The period of registering every passenger car actually starts next week when the County War Price available at centrally located plac es the application forms that every car owner will have to fill out to obtain his ration book. The filled in application forms will be turned in beginning November 9 at school houses and other designated registration places. Start of ratoning is set for November 22.

Between now and registration November 9, everyone has the opportunity to learn the part he is called on to play to reduce the nation's use of rubber and how to qualify for a mileage rationing peppers and asparagus.

Between now and the start of rationing persons driving cars to and from work should get a ride swapping club in operation as such ride sharing will be a necessary requirement to obtain supplemental gasoline for excessive

Above all each driver should stay under 35 miles and hour.

In addition to preparations for registration of passenger cars by the Office of Price Administration. the Office of Defense Transportat ion was proceeding rapidly to supply owners of trucks and commer. cial vehicles with certificates of war necessity on which they will ment parts beginning Nov. 15. obtain gasoline, tires and replace-Mailing of application blanks has just about been completed by the ODT and machinery has been set up to issue the certificates from Detroit as rapidly as the applicaions are returned there.

Truck owners will not have to register for gasoline rationing since they will obtain their ration books by presenting their certificates of war necessity to the ration

The increasing range of various kinds of war controls, restrictions and use of materials, production and services point to the fact that the nation is entering a stage of war economy in which everyone will have less choice of getting things he might want even though he has the money.

After the first of the year, with even more drastic cuts in the manufacture of civilian goods, all will begin to notice how thoroughly our way of living is undergoing change

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 23 .- Re ports coming in to the State Health Department indicate an increas ing incidence of typhus fever throughout the State without any particular regard to urban or rural population.

Inasmuch as nearly 900 cases of typhus fever have already been Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging full cooperation from all communities whether large or small in a campaign to exterminate rats and thus control the increasing prevalence of typhus.

"It must be kept in mind that the rats acts as a reservoir of the typhus germ and the rat flea is mitted to man. Rats are liable to travel many miles from one com-





#### Higher Protein

(Ed. Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles, "Feed to Speed War Production", published as a ervice to stockmen.)

"If we don't use our feed suplies earefully, we will be scraping the lettem of our corn bin", the Secctary of Agriculture has warned in a strong plea to the farmers to wave grain and feed more highprotein feeds. "Farmers in general can profitably increase the use of high-protein feeds," he said, add-"Efficient use of high-protein feeds will make grain supplies go

Timeliness of this plea is evident not only from the need of more production, more efficient production and for saving grain; that it is very timely and important is indicated, also, by Bureau of Agricultural Economics estimates that the protein content of rations in 1942 will average only about 81 per cent of the estimated amount required to give balanced rations for all classes of livestock.

The protein content of United States rations is still too low to give the most efficient production of livestock products", the Bureau oncluded, in spite of increased production of high-protein feeds; and other reseases has said: "From the the Department of Agriculture in standpoint of price, efficent production and increaing demand for livestock products, farmers should wase more high-protein feeds this

How such an efficient concentrate as cottonseed meal can save grain in rations (as well as make the grain more efficient) is evident from these facts, which have been established by experience and Experiment Station research:

In fattening rations for beef cattle, fed as a protein supplement to balance rations, one pound of cottonseed meal or cake will save two and one-half to three pounds of corn, grain sorghums or other sim-Mar grain. When fed in amounts that exceed the minimum protein cequirements to balance the ration one pound of cottonseed meal is fully equal to a pound of corn or other grain. For this reason, feeders often find it advantageous to feed cottonseed meal in the feed-

lot in excess of protein requiretot in excess of protein requirements to replace grain; and cattle Johnson Grass may be fattened on grass with excellent results by using cottonseed Spreads Over cake or meal, as the sole concen-

For horses and mules, one pound of cottonseed meal will have about two pounds of corn or oats in a balanced ration. Idle stock can be carried through the winter in good condition on cottoneed meal and hulls, alone; and small amounts of grain combined with meal and hulls make efficient rations for working horses and mules

In these ways, the use of cotton seed meal in livestock rations will have an added importance to livestock producers this season, feeding authorities point out,, when grain-saving is essential as well as more efficient production of larger volumes of "Food for Victory"



How To Have Victory Over Sin By the Rev. Kenneth S. Wuest, Institute, Chicago,

Text: Sin shall not have dominion over you; for ye are not under the law, but under grace."—Romns 6:-

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
