





There are few sportsmen, indeed, How to Build a Fish Stream

Hats off to sportsmen of Marion County, West Virginia, who decided to quit talking and get down to work, and as a result today have prospects of excellent trout and bass fishing right in ther own lo-

When we speak of trout fishing, we do not generally think of Marion County. But in the future years, unless nature interferes, Marion County will be right up there with fine fishing.

After some discussion, plans vere formulated for such development-and here is where the success story actually started. Instead to do the work, the sportsmen of the Onized Rod and Gun Club of Fairmont and the Square Circle strain of the oil. Add to this "aero-Sportsmen's Club of Monongah, matic" oil 10 drops of oil of anise got down to overalls and pick and and 10 drops of phnylacetic acid, shovel, and each club constructed which has a strong, sweet honey 12 dams for a total of 24. With such a start, it was not difficult for them to interest the National Youth

Administration and the State Road Commission to provide manpower on the one hand and transportation on the other, to build 78 more small dams, for a total of 102. The work was not begun without consultation of the technicians

of the Conservation Commission, who made exhaustive tests and analyze to determine whether or not a trout stream could be created the average temperature of the water during August was only 65 degrees; that the mineral content was negligible; that there was no fish-killing acid water empting into the creek, and that there was food in abundance, such as crabs, minnows, hellgramites, etc.

The principal thing lacking was a sufficient amount of shelter, pools and riffles which the dams, ranging in height from one and a half to two and a half feet are providing.

BEWARE OF TULAREMIA Texas hunters were warned today to use extreme care in handling wild rabbits to avoid the dreaded disease tularemia, sometimes called rabbit fever. Hunters are urged to avoid clean-

ing rabbits when they have cuts, sores or cratches on their hands. Tularemia is to be found in the blood of rabbits and often times in squirrels, When the blood comes in contact with an opening on the human hand then there is frequently a transmission of the disease

The greatest danger lies in skinning of the rabbits, the executive secretary said. Cooking will kill the germs and if an infected rabbit escapes the hunters notice in handling no ill effects will be experjenced from eating it, provided the meat is well cooked, i. e., until there are no pink or rare portions remaining even close to the bones. A rabbit which gets up slowly in front of the hunter or dog is probably infected with tularemia. If an animal seems light it is pro-bably well to discard it. Tiny white spots on the liver is an indication the rabbit has the disease.

However, by being , careful in handling rabbits (use rubber gloves if possible) and by cooking the meat well, hunters and housewives need not fear tularemia.







HERE ARE SOME FACTS about Ford Labor. During the year ended November 30th, 1940, the Ford Payroll throughout the United States averaged 113,628 hourly wage earners, not including office em-ployes, students, or executives. They were paid \$185,105,639.12. On this basis, the average annual wage was \$1,629.05.




