C of C TO REQUEST FULL RATION BOARD

KEEP SCHOOLS GOING SAYS U. of T. DEAN

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 13.—Keep the public schools going despite war difficulties is the plea of B. F. Pittenger, dean of education at the University of Texas and president of the Texas State Teachers Association.

"We will have to sacrifice plenty of things—meat, gasoline, tires, coffee—to win the war," he declared, "but we will be doing more harm than good if we carry that sacrifice to the extreme of causing an educational blackout for youngsters now in secondary schools."

If the boys and girls are taken out now to work or fight before they finish high school study, they will be poorly equipped to cope with post-war problems which will be the greatest problems the world has ever faced, Dean Pittenger said.

At the regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last Tuesday night the needs of this community for a rationing board were discussed and plans made to bring the problem before the proper authorities.

Webber Williams, who is a member of the Slaton Gasoline Rationing Board explained some of the details concerning Gasoline rationing, registration for which will be done on November 19, 20, 21 at the Slaton Club House. Among other things that he felt that the public is not familiar is that when a tire has had the serial number marred so that it cannot be identified, that those filling out application blanks should give the size of the tire and the name of the manufacturer. At the present time arrangements have been made for the Slaton Board to issue only 'A' gasoline rationing books but they can take applications for books in other classifications.

REGISTRATION FOR GAS CARDS DELAYED

Those who wish to receive gasoline rationing books from the Slaton rationing board will be able to do so next Thursday, Friday and Saturday November 19, 20 and 21 at the Slaton Club House.

The Slaton Gasoline Rationing Board which is composed of J. A. Klasner, J. T. Pinkston and Webber Williams have received instructions on the details of how the books are to be rationed and will be fully authorized to issue 'A' books for gasoline. Every person owning an automobile will be entitled to an 'A' book while many others will be entitled to additional books. Those who apply will have to have an application card filled out giving the serial numbers of the five tires mounted on each car, in case serial numbers have been obliterated or disfigured the size and name of manufacturer of tire can be given. Those who wish to secure more than an 'A' card will be able to secure an application blank at the Slaton Club House when they go to secure the 'A' card. The Slaton Gasoline Rationing Board is not authorized at the present time to issue any other ration card except the 'A' card and those who are judged entitled to other cards can fill out applications here but must go to Lubbock to get delivery on them.

The Slaton Rationing Board will pass on and issue A cards and issue applications for cards for additional gasoline at the Club House during the three days of next week and will hold sessions in the Mayor's office after November 21 to pass on the eligibility of those applying for B and other cards.

Members of the board stressed the fact that every one would be supplied with enough gasoline to reach their home destination and that all transient farm workers would be supplied with enough fuel to meet all of their needs including gasoline to reach their home when the harvest season is over.

While there is no doubt that the gasoline rationing will restrict much driving it will not be quite as strict as many people at first predicted. The actual rationing will not go into effect until Dec. 1st.

Blanks Available For Commercial Vehicles Now

To expedite the issuance of Certificates of War Necessity required of all trucks and commercial vehicles beginning November 15, blanks are now available at the Chamber of Commerce office here in Slaton.

The application blanks are for the use of commercial motor vehicle operators who did not receive their application blanks by mail from the ODT central mailing office in Detroit.

Any operator of a truck, bus, taxicab or other commercial motor vehicle who has not yet received an application for a Certificate of War Necessity should report this fact at once. Local operators are asked to come by in person for their application blanks; other operators in this section of the state will be served by mail.

Because there is so little time left—all carriers must have the actual Certificates of War Necessity in their hands by November 15, or they cannot lawfully operate—

LUBBOCK, Nov. 13.—Lots of the glider boys out at South Plains (completed to back page)



"A powerful American force equipped with adequate weapons of modern warfare and under American command, is today landing on the Mediterranean and Atlantic Coasts of the French Colonies in Africa," President Roosevelt said in a statement issued by the White House late November 7. This action "provides an effective second-front assistance to our heroic allies in Russia."

