



Lots of Nylons? Not Until 1947

Reasons for the continuing shortage of nylon hose are the facts that the country is depending almost exclusively on nylon to fill its needs, as the rayon formerly used for stockings is being used for clothing, and there is a lack of both machinery and skilled labor for the making of nylon and nylon hose, according to an article in the June issue of Cosmopolitan magazine which is based on an exhaustive investigation of the gylon situation.

Charges that the nylon hose

Charges that the nylon hose shortage resulted from hoarding by manufacturers who were holding them back for higher prices, or that it had been caused by manufacturers shipping them out of the country were found to be absolutely untrue in the investigation.

For the future, the picture is somewhat brighter, according to the article, which states in part:

"The entire industry is confident that it will still achieve its goal of thirty million dozen pairs of hose by the end of the year. Also it is confident that in 1947—with du Pont's capacity vastly increased, with a great deal of new machinery on hand and with new skills developed in labor—the production of tockings can reach a level which will insure abundant supplies."



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
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

WETTABLE DDT RECOMMENDED

College Station, - Texas county gricultural agents have been adrised that for the present, the only reatment recommended by the Yexas A. and M. College Extenion service for the control of horn lies, lice and mosquitos on livestock in wetable DDT powder.

DDT for this purpose is now on the market in two very different forms, 1) dry, in wettable powier and 2) liquid, in oil or xylene olutions or emulsions. Both forms may be diluted with water for use as a spray or dip.

The decision to recommend only DDT in wettable powder form for use on livestock was made by a ommittee of entomologists and animal husbandmen who checked aliknown sources of information. The group will make further recmmendations as research on DDT goes on.

The committee pointed out that DDT in wettable powder goes into suspension when diluted with wa fer for use as a spray or dip. There was no evidence that it was harmful to animals even if used at strength somewhat greater than that recommended by the manufacturer.

It was further reported that DDT in oil solution or emulsion form does not remain in suspen sion but goes into a true solution. When applied to animals in this form it can be absorbed through the animal's skin. If the solution is used as a spray or dip at less than the manufactor's recommend ed strength, it may not give effective or lasting control. If it is used at more than the recommended INCREASE IN TEXAS strenght and if the precautions listed by the manufacturer are not exactly followed, it may have tox-

College Station, - Texas now has 403 frozen food locker plants in operation in comparsion with 268 eleven months ago, an increase of 33per cent in less than a year. A recent survey by the BAE's Texas Agr.cultural statistics showed that 46 of this number are cooperatives, including 26 k.J. coops. Five of the number are branch plants serviced by central systems.

Roy Snyder, Extension meat specialist who also supervises a frozen food locker for the Texas A. and M. College, observes several other trends in the locker business besides a rapid expansion in num-

For one thing, a large number of locker systems have ben installing their own small killing plants or abatoirs.

For the last few years, frozen food plants have been in their heyand rationing increased the popularity of the family locker, Snyder believes. He predicts that as fresh foods become more plentiful, city people are more likely to drop out as customers, buying custom frozen foods in stores rather than processing their own.

As far as technique is concerned great changes likely are in store n the processing of frozen food. Enzymes, which effect the ripening of fruits and vegetables have en inactivated in the past by steam or boiling water. In the future, they might be inactivated electronically, and thawing may be done the same way. Flash sterilization also may be a new devel pment in the frozen food field, Snyder believes.

A great deal of research remains to be done on the use of salts and seasonings in saurage and other ground meats, and in determining the best kinds of wrappers and containers for frozen foods. A. and M. research workers are investigating both these problems, Snyder



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

While some still cling to the 'idea of breaking in a swimmer with water wings or an inflated tube, Mr. Borodkin believes their use promotes false confidence. Teach them to swim in shallow water, he says, and they won't need water wings.

He also contends that exposure to the sun can be as dangerous as carclessness in the water. "Too many people take a look at the bronze-skinned life guard," Mr. Borodkin said, "and expect to come home the first day with a coat of tan like his."

