

The Slaton Gasoline Rationing Board which is composed of J. A. Klasner, J. T. Pinkston and Webber Williams have received instruct ions on the details of how the books are to be rationed and will be fully authorized to issue 'A' books for gasoline. Every person owning an 'A' book while many others will be entitled to additional books. Those who apply will have to have an application card filled out giving the serial numbers of the five tires mounted on each car, in case serial numbers have been obliterated or disfigured the size and name of manufacturer of tire can be given. Although the farm tractor never plunges into the thick of a pitched battle, it is nevertheless a war machine, an indispensable unit in the production of the food and fibers that make it possible for war to be carried on. Today the farmers of the United States are striving to meet a 25 percent increased demand for these materials, with less labor available than ever before, yet the tractors which are so helpful in so many phases of agriculture are being produced in ever-decreasing quantities. Hence it stands to reason that any measures that can be taken to promote top efficiency in tractor operation and to decrease wear on the machine should receive close attention. Only by such means can the farmer hope to keep up with the demand for his products and, at the same time, be fairly well assured that his tractor will last for the duration.

There are today some 1,800,600 farm tractors in use in the United States. Should only a small percentage of these suddenly break down, it would be an agricultural calamity of no small magnitude. Surely anything that can be done to prevent such a happening and to keep all of these tractors in use will come under the heading of "war effort." 

The free-mailing privilege grant ed to members of the armed forces has raised their mailings some 30 per rent, it is estimated. Expansion of those forces also is adding rapidly to the postal burden.

The deadline already is past for mailing gifts to Army and Navy personnel overseas with assurance that the parcels will arrive Christmas. The New York post office reports that in late October, 350,000 such parcels were handled daily in that office alone.

The Post Office Department is making strenous efforts to avoid such a terrific jam as it faced in 1918 under similar conditions, during the First World War. It can succeed in those efforts-and avoid many heartaches for its patrons-if the public will cooperate by mailing early.





Now that registration for mile age rationing is fully under way throughout the Southwest, every. thing is in readiness for concen trated effort to be placed behind the nation's rubber conservation

Beginning next week, Order No. 21 of the Office of Defense Transportation (effective November 15) will regulate operation of trucks and commercial vehicles. Under the order Certificates of War Necessity are required of commercial vehicles so their operators can pur chase gasoline, tires and repair and

replacement parts.

The ODT regulations dovetail with the mileage rationing gram of the Office of Price Admin istration under which sale of gaso line will be rationed beginning Nov ember 22. Effect of the rationing program will be felt by passenger car operators only on and after the rationing date, but purchases of gasoline for trucks and commercial vehicles in the meantime wil be made in compliance with ODT regulations. Under the ODT program beginning Sunday, drivers of vehciles bearing Certificates of ceipts for each gasoline purchase. The driver retains one and the sel ler retains one. Similar procedures will be in effect regarding the purchase of repair and replacements

Truck operators and commercial vehicle operators who have not received their certificates should DT office.

Passenger car drivers still have a week to become better acquaint. ed with the rationing plan. In the meantime, they are urged to form car-sharing pools and to make other arrangements to curtail driving.