The U. S. Force split into three parts and struck at Algiers, near Oran on the Mediterranean coast of Algeria, and on the Atlantic coast North and South of Casablanca. The War Department stated late November 8 that the offensive was advancing rapidly everywhere along 1,600 miles of coast against light French resistance. Algiers capitulated within 24 hours. The Vichy Government broke off diplomatic relations, but Secretary of State Hull said the main purpose of the Vichy policy of this government during the past two years was simply to pave the way for the military drive into the Western Mediterranean.

"The landing of this American army is being assisted by the British Navy and air forces and it will, in the immediate future, be reinforced by a considerable number of divisions of the British Army," the President stated. "This combined allied force...in conjunction with the British campaign in Egypt is designed to pre-

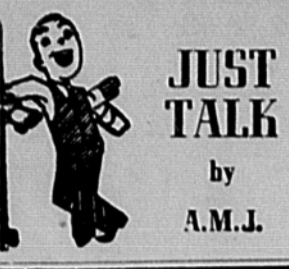

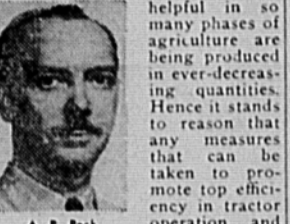

FARM TRACTORS IN WARTIME
Tractors Are Important War Machines
(First of a Series of Six Articles)

Although the farm tractor never plunges into the thick of a pitched battle, it is nevertheless a war machine, an indispensable unit in the production of the food and fibers that make it possible for war to be carried on.

There are today some 1,800,000 farm tractors in use in the United States. Should only a small percentage of these suddenly be taken out of service, the calamity of no small magnitude. Surely anything that can be done to prevent such a happening and to keep all of these tractors in use will come under the heading of "war effort."

Recent laboratory and field tests made by research engineers have not only confirmed these conclusions regarding power as affected by fuel, but have also revealed some noteworthy facts regarding the wear on tractor engines when different fuels are used.

Appeal For Early Mailing By P. O. Dept.

The Post Office Department now is starting the most gigantic task in its history—the movement of a deluge of Christmas parcels, cards and letters while maintaining the regular flow of millions of pieces of mail daily to and from our armed forces all over the world.

Indications are that the volume of Christmas mail will be the largest on record. Already in September, latest month for which figures are available, retail sales had reached a level second only to the record month of December, 1941, according to the Department of Commerce. And sales are rising. Such heavy purchases always pressure heavy mailings.

Thousands of our soldiers, sailors, marines and civilian friends are not to be disappointed at Christmas time, the public must cooperate by mailing earlier than ever

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before and by addressing letters and parcels properly. The best efforts of the Post Office Department alone cannot be enough, in view of wartime difficulties faced by the postal system. The public must assist.

About 25,000 experienced postal workers already have been taken by the war services. Arrangements

are under way to add thousands of temporary personnel to postal staffs, but this man power is hard to find and is experienced. Facilities of railroads and air lines are heavily taxed by movements of huge quantities of war materials and personnel. Extra trucks are almost impossible to obtain. Winter weather, hampering transportation, is beginning.

The free-mailing privilege granted to members of the armed forces has raised their mailings some 30 per cent, it is estimated. Expansion of those forces also is adding rapidly to the postal burden.

The deadline already is past for mailing gifts to Army and Navy personnel overseas with assurance that the parcels will arrive by Christmas. The New York post office reports that in late October, 350,000 such parcels were handled daily in that office alone.

The Post Office Department is making strenuous efforts to avoid such a terrific jam as it faced in 1918 under similar conditions, during the First World War. It can succeed in those efforts—and avoid many heartaches for its patrons—if the public will cooperate by mailing early.

Recruiter To Be In Slaton

Branding as false the rumors that voluntary enlistments in the U. S. Navy would soon be discontinued, the Navy has instructed its recruiting personnel to accept applications of all physically fit men. 17 to 50, who volunteer. "The Navy needs more and more

men, in all branches of its service, just as quickly as it can enlist them," the notice said, "and they must be volunteers, since the Navy does not draft its men." Navy officials pointed out that more openings for petty officer ratings, and more opportunities for special training, were now available than ever before, and urged all eligible men to investigate at the Navy Recruiting Station, in the Lubbock Post Office, or contact the traveling recruiter when he visits regularly each week in nearly every Plains town.

