# In Washington

By GEORGE MAHON The new Veterans Administra-tion Regional Office for West Texas with headquarters at Lubbock will mean much to West Texas veterans and their families. When General Omar Bradley, head of the Veterans Administration, announced last year that Texas veterans would be served by four regional offices, located at Houston, San Antonio, Waco and Dallas, I complained to him that West Texas veterans were being completely left out of the picture. 1 joined with the American Legion, the VFW and West Texas generally in the campaign for a West Texas Regional Office for West Texas veterans—an office similar to the ones located at Dallas, Waco, San Antonio and Houston. .

It is now assured that within 60 days such an office for West Texas, with headquarters at Lubbock, will be a going concern.

General Bradley's idea is to render service to the veteran at a point not too far removed from his home. IThose of us who handle Veterans Administration appropriations are supporting this plan.

The West Texas Regional Office should not be confused with sub offices and contact offices which the VA has established or will establish at a number of West Texas points to complete the service to veterans and cooperate with the County Service Officers now serv-

ing in most West Texas counties. The Amarillo area which had preytously been served by the VA, office in Muskogee, Oklahoma, will hereafter be served by the West Texas office at Lubbock. The El Paso area is slated to be taken from the jurisdiction of the office at Albuquerque, New Mexico. The plan is that all of Texas is to be under the overall supervision of

the Branch Office at Dallas. Now that the Veterans Administration has completed plans for Texas, my hope is that the service to veterans and their families may rapidly improve. The complications and difficulties are tremendous. General Bradley told our Committee on Appropriations a short time ago that he receives in the Washington Office an average of 125,-000 pieces of mail per day; that over the week-end in one instance, in excess of 300,000 pieces of mail were received here. Such a situation creates a bottleneck in the central office in Washington and makes imperative the success of the program of decentralization to the Branch and Regional Offices.
