Ordinarily the root systems are dead within twelve hours and the entire plant withered within seven days. This will depend to some extent on the weather conditions and the amount of rainfall following the treatment. Dead plants may be removed by raking. In badly infested areas it may be necessary to sow grass seed after removing the dead weeds.






