### New Kind Of Silo Proves Successful

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 28. -A "box" silo, built above ground, is a substitute for a trench silo in regions where the land is more or less level and keeping water out of a trench silo is a problem.

E. R. Eudaly and M. R. Bentley, respectively dairyman and agri-cultural engineer of the A. and M. College Extension Service, suggest two methods of constructing such a feed container: One-build two

parallel levees of dirt any height and width desired, then fill between the levees with silage and cover with earth. This sometimes is called a trench silo upside down. Two-in places where lumber is cheap it might be advisable to build the upside down trench out of lumber and tar paper. This is called a "box" silo.

The specialists say that it is not advisable to build a "box" of smaller dimensions than four feet between walls, six feet high and 20 feet long. But seven or eight years ago scientists isolated a substance they called panothenic acid and experimented with it in the diet of rats. The results, as explained by Dr. P. W. Punett and M. E. Badger, in the September issue of Good Housekeeping magazine, showed that when the acid was withheld from their food, patches of gray appeared amid the brown fur. By the end of 6 to 8 weeks practically all the brown had changed to gray. When the substance was put back in the rats' diet the dark hair reappeared in the same amount of time it had taken to disappear.

All these tests, the authors

All these tests, the authors writes, were carried on by the Good Housekeeping bureau, but they did not, of course answer the vital question, "Will it work the same way for humans?" To experiment further the Bureau gathered a group of men and women old and young, some just beginning to show a few gray hairs, and fed them large doses of the acid in tomato juice. The experiment is still being carried on, for the life processes of humans consume a much longer time than rats.



### Chart Shows Tests For Common Disease

MANY tests and laboratory ex-in the daily work of physicians. These tests and examinations are not relied on in themselves to make diagnoses, but are, rather,

make diagnoses, but are, rather, helpful adjuncts.

To present to the public a clear, concise picture of what these tests are like, Good Housekeeping with the aid of the foremost medical authorities, has prepared a home medical chart to give people a better understanding of the procedures the modern physician employs.

The chart, which appears in the September issue of the magazine, explains first the Schick test, given to indicate susceptibility of diptheria. The test is made by investing a minute amount of diluted dipt error in into the skin on the from a minute amount of diluted was injected. The redness with a papear slowly, becoming more distinct over a period of 72 hours. If this redness does not appear, the reaction is negative, indicating that the person is immune to diptheria. Most physicians, according to the Good Housekeeping chart, advise giving this test to children every two or three years.

To determine if a person is immune to scarlet fever the Dick test is administered in much the same fashion. A small amount of the scarlet fever is injected into the forearm with a hypodermic needle, and the appearance 24 hours later of a red area indicates susceptibility to the disease. Although doctors frequently make use of the Schick test.


