxable valuations of Lubbock county areinereasing atthe rate of around $\$ 2,000,000$ a year, whichmeans that the rate per hundred dollars, or per thousand dollars, will decrease proportionately each year. There are other ways of handling the sale of these bonds also which will make a lower rate of tax possible.

## How To Arrive At The 53c Rate

The valuations of Lubbock county are approximately $\$ 23,000,000$. A 53 c rate will produce $\$ 121,900$ annually. It will take approximately $\$ 116,000$ annually to pay the interest and retire the bonds. This leaves a margin of about $\$ 6,000$ to take care of delinquent taxes.

## Kind of Roads

What kinds of roads will be built? The estimates for Highways Nos. 7, 9 and 53 are figured on the basis of concrete roads. The estimates for the county roads are based on an 8 inch Calcihe Macadam base with a two-course inverted penetration asphalt topping. The latter road is as good as many counties are building on their State and Federal highways. This does not mean that these types of roads have been definitely decided on, but that sufficient money has been included to construct roads of these types or better.

We believe the people of Slaton, Union, Posey, McClung, Acuff, Canyon, Idalou and Becton should support this bond issue unanimously. The time has come when hard-surfaced roads actually PAY DIVIDENDS, and cannot be classed as a luxury or burden. The proposed bond issue gives a well-balanced system of highways for Lubboek County as a whole.
