DALLAS, Dec. 18 .-- Non-quota meat slaughterers-operators who kill less than 500,000 pounds per quarter-are not required to register with OPA as are operators who kill more than 500,000 pounds per quarter, regional OPA officials stated today, but all slaughterers are covered by the restriction or

Non-quota slaughterers, as defined in the OPA order, include retail butchers and farmers, if they slaughter and deliver. The only controlled meats are from cattle, calves, sheep, lambs and swine.

Our Weekly Sermon-

THE ROYAL CODE

By the Rev. P. B. Fitzwater, D. D., Director of the Pastors Course Moody Bible Institute, Chicago. Text: "Therefore all things what oever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." Matthew 7:12.

A disposition to treat others as one would be treated will be the prevailing code when Christ's king dom shall come into realization. May we all be able to say with Spurgeon, "Lord, teach it to me Write it out in full in my life."

In all doubtful question between any man, we should deal with our fellows as we would have them deal with us. The whole law concerning human relationships is compressed into this one comprehensive rule. It is not merely to refrain from doing our fellowman injury, but positively, to do that for him and unto him which we would desire him to do unto us under similar circumstances.

Confucius set forth this principle negatively, but only Christ could do it postively. Between the negative and positive sides of this rule is found the diffeence between heathenism and Christianity.

Conformity to this rule is the full keeping of the law. Unregenerate men are holding up this Gold en Rule as the ideal of living, and they do well to do so. But their fatal mistake is in the presumption that this life can be lived apart from the new birth. Only those who have been born from above-who have received the nature of God-can even attempt to live this rule. To demand of those under the power of the evil one the keeping of this precept is utter folly. The only remedy for fallen men is the blood of the cross.

Beginning this month, Nature will again be giving broadcast listeners extraordinary reception. After nightfall, the whole broadcast spectrum will again be filled with far-off stations, many them roaring in as strong 'locals".

This means that our radio-reflecting-layer, 100 miles up in the sky, is working as an excellent radio mirror again.

But such "good reception", a we enjoy at present, also brings some annoying troubles to broadcast listeners. These are twofold:

1.Distant stations come in strong right alongside familiar local staton, and so cause cross talk and "monkey chatter" on familiar lo-

2. Nearby high-power (60 to 100 miles away) have their sky waves so strongly reflected by the excellent sky mirror, revolves about the exploits of their reflected waves (traveling a path 150 miles longer) reach the listener out-of-step with the same station's direct-wave he ordinarily hears. This conflict of the two sets of wave, if of equal strength, may produce annoying total fading. Or, certain audible frequencies may b suppressed, so that at intervals the announcer "sounds as if he had a



Parisius, Associate Director of the Office of Agricultural War Relations, as director, and the functions, personnel, and property of certain agricultural bureaus concerned primarily with the distribution of food will be consolidated into a Food Distribution Administration, with Roy Hendrickson, present AMA administator, as director.

Secretary Wickard said prospects are good for meeting 1943 food requirements, but in order to meet those requirements the U.S. must use fully and economically its production facilities and distribution system and exert economy in the consumption of foods. Some foods may be scarce, he said, but "no one will need to go hungry." The executive order will enable the Agriculture Department to set up a national "assembly line" in the production and distribution of food vitally needed to win the war and the peace.

Lend-lease deliveries of American foodstuffs for shipment to oth er United Nations, as reported by the Department, increased 93,000, 000 pounds during October, bring ing the menth's deliveries to 645, 000,000 pounds and the total since the program was started to nearly 8,000,000,000 pounds. The AMA delivery report showed increased deliveries of eggs, dairy products, meats, grains, and other products.
