The 10 per cent credit will result in an estimated saving of \$4,151 on fire insurance costs for Slaton policy holders during the next year. The estimate is based on fire insurance premium payments in 1942. A 15 per cent credit has been in effect for the past year.

The fire record for a city or town is determined by a fixed ratio between losses and premiums figured on a five-year average. The losses is 15 per cent.

Santa Fe CHIEF TOPICS

Railroad earnings "may look high, but that is only because they are better than those which the railroads have had in the past," James M. Souby, general solicitor of the Association of American Railroads declared before the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washigton today in continuing the tension of present rates.

"Because it has been so many years since railroads have had a chance to earn a fair return on the investment in their plant and equip ment," Mr. Souby stated, "some seem to have come to regard the fair returns as marking the upper limit to which railroads earnings may be allowed to go rather than the lower limit below which they may not be lawfully reduced by public regulation.

"One of the fundamental principles developed by the Commission early in its career and adhered to ever since," Mr. Souby con-The removal of the light signals tinued, "is the reasonableness of on the south side of the square and a rate must be measured by the results of its application over a not by its results during a brief and admittedly abnormal period."

"That is the situation we have undr rapidly changing conditions Indeed, the conditions of 1942 with their alleged opulence for railroads have already ceased to exist. There was never a situation which more clearly called for the application of the Commission's settled rule that 'A reasonable rate is one that takes into account the lean and the fat years alike."

HITLER ONCE TRIED SUICIDE "PUTZI" HANFSTAENGL REVEALS

MANY predictions have been made that Adolf Hitler, Nazi Fuchrer, will commit suicide when his twisted mind realizes the hopelessness of his cause. Few, however, know that Hitler once raised a revolver to his head as he groaned, "Everything is ruined. I am going to end it all." A woman took the gun away from him. This occurred at the time of the abortive November Nazi putsch, before Hitler's rise to eminence as Germany's Fuchrer.

Other revealing incidents in the stormy career of the fanatical Fuchrer are likewise brought to light by a man who, for 14 years was Hitler's closest friend, Ernst "Putzi" Hanfstaengl. He used to soothe the emotional ex-house painter with his piano renditions of Wagner's compositions. Writing in the March issue of Cosmopolitan magazine, Hanfstaengl pens an intimate and clear picture of the Nazi leader and his sinister sycophants and their plans of world conquest.

Hanfstaengl fied Nazi Germany six years ago shortly after Hitler ordered him to Hitler's music room and directed him to play his own funeral march on the piano. Treachery, murder and intrigue was the pattern followed by the Nazi party under Hitler and other Nazi party leaders, Hanfstaengl relates. In fact, violent death occurred in Hitler's own residence when he discovered that his sweetheart had fallen in love with her Viennese voice teacher. The night she told Hitler she wanted to leave him she died from a bullet wound. The gun was Hitler's, but Hitler said she had killed herself. Hanfstaengl writes that a party leader who refused to accept the suicide explanation subsequently was murdered.

Tracing his association with Hitler from the night he first met him in 1923 to the evening he played his own funeral dirge at the Fuehrer's direction, Hanfstaengl outlines the history of the Nazi party's rise in Germany and Hitler's constant scheming for world power.

Throughout his article parade such personalities as Rudolf Hess, now a prisoner in England following his fantastic airplane flight from Germany where he was deputy Fuehrer

hatred of him dated from that moment, Strasser was later killed in the Nazi purge.

Hanfstaengl's differences with the party chieftains over Nazi policy forced him and Hitler farther apart.

"As I fell from favor, old friends who feared to talk came to me with stories of Nazi atrocities. I determined to have it out with Hitler. He seemed to sense something was wrong. He motioned me silently to the music room; his eyes were icy and remote. Inside he turned and stared at me for a long moment and then he pointed to the piano.

"Play your funeral march'," he said.

Sometime later Hanfstaengl was ordered on a mysterious mission by plane, Convinced this was to be his Nazi execution, he evaded his companions and fled to England.

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
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American Income Rises 19 Cents; Living Costs Up 10 Cents Over 1941

PURCHASING POWER NOVEMBER 1941 - NOVEMBER 1942



THE above chart, showing how the average American fared in national income changes in the last twelve months, is based on the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate of Minneapolis.

The American Public in November had a "real income" of \$1.19, or an increase of nineteen cents on the dollar over the same 1911 month. This "real income" is not a subtraction of cash income and expenditures but an average relative of these figures designed to show how living costs affect adjusted income dollars.

Cash income of the American public in November was \$1.31 for every \$1 a year earlier. This gain of thirty-one cents on the dollar resulted from the following changes per dollar: wages up forty-two cents, and salaries thirty-three cents on the dollar. Investment income at \$5 cents was down fifteen cents.

Rents in November were up one

Rents in November were up one cent over a year ago. Clothing was up eleven cents and food was up fifteer cents. Miscellaneous items were two cents higher than in November, 1941.


