## Cottonseed Oil Production Down

One hundred and thirty-five million pounds reduction in cottonseed oil production during the first seven months of this season, compared with a year ago, is one reason that the President's relief committee had to urge Americans to reduce fats and oils consumption by 20 per cent. A. L. Ward, educational director, National Cottonseed Products Association, points out.

"Cottonseed oil production" figures released by the Bureau of Census, following the appeal for reduced fats consumption, clearly show the critical need for increased cotton production in 1946 to supply cottonseed oil as well as cottonseed feed products to produce meat and animal fats," Ward said.

Cotton is a leading source of vegetable oil, ranking with lard and butter as a cooking and food fat, but reduced cotton acreage and production in 1945 curtailed supplies of both cottonseed oil and cottonseed feed products.

"For most Cotton Belt farms, cotton is the only source, or most dependable source, of vegetable oil and protein concentrate feed, and these farms can make their greatest contribution to the world-wide food and feed need by producing more cotton in 1946," he emphasized.

"Planted on good land, as the hub of a balance farming and livestock program, and produced with the higher yields per acre that can be achieved by following the 7-point program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and State Extension Services, cotton can do more in 1946 to relieve the food and feed situation than any other one crop Southern farmers can grow," Ward added.

**NEW ROAD METHODS TO BE DEMONSTRATED**

County officials of Texas, always beset with road-building problems, will witness an actual demonstration of low-cost, mixed-in-place asphalt as a feature of the second annual Conference of County officials to be held at Texas A. & M. College March 20-22.

During one afternoon of the conference, jointly sponsored by the college and the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, a half-mile stretch of cross-campus road will be paved under the supervision of District Engineer John Blair of Bryan with the cooperation of the Brazos County Commissioners Court.

The mixed-in-place method of paving eliminates the cost of mixing asphalt and transporting it from a remote point, according to the college civil engineering department, whose Professor J. A. Orr is director of the conference. The road merely is graded, asphalt

sprayed on from a tank truck, and then the gravel pushed onto the road shoulders is graded back on to the asphalt, mixing the two components in place. Traffic is then allowed on the road to pack the surface, eliminating rolling, and later a seal coat is applied.

Besides road-building, the county officials will hear discussions on stabilization of soils, soil con-

servation, the public land system, and tax delinquencies, presented by state officials and college authorities.

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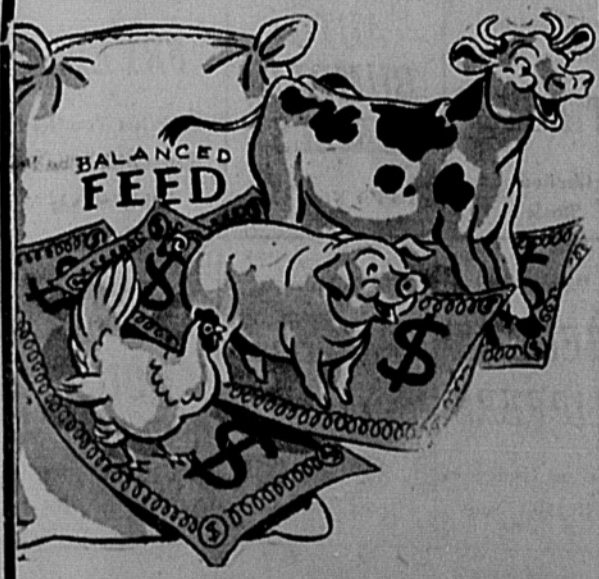

**Shelter**

ONE THING a lot of people need acutely is shelter. Shortages of building materials and the scarcity of skilled workmen have combined to make housing about the rarest commodity in common use. It is an every-day necessity, too. People have to have a place to live and they will pay whatever it costs to get in out of the weather, or they will take what shelter they can afford.

Comes now proposed legislation to protect home buyers and home builders from inflation, by governmental controls. Administration of rulings always brings delay, and more delay. Now we need housing, and more housing. Natural, competitive safeguards will provide better protection against inflation than rulings, as certainly as sturdy walls will keep out more cold than red tape.