Navy training schools are running under capacity, and are anxious for young men, 17, 18, 19 and 20 years old, to volunteer for special training in a trade of their choice. Especially does the Navy want to train young men at Radio Technicians, airplane mechanics, gunners and as hospital corpsmen, etc.

Many new openings have been made available in the Seabees, or Navy Construction regiments, for men with much or limited experience a cooks, bakers, barbers, mechanics, engine operators, clerks, storekeepers, carpenters, truck drivers, accountants, electricians, oil field workers, etc. Men applying for ratings in the Seabees should make arrangements to be interviewed in Dallas, with expenses paid, November 17, 18 or

19. For the convenience of Lubbock and Lynn County men, the traveling recruiter will be in Slaton at the Gaither Service Station each Monday at approximately 8:30 o'clock, to give full information and take applications.

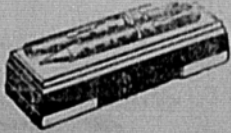

ON THE HOME FRONT

Now that registration for mileage rationing is fully under way throughout the Southwest, everything is in readiness for concentrated effort to be placed behind the nation's rubber conservation program.

Beginning next week, Order No. 21 of the Office of Defense Transportation (effective November 15) will regulate operation of trucks and commercial vehicles. Under the order Certificates of War Necessity are required of commercial vehicles so their operators can purchase gasoline, tires and repair and replacement parts.

The ODT regulations dovetail with the mileage rationing program of the Office of Price Administration under which sale of gas line will be rationed beginning November 22. Effect of the rationing program will be felt by passenger car operators only on and after the rationing date, but purchases of gasoline for trucks and commercial vehicles in the meantime will be made in compliance with ODT regulations. Under the ODT program beginning Sunday, drivers of vehicles bearing Certificates of War Necessity must sign two receipts for each gasoline purchase. The driver retains one and the seller retains one. Similar procedures will be in effect regarding the purchase of repair and replacement parts.

Truck operators and commercial vehicle operators who have not received their certificates should get in touch with their nearest ODT office.

Passenger car drivers still have a week to become better acquainted with the rationing plan. In the meantime, they are urged to form car-sharing pools and to make other arrangements to curtail driving. Already throughout the Southwest reports show general compliance on the part of the public with rubber conservation regulations. Few arrests are being reported for violations of the 35-mile speed limit and over-the-road drivers say there are very few "sneak" speeding violations.



In the most sweeping enforcement action yet taken by the Office of Price Administration, license warning notices were served on more than 4,000 retail outlets, mostly grocery stores, in all parts of the country charging violation of the General Maximum Price Regulation. The notices sent out this week constitute legal warning that if the retailer receiving the notice again violates any price regulation, OPA will go into court and ask that his license be suspended. Without the license he will be unable to sell any commodities under OPA regulation. In this six-state OPA region, the notices were sent to 253 retailers. Similar enforcement drives on other commodities will follow.

Three permanent price controls—the first established on seasonal and perishable commodities—were set up during the week on potatoes, onions and turkeys. They regulate prices at every stage from the country shipper to the housewife. Their objectives are: (1) to insure continued bumper production; (2) to iron out price inequities between grades, types and markets, and (3) to give consumers definite assurance that prices will reflect only normal seasonal changes. The new regulations supplant temporary ones issued by OPA last month.

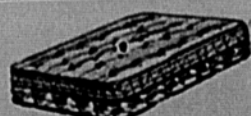

 vent an occupation by the Axis armies of any part of Northern or Western Africa, and to deny the aggressor nations a starting point from which to launch an attack against the Atlantic coast of the Americans.

"The French Government and the French people have been informed of the purpose of this expedition, and have been assured that the allies seek no territory and have no intention of interfering with the friendly French authorities in Africa," the President's statement said. "This expedition will develop into a major effort by the Allied Nations and there is every expectation that it will be successful in repelling the planned German and Italian invasion of Africa and prove the first historic step to the liberation and restoration of France."

