

Recently developed and patented are an improved tunnel-ventilating system and a new type of tunnel sonstruction. The plan provides for dual purpose (pressure and exhaust) ventilating ducts over or alongside the roadway. 

Pictured here is a revolutionary method of shifting 10 tons of merchandise from a flat car to a motor-truck trailer in a transportation experiment now being conducted by the Illinois Central Railroad between Chicago and Memphis. The service coordinates rail and highway transport on a door-to-door basis through the use of an aluminum container and equipment developed by the Reynolds Metals Company. Two containers can be loaded on a standard flat car. Transfer from truck to car (and vice versa) can be handled by one man through mechanism built in the container, together with winch and ram device on the trailer.
