The luncheon metings were described by the speaker as being a place for ers to exchange ideas, get each other's viewpoints and receive inspiration from the close contact they en-joy with their friends and fellow-citizens in other lines of business. The luncheon meeting is not simply a place to eat, he said emphatically. The educational value of the meetings was referred to as one of the chief benefits members of Rotary Clubs get.

"If any Rotarian thinks he should help himself and his business through the influence of the Rotary Club, he is sadly mistaken and doesn't have the proper conception of Rotary, by any cans," Mr. Sone said. "If we do that, we neglect others and their interests, and thus lose the greatest value we could obtain from Rotary-the joy and blessing of serving others."

"Rotary should cultivate a spirit of patience, each man meeting his own obligations in line with the highest standard of ethics, even if the other fellow does not do so," it was contend-ed. "Rotary should make us more loyal to life's duties, making our lives help others instead of always thinking only of ourselves."

Luman testified that when he went home the night of the shooting his wife told him of improper advances Breeding was alleged to have made. He related that he went to the theatre and called Breeding from his seat. As Breeding came up the aisle, the de-fendant said, he made a motion which Luman construed as the act of draw-ing a pistol. The shooting followed and Breeding died two days later in a Lubbock hospital.

The engine lubrication system

Fifteen years ago promoters succeeded in building some 20 creameries in Oklahoma. In each case the promoter picked out a community, sold stock, installed machinery, got his




called co-op tives went broke, and at the end of five years only one was left. It soon closed its doors.
