What effect this atomic energy will have on the future of the American navy as to ship construction and operations now, however, lies in the laps of the military evaluation board and the President's atomic energy commission, both of

We can only hope that medical scientists and other scientists here for observation will glean from peace-time application which can bring benefits, and not destruction, from this new war-born source of energy.





#### DISEASE MAY STEM FROM POOR FEEDING

Chickens which feed on a ration lacking one or more of of the essential food elements not only produce fewer eggs but may develop a nutritional deficiency disease. Good flock health requires a balanced diet which in cludes adequate amounts of minerals, vitamins, proteins, carbohydrates and

#### PLENTY OF MASH

A bird which consumes plenty of mash is getting nearly all of the nutrients needed to meet bodily requirements Thus it is extremely important that enough mash be made available in the feeders. Grains supply ample carbohydrates and fats, but sometimes chickens may overeat at the grain hopper and as a result do not consume enough mash to bal-ance out the diet with other essential food elements, lacking in grain.

Protein deficiency causes retarded growth and feather development in chicks as well as low egg production in adult

Two of the most common deficiency disease-rickets and slipped tendon-result from inadequate consumption of vitamins or minerals, or a combination of both.

Feeding, Parasites, Crowding

A bird which develops symptoms of a nutritional defic cy disease may have reached condition in one of several

s. Incorrect feeding meth-often discourage or prebirds from getting the food they need. Birds heavily infected with parasites do not utilize feed efficiently, and often fail to eat enough. A crowded poultry house may cause poor feeding for some

To avoid these diseases, you should feed your birds carefully and watch closely the rate of consumption. When appetites lag use any of the recognized methods of improving the appetites and encouraging full feed. Provide plenty of feeding space. Keep the birds as free as possible of infectious diseases and parasites by keeping the house and equipment sanitary. Give the flock plenty of mash or otherwise make sure that every required food element is present in the ration the birds receive. To avoid these diseases, you

#### Texas Traffic Deaths Increasing

Texas traffic deaths jumped 47 er cent in the first six months of this year compared to the same period last year, N. K. Woerner, chief statistician of the Department of Public Safety, announced

The six-month toll was: Killed, 874; Injured, 30,346; Economic loss; \$26,141,075.

Tels compared with 594 killed and 20,790 injured in the previous

"The increase continues to be greater with each succeeding menth," Woerner pointed out.

Most dangerous today are highways and the small towns through which motorists are prone to pass .. high speed, Highway fatalities are up 66 per cent. Towns of 2,500 r less population recorded a gain of 70 per cent.

Most such towns have little or no traffic policing, and enforcement on the highways is grossly inadequate because the Texas Highway Patrol's 125 cars are imited to 100 miles a day by depleted funds, Woerner said.

In the cities, with increasing emphasis on safety programs and scattered additions to police personel, the increase was only 22 per cent.

The pedestrian continues to be the number one target of death in city traffic, Woerner pointed out. For the entire state, 217 pedestrians were killed in the half-year, and a 1946 total of 485 was predicted.


