feed so that none of it is available to the sparrows and pigeons. Spillage must be avoided.

Destroy Nests. Eggs During the nesting season it is a good idea to either desthoy the sparrow and pigeon eggs or to remove the nests, repeating this procedure at intervals of about ten days. The use of firearms against the birds is sometimes very effective, not because you can expect to eliminate every pigeon and sparrow on your farm in such a manner, but because these birds usually are quick to detect danger and will move elsewhere if the shooting is continued for a long enough period.

Poisoned baits are frequently used where the law allows such a practice. However when poison is administered, it must be placed on roof tops or in he placed on roof tops or in some other place where it will be out of the reach of poultry. In addition it should never be distributed where the favored cies of birds are likely to ick it up.
