

Report Gains

Significant increases in livestock numbers on Cotton Belt mie Wynn attended the district farms during 1940, as reported by teachers meeting at Big Spring the U. S. Department of Agriculture, are evidence that blending livestock with cotton is more than merely a slogan with Southern farmers. Throughout the South, figures reveal, more livestock are being placed on farms to make efficient use of the pasturage, grains and hays, and homegrown cottonseed meal, cake and hulls produced by farmers.

Total cattle numbers in eleven Cotton Belt States at the beginning of 1941 were 3 per cent larger than a year ago, the Depart-ment of Agriculture reported with approximately 200,000 more dairy cattle of all ages and more than 400,000 increase in beef cattle. The Department estimates show that these States have about 2,600,000 more cattle, both beef and dairy, than 10 years ago.

While swine population is small-

er than the high total of a year ago, the South reports a gain of some 2,000,000 hogs over the total 10 years ago and nearly 800,000 more than the 1930-39 average.

Increased sheep numbers in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas, with no change in North Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama, as compared with last year, more than offset decreases in other Cotton Belt States, so that the region shows a net increase of about 5 per cent. Horses and mules continued to



If you read the current magazines, you'll like the tables to rack for them. Some of the new tables have a container sunk in one end for plants and this type can be put near a window.

Then there are the new hobby tables, the tip top tables and the altogether delightful table with the reversible board for a game of checkers with the children, or a backgammon or chess board for an exciting game with your nearest competitor. Such tables may be set up in the corner of the room with the game in place, and suggest pleasant relaxation just as a well fitted writing desk, with blotter and ink stand, and pen and pencils with paper in sight, seem to invite one to sit down and send that note right off. And, last but not least, remember that tables and hamps, that are placed by chairs and sofas, near windows, or by a fireplace to add to comfortable living, are the very best sort of decorating.