Bid for STRATEGY now is to Power fix ceiling prices on residential property, new and old, to allocate building materials and regulate the transfer of new real estate. Allocating materials means giving somebody a right to say who can build and who can't. A crafty "co-ordinator" with such authority could soon have a great many fellow citizens doing his bidding. America needs a V-B Day on bureaus.

Ceiling prices on old residential property is an absurd idea. There is nobody in my state able to umpire the transfer of old homes in my town, much less yours. Such laws are only made

to break. A legal ceiling on new-home prices might be easy to express in a mathematical curve but its result would be bad. It would tend to cheapen construction and encourage jerry-building. Demand CLAMPING down on Urgent the sale of vacant lots would surely be wrong in point of expedience. It would kill much precious time. Service men are coming home now, not after next year. They want places to live, no later than they can get wife and baby out of the in-laws' spare room. They are entitled to a home and ought to have it as fast as their local builder can meet their needs.

I don't want to see today's new home makers (most of all service men) pay three prices for houses, but natural competition among builders would prevent it if they could get materials. Paying a premium for promptness in a time of emergency is a trivial matter compared to the "highway robbery" we are courting in shoddy houses, built cheaply to sell under a ceiling.

Government's moral obligations to home-seeking service men are three: (1) Help builders get good building materials quickly to make suitable, small homes, (2) Begin no public works to busy the building trades until the home need is relieved, (3) See that mortgage money is not carelessly thrown around. Bank loans ought to be easy on well-built houses and impossible on poor ones.

**TECH GRADUATE WILL GIVE BACCALAUREATE**

For the first time in the 20-year history of Texas Technological College one of its own graduates will preach the baccalaureate sermon to members of the 1946 graduating class. Rev. Kenneth R. Hemphill, pastor of the First Methodist Church of McAllen, will preach the sermon, according to Dr. W. M. Whyburn, Tech president.

**SOCIAL SECURITY MAN COMING HERE MONTHLY**

John Palmer, Social Security Board representative, will be in Slaton at the U. S. Post Office at 4 p. m. Wednesday, April 3, 1946. He is in Slaton one day each month for the purpose of answering any questions people may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who may be entitled to benefits; and of taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

If you reach 65 and aren't eligible for old-age and survivors insurance benefits, the nearest office of the Social Security Board will tell you how much longer you have to work to be insured. However, you don't have to keep on working, sick or well. There is another program for folks under the Social Security Act. It is called old-age assistance. Under that program folks 65 or over, who either because they didn't work in covered jobs long enough, or because they couldn't work at all — can get monthly payments if they are in need.

Far be it from me to infer that a job on a newspaper, where one must read proof, chase advertising, write news stories and go most of the time as if the devil were after him with a pitchfork, is the kind of a job I would recommend to a young man. But there are a few folks who are afflicted with the desire to write just like folks who have a musical talent regardless of everything they must create music even if it comes from blowing through a comb and those kind of folks will be either writers or musicians. 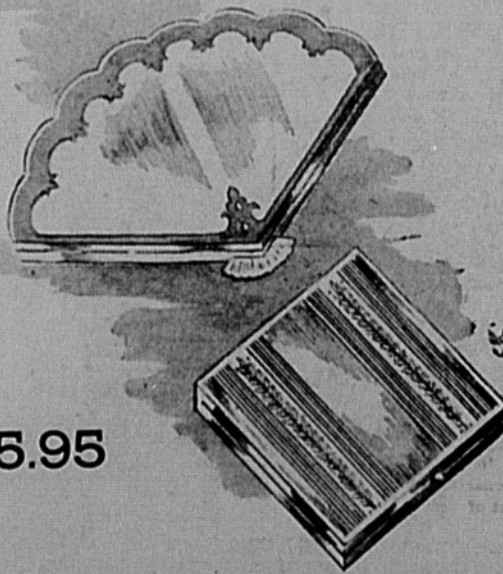

**Phillips Plans Much Expansion**

In 1945 the total gross income of Phillips Petroleum Company from operations amounted to \$213,739,522, nearly \$10,000,000 more than in 1944. In addition there was non-recurring other income of \$14,128,814 derived from the sale of assets. Charges for reserves and retirements amounted to \$47,416,846 equal to \$9.64 per share. After taxes and all other charges and substantially accelerated reserves, net income was \$22,571,509, or \$4.59 a share. Capital expenditures during the year amounted to \$61,200,000 and gross investment in properties at the end of the year was \$495,605,493. Reserves accumulated for depreciation and depletion of these assets were \$272,906,946 or 55 per cent.

