

Damage Not Great From Cotton Worms

Although the cotton worms do not seem to be increasing in any number in this locality many of the farmers are dusting poison on their crops to protect against the hatching that usually comes within about ten days after the first worms show up.

According to Roy Mack of the West Texas Cottonoil Company there is no great danger of heavy damage from the worms in this immediate vicinity unless the

L. J. Strube, E. R. Legg, Wm. Schutte and many others in this locality have ,or are dusting their fields with poison and all of the farmers are keeping a close watch in case the worms increase.

There are more farmers in the Southland and Grassland Communities using poison than those in this vicinity as the worms hatched out in greater numbers there.

Many farmers fear that we may have the same condition that we had in 1938 when the worms were worse than they have ever been in this part of Texas.



"Government classing offices will be set up at El Campo, Clarksville, Paris and Floydada to serve each of the four areas, and grow ers should receive quick classing," said M. C. Jaynes, cotton work specialist of the A. and M. College Extension Service, "All farmers in the program are eligible to have their cotton classed, but they do not have to sell it. Their cotton can go into the loan, or they are at liberty to dispose of it wherever they can get the highest price."

Under the plan, up to 225,000 bales produced in 1941 in selected one-variety areas, will be made available to domestic and foreign spinners in even running lots composed wholly of cotton from the same areas.

The marketing division of the Department of Agriculture will make an agreement with a shipper designated by the growers, who will act as buyer, to take over portion of the cotton from each area, Jaynes said. The present plan of the department is to purchase between 7,500 and 10,000 bales in Wharton County; 10,000 bales in Red River; 15,000 in Delta-Lamar, and 10,000 in the South Plains. Should the loan be under the market, Jaynes added, the purchases probably would not exceed one half of the estimated amounts.

The program provides federa payments of \$2.35 a bale for uncompressed cotton and \$2.75 for compressed, to cooperating agen cies which assemble the staple and deliver to domestic or foreign spin ners. These payments are to com pensate handlers for the extra cost involved in employing the and improved marketing methods required under the program.






