KEEP A FLOCK RECORD SYSTEM

One of the best ways to cut costs

One of the best ways to cut costs and avoid unnecessary expense in the management of a laying flock is to use a flock record system. If you do not already have one, why not start such a system now?

A simple bookkeeping system will suffice. About the only requirements are that your figuring is accurate and that entries are kept up to date to avoid the omission of certain items.

Cut Production Costs Cut Production Costs

By keeping daily records, the poultryman not only is able to see how much money his flock is making, but also, by studying the record, he can probably visualize more easily how production costs could be reduced and how he should plan for the future. Flockowners who keep no records run the risk of letting their expenses get out of hand.

Another item is bird mortality— and this presents the greatest op-portunity for boosting profits. Mor-tality of 15 per cent is considered about the average in many sections. Do what you can to keep egg production from falling, and establish a system for handling and storing eggs; in such a way as to maintain the highest possible quality between the time they are laid and when they are taken to market.