The President told the French people by radio and by leaflets that the American forces were going into their empire as friends, to repulse the cruel invaders who would remove forever your rights of self-government, your rights to religious freedom and your rights to live your own lives in peace and security. We assure you that once the menace of Germany and Italy is removed from you, we shall quit your territory at once—Do not obstruct this great purpose."

Lt. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Commander of the American forces in the European theatre, is commander in chief of the allied invasion force. Gen. Eisenhower, in a broadcast to "Frenchmen of North Africa, promised not to attack the French themselves, upon certain conditions. These conditions were specific and he repeated them many times in his broadcast.

Maj. Gen. Lewis M. Brereton's headquarters in Cairo reported November 7 that American fliers hot down 45 enemy planes against a loss of 6 of their own in the Middle East from October 1 to November 5. In addition, the announcement said, the U. S. fliers have seriously damaged an uncalculated number of tons of enemy shipping and knocked out a number of tanks and other motor vehicles.

Labor Secretary Perkins reported that between now and Decem-

ber 1, 1943, industry will need 4,500,000 additional workers, and of this number, 3,000,000 will be women. The Office of Defense Transportation said 180,000 women will get jobs in the 'traditionally male' transportation industry in the coming months. Agriculture Secretary Wickard said that success of the farm manpower program next year would depend to a considerable extent on the employment of more women and girls and older people on the country's farm.

War Manpower Chairman McNutt said that all major war production plants soon will be required to schedule their manpower requirements in the same manner they must now schedule needs for scarce raw materials. Official instructions and forms for bringing about the orderly withdrawal of workers from war industries for the armed forces are now available to war contractors and operators of essential civilian activities, he said. Federal labor inspectors will be assigned to the plants "to see that labor is being utilized properly," and those plants which fail to cooperate will be subject to "whatever sanctions there are available."

The WPB established the Controlled Materials Plan to boost war production through eliminations of all nonessential production. W. P. B. Vice Chairman Eberstadt will direct the plan which will adjust production schedules within material supply to meet production requirements. The plan will operate as follows: The WPB Requirement Committee will allot controlled materials (at first only carbon and allow steel, copper and aluminum) to the "claimant agencies"—Army, Navy, Maritime Commission, the Aircraft Scheduling Unit, Lend-Lease, Board of Economic Warfare and Office of Civilian Supply. The claimant agencies will then make allotments to prime contractors producing essential goods. The prime contractors will divide their allotments among subcontractors and suppliers.

Chairman Davis of the War Labor Board said the WLB, in stabilizing incomes less than \$5,000, "will act on the presumption that wage rates prevailing on September 15, 1942, are proper." The Board said "if a group of employees has received increases amounting to 15 per cent in their average straight-

time rates over the level prevailing on January 1, 1941, the Board will not grant further increases as a correction maladjustments. The wage rate inequalities and the gross inequities which may require adjustment under the stabilization program are those which represent manifest injustices that arise from unusual and unreasonable differences in wage rates."

The Office of Price Administration announced all passenger cars will be eligible for recapping services or for replacement tires under the national mileage program effective November 22, but motorists will be limited by quotas to be assigned to rationing boards. The grade of tire allowed in case recapping is impossible will be determined by the amount of mileage allowed applicants in their gas ration books.

Motorists asking more mileage than the basic ration must furnish specific, detailed information about their driving requirements on forms issued by OPA and available from November 12-15 at schoolhouses designated as registration sites. If the applicant's essential mileage is more than 150 miles a month, but less than 470, he will be issued a B book. Mileage of more than 470 miles will warrant a C book. Holders of C books must display stickers on their windshields indicating why they were granted extra gasoline.

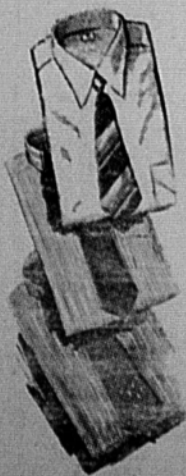