A record total of 670 wells were completed during the year, 544 of which were commercial producers. Of this number, 81 were exploratory test wells which resulted in the discovery of 12 new oil pools and 8 new gas areas, a 25 per cent ratio of success as compared with 16 per cent for the industry as a whole.

With these new discoveries and other developments, the company's estimated total reserves of raw materials are larger than at any previous time. New reserves were found mainly in West Texas, the Texas Gulf Coast, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Colorado.

Net crude oil production was increased to an average of 93,762 barrels a day or 15,663 net barrels a day more than in 1944.

Exploration and development work, aimed at acquiring supplementary low cost reserves of raw materials, is being conducted in Venezuela, Columbia, and Canada. Exploration or development rights on 869,603 acres are held in eastern Venezuela, and company owned rotary rigs are now drilling the first test wells.

The average price received from sales of natural gas was 13 per cent higher than in 1944. This and

increased volume brought total gas sales value up 53 per cent.

Contracts with El Paso Natural Gas Company provide for the long term sale of a large volume of gas for delivery to California. The company has entered into similar contracts with Michigan-Wisconsin Pipe Line Company for deliveries to Wisconsin, Michigan and other markets. Both contracts are subject to approval by the proper governmental agencies.

Sales of gas to carbon black plants increased materially, and capacity of the company's Phil-black plant was raised from 44,000,000 pounds to 60,000,000 pounds annually.

Recent additions to the large government butadiene plant, operated by the company, will further increase output of this important component of synthetic rubber. A new record total of 1,850,000-

000 gallons of finished products sold was established in 1945.

# In Washington

By GEORGE MAHON

An intelligent national effort to do something about preventing and curing mental diseases has been long overdue. A few days ago the House passed a little-noticed bill on the subject which should prove to be of far reaching importance.

We provided for the creation within the Public Health Service of the National Institute of Mental Health. The institute will devote its efforts to study and research in the field of mental disease and to a program of cooperation with the states and with public and private hospitals and institutions.

The mentally ill have been confined in public and private institutions, but no determined and sustained great national effort has ever been made to find the cure for mental illness and to discover methods of prevention. The emphasis should be upon a cure for mental patients, and not merely upon confinement in institutions as too often has been the case in the past.

Here are some of the striking facts. More than one-third of all hospital beds in America are occupied by mental patients. The American people, through public and private channels, are spending about a quarter billion dollars annually to care for mental patients, but only a small fraction of that amount is being spent for research in the field of prevention and cure.

During World War II, 1,750,000 men were rejected for military service because of mental illness. Members of the medical profession have pointed out that medical colleges in the past have placed inadequate emphasis on subjects having to do with mental illness;

there is a scarcity of specialists in this field of medical science.

The bill is endorsed by outstanding members of the medical profession and by the American Medical Association, the American Legion and numerous organizations. The medical profession and those of us who oppose so-called socialized medicine feel that the bill is in keeping with the best American medical traditions.

It is felt that the Senate will agree with the House, pass the bill and send it to the President for his approval.

The U. S. House of Representatives is more economy minded than the Senate, if we can take as a guide the first annual appropriation for government agencies to be finally approved this year. The bill provides funds for various independent agencies of the government—19 in number—such as the Interstate Commerce Commission, Tariff Commission, Federal Trade Commission and Civil Service Commission. It was passed by the House several weeks ago and sent to the Senate. The Senate adopted 30 amendments to the bill. Of the 30 amendments adopted by the Senate, only two of them provided for a reduction below the figures agreed upon in the House. The other amendments provided for increases or changes in language.

The final draft of the bill has now cleared both Houses and the approval of the President is expected next week. The bill provides for 45 million dollars less money than was requested by the agencies involved.