Take the sun in small doses at first, is his expert advice. And protect the skin by applying a suntan lotion before exposure. Generous use of a bottle of suntan oil will avoid a painful suntannial time.

Here are some of Mr. Borodkin's rules for safe swimming at the beach, the pond or the pool:

Swim in protected areas.

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
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

The veterans administration Lubbock regional office, under the management of Robert W. Sisson, swung into action this week in its temporary location at Lubbock Army Air Field. While some divisions are not completely organized as yet, all are reported to be in operation.

The Lubbock regional office is composed of ten major divisions as follows: adjudication, vocational rehabitation and education, contact, medical, supply, communication of disability, prewar occupa-tion, vocational handicap and menloan guarantee, and personal.

In addition to the manager and assistant manager the organization

It is responsible for the preparation and adjudication of all claims for disability and death cases, evaluaor pension and determining eligibility to hospitalization. Their duty is to determine service connection in disability and death sases, evaluatal status of claimants and beneficaries.

HENS MUST LAY OVER DOZEN EGGS MONTHLY

Any hen laying less than a doz in eggs a month is losing money for her owner, considering prevailing prices of feed and eggs. These inefficient hens should be culled from laying flocks, the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service is advising farm families and backyard poultry raisers of

A hen consumes about five pounds of feed per month even though she is not laying, so further reduction of laying flocks is being sought by the government in view of the current feed shortage. For the nation as a whole, the reduction sought is one of every seven hens.

According to Sam Moore, Extension poultry specialists, most Texas flocks could lose one of every seven hens, and with proper culling profits would increase. Until recently, he says, Texas egg production this year has exceeded last year's for the same period, although the state has reduced its poultry population to or below pre-war numbers. This indicates a rise in production per bird.

While chick production this spring was 20 per cent less than last year with good management average number of pullets should go into production on Texas farms this fall, Moore says. He indicates that there are large amounts of shell eggs and poultry meat in storage and the demand for fresh eggs has been good this



Let's Review

EDUCATION, or the lack of it, gets blamed for about all the world's ills. It is pretty generally agreed that the peoples of Earth need teaching, or perhaps re-teaching. Moreover it is not much trouble in any company to start a free-for-all discussion about the science of education. In fact there are some who insist that teaching is an art and not a science at all.

George William Curtis once wrote: "While good men sit at home, not knowing that there's anything to be done, nor caring to know, half persuaded that this republic is the contemptible rule of a mob and secretly longing for some splendid and vigorous despotism . . remember that it is not a government mastered by ignorance; it is a government betrayed by intelligence."

Study SCHOOLING actually What? does not help people much unless it makes better neighbors of them. It should, by all means, train them to engage in activities with other people, for the benefit of all. Teday this is clearly the most essential feature of education because people who don't understand cooperation are being led by the nose straight through collectivism to dictatorship.

We have a sad state of affairs indeed when intelligent people realize that things are taking place which they suspect are very bad for the country, yet fail to take a hand in remedying mat-

ters. Preserving the personal liberty of all people ought to be every man's personal duty. Those who have been without freedom consider its safety a high moral obligation.

Stay SOME men have deep Free learning in fields that do not embrace history, government or economics. Others have gained far-flung knowledge without sensing the duties of cit-izenship or any obligation toward other people. Curtis' long life ended before this century began but he saw the political dangers of this day with amazing clear-enses: "Bærayed by intelligence," he said.

The notion that a nation may be governed, not by a ruler but by the people themselves, was not raw new in Mr. Curtis' time. Our own republic was hardly half as old as now when he began writing for *Harper's Monthly.* Otherwise he had all the examples we have. One big difference in his generation and ours is this: They still appreciated their freedom.

Some commentators crusade for penetrating study in narrow fields of learning while others advocate wider browsing ranges. Consolidating our recent scientific gains and preserving our freedom is, however, our No. 1 problem. Our vital classroom need is a refresher course in comparative welfare. Who, when and where have people lived best? Assuer: We, right here in the U.S.A.


