The new bonds, if issued, would draw 215 and 3 per cent interest. bbage Source or Vitamin C

periments carried on by workers at the Vegetable Breeding Labora-tory in Charleston, S. C., have brought out some interesting facts concerning the important vitamin C content of cabbage, according to Miss Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the Texas A. and M. College Extension

As the season becomes cooler, more vitamin C is produced about the core of cabbages, while in the warmer months the vitamins accumulate more rapidly in the out-side leaves. Hence housewives who throw away the outside leaves of May cabbages, lose a great deal of the important vitamin C content of the cabbage, says Miss

The same is true of the other vitamins found in cabbage. Vitamin B1, or thiamine, and B2 are present in small quantities, and they follow the same procedure as

Miss Lawrence suggests eating cabbage raw or cooked slightly as long cooking destroys food value. She says housewives should remember that vitamin C cannot be stored in the body and should be

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

Legislatures and Conventions Take a Hand

The legislatures of Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, and other southern states adopted resolutions arguing the right of the United States to annex Texas and declaring annexation necessary in order to prevent England from gaining control of the province and using it as a base from which to work against slavery in the United States. Indiana, Massachusetts, and other northern legislatures protested emphatically against an-

The Whig State Convention of Connecticut adopted a resolution in the fall of 1843 that gave great offense in the South. It resolved, "that the annexation of the Republic of Texas, a foreign and independent state, to our union will be a most palpable and fla-grant infraction of the Constitution of the United States, alike inconsistent with the healthful administration of the government and dangerous to our liberties, and must inevitably break up and destroy our glorious union."



Inventions INVENTION is the Make Jobs spark of creative thought. It was during America's era of invention that the people of the United States rose up industrially and climbed to the top of the world, in wealth, in education, in health and in living standards. Inventions increase employment, boost wages and shorten working hours. Inventions create infinitely more jobs than they destroy.

F. O. Richey of Cleveland, Ohio, one of the nation's distin-guished patent attorneys, in-formed me recently that the his-tory of invention divides natur-ally into four periods: (1) Be-fore the 17th Century when there

Eventful AMERICA'S era of inCentury vention covered more
than a century back of
1933, a period with Ben Franklin
at one end and Thomas Edison at
the other, in which Chief Justice
John Marshall stood out for fair
use of the patent system. Those
were the years when inventions
and their scientific development
were profitable to men of intellect
— schools of engineering and
chemistry flourished.

The Latin who called Necessity

The Latin who called Necessity the mother of Invention was wrong. Necessity makes people improvise; Invention springs from love of achievement and hope of reward for good ideas. Among Europeans, the Swiss have the most freedom and lead in inventions. The Chinese, having no hope of reward, invent little. In America, our Patent Office safeguarded the reward in the 19th Century.

In the last dozen years, how-

In the last dozen years, however, the U. S. patent system has been the target of much verbal attack. Holders of patents are pointed at as if they had stolen something. Moreover the rewards, that come (by nature suddenly) to inventors, are twisted from them by taxation. What is the result? Inventors are not inventing. Must America's creative spark be quenched, or may her inventors be rewarded?





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
