### TEACHER SHORTAGE

GETTING CRITICAL Dean B. F. Pittenger, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, made the following state-ment to the Board of Education: According to a survey just reported by the Texas State Teach-

Texas high school teachers who resigned between the opening of schools last September and February first of this year, were teachers of mathmetics; although fewer than 20 per cent of Texas high school teachers teach in the field of mathmetics.

The survey referred to shows that 2621 vacancies had occurred in 32,042 teaching positions heard from in Texas during the first half of this year. Of these vacancies, 47 per cent occurred m nigh school teaching positions, although less than 35 per cent of the teachers of Texas teach in secondary schools.
