S. Department of Agriculture. Not only farm people, but also merchants, manufacturers, laborers, and others who help turn cot-ton into finished goods will be assisted by the three-fold plan. Under this program, farmers who make a further voluntary reduction in their cotton acreage in 1911 may earn cotton stamps, which they can use in their local stores to buy cotton goods. A special \$3 payment also will encourage home food production. Symbolic of what the program offers are the cotton coat and dress worn by the farm girl above; the row of cotton hales of which there is a surplus of more than 10 million; and of cotton bales, of which there is a surplus of more than 10 million; and shelves of home-canned food direct from the family garden.