### HOW BEST TO CONTROL WEEDS ON THE FARM

Sweep plowing in weed eradication experiments at Texas Technological College proved favorable to West Texas conditions, Cecil Ayers, assistant professor of agronomy in the Agriculture Division, has announced.

Ayers said road ditches have been leveled so that they can be plowed and plowing is done by sweeps so underground stems may be worked to the surface and pulled out. The ditches and turnrows are seeded to barley, wheat or rye in the fall to prevent wind erosion.

Weed eradication tests have been carried on at Tech for four years with emphasis on cultural methods, as well as chemical spraying and soil treatment. Ayers said that spraying with chemicals is too expensive in the case of Johnson grass.

The experiments include careful study of plants at varied stages of growth to learn more of development and growth to facilitate eradication. Tests have shown:

Small, scattered bunches of weeds may be controlled by use of salt, one pound per square foot, or use of sodium chlorate, three pounds per square rod, but salt "kills" the soil for several years and sodium chlorate "kills" it for a year or two. In this test heavy

infestation in fields are summer fallowed or planted to oats or barley and are plowed every two weeks in the summer and early fall.

Sodium chlorate sprayed at the rate of one pound per gallon of water has been 80 to 90 per cent effective on Johnson grass in the boot stage of late summer or early fall.

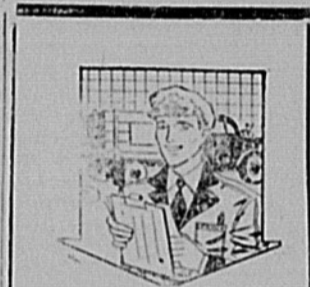
Dandelions, purple nightshades and annual weeds succumb to 2-4-D (2-4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid) used in spray, but Johnson grass is not killed in this method.

Oil treatments of various kinds will burn plant tops but only in the seedling stage, the tests show.

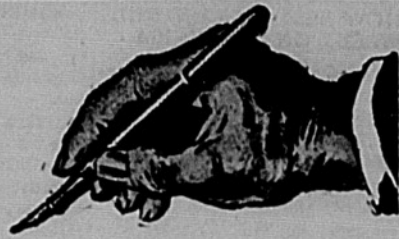

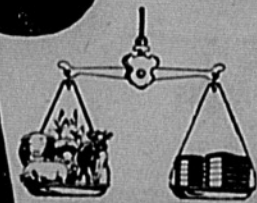

A license may be earned for doing official work with chickens by attending either the first or second week. During the third week official turkey training work will be done. Both written and practical field examinations will be given. A registration fee of \$10 will be charged for either two or three weeks attendance. The one week fee will be \$5. Meals and lodging will be available on the campus or nearby.

A special visitors day is being planned for Wednesday, July 10, and a number of outside speakers will appear on the program.

Registration should be made as early as possible, Mr. Parnell announced. Advance enrollment will be very beneficial to college officials in making plans for the short course. Additional information may be obtained by writing E. D. Parnell.

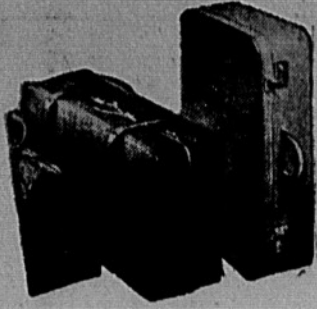

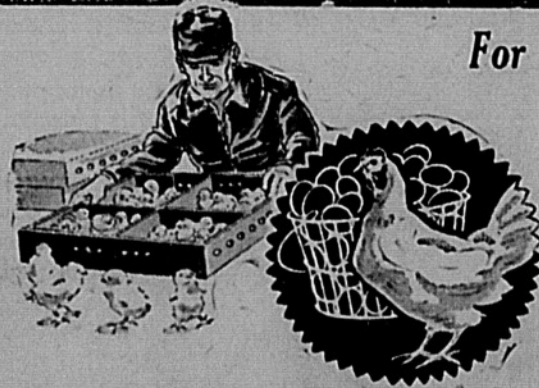
