This drug, when used as soon as the early cold symptoms appear, hastens re covery of affected birds—the dis eased fowl usually appear normal within 48 hours after treatment has been started. 



ORDINANCE NO. 109

AN ORDINANCE PRESCRIBING THE PROCEDURE FOR CANDIDATES TO FILE FOR THE OF-FICE OF MAYOR, COMMISSION ER AND OTHER OFFICES FOR THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS: PROVIDING FOR ELECTION OF FICERS: PLACE AND MANNER OF HOLDING CITY ELECTIONS: PROVIDING FOR NOTICE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:

Sec. 1. All elections pertaining to municipal affairs shall be governed by the election laws of the State of Texas. In all city elections the mayor, City Secretary, or the City Commission shall do and perform each act in other elections required to be done performed respectively by the County Judge. perform each act in other elections required to be done performed respectively by the County Judge, the County Clerk, or the Commissioner's Court. In all city elections the Mayor, or if he fails to do so, the City Commission, shall order the election, give notice and appoint election officers to hold the election. Any eligible and qualifi ed person may have his name printed upon the official ballot as an independent candidate for the office of Mayor or Commissioner or other city office by filing his sworn application with the Mayor at least thirty (30) days prior to the election day. The application shall state the specific office or place being sought by the ap-plicant and that the applicant is eligible and qualified under the laws of the State of Texas to become a candidate for and hold the

office being sought, if elected.

All commemorative mail will be postmarked by the local post office at Chicago or Los Angeles, placed in emergency closed pouches and carried the entire distance of the train's first run for redistribution and delivery to the adressee. 


