When Clem finished recolectin, I jis set back an mullin it over. "Seems to me he's right," I sez to me. "Folks right here in Slaton are the same way. Times has changed but people ain't. Folks want to be neighbors to other folks, but we ere sorta caught in a whirlpool o' economic demands we never asked fer. I wish I knew who started this here vicious cycle o' makin a spendin with narry a minute to be neighborly, but whoever he was, he ought to be hung by his little toes. He's plumb ruint life fer millions. Folks feel they gotta keep makin an a spendin er they hain't keeping up with everybody. An if they can't make it er buy it in Slaton they'll go sommers else 'thout battin an eye. They ain't thinkin 'bout all them kids an older folks that er countin on their support of our community projects, such as our schools what must be paid fer from taxes. An who pays them taxes? Folks in other towns don't fer shure. I'll swannie I jes get all riled up when I think 'bout hit. An another thing. Slaton folks like to have a fine band an good ball teams. An who pays fer em? I ain't heerd o' anybody sollicitin other towns to pay fer em."

We're all neighbors ain't we? We want to like each other, an work together fer a better town don't we? We jes ferget thats all. But if we jes remind each other ever spell er two an pitch in together, we kin have community spirit like we had when our pappies brung us west to God's country.

## Fire Works To Be At Buffalo

W. H. Rodgers, owner and operator of Buffalo Lakes, 9 miles southeast of Lubbock, announced that he has made arrangements for a more attractive display of fireworks to be shot over Buffalo Lakes this year than ever before. Over \$300.00 worth of fireworks will be shot from boats and other facilities at approximately 9 p. m., July 5th. One of the biggest advantages will be the view from the high banks of the canyon over the lake where the fireworks will be displayed. Convenient arrangements have been made so that there will be no great congestion of automobiles after the show is over.

Mr. Rodgers reported that there is a keen interest in the Fish Rodeo that is in progress at the Lakes, where 150 fish have been tagged and where those who catch the tagged fish are given cash prizes. Over \$5,000.00 is being offered in all in the contest. Fishing is better this year than any season since the lakes have been open to the public. Fishermen are catching their limit every day in bream. A large number of bass, catfish, crappie and buffalo are being caught each week.

A great many improvements have been made at the resort where a paved road has been completed around both of the lakes, providing one of the most scenic drives of any in this section of the state.

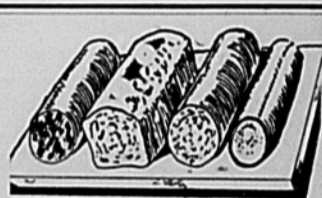

Another man is supposed to have driven his car to Colorado Springs and come home on the train, forgetting his car in that city and now I have another absent-minded man on my hands. Last week Ray Ayers asked me to go with him to a ball game, said he would be by for me and for me to be ready. He hasn't come yet, but he thought about it the next day. I've got him where he can't dodge from now on and I'm going to squeeze down. You may look for some big ads in the Slatonite from Ray C. Ayers & Son, or a lawsuit with Nat Heaton representing me. Nat said that I plainly have good grounds for legal action. He even phoned me and asked that I have him represent me, which is probably against the ethics of the law business. I'm looking any day now for some doctor to phone or even come around and solicit a job taking out my appendix, as that is about all that I have left that can be removed easily.

Have you ever visited Spradley's Upholstering Shop? A good many women, I am sure have done so, for I have been over there when several women have been in the work room and they were bossing the Spradley brothers around just like they do their husbands at home.

It is real interesting to see how they work things over. When a chair is to be covered, one of the Spradleys closes his eyes, grabs some material and cuts off a hunk, fills his mouth full of tacks and hammers them into place with no consideration at all for his fingers, where the tacks go nor the final outcome of it all, and when he gets through he has everything just right. In my only attempt to cover a piece of furniture I measured and fitted and wrestled and fought and sometime the chair was on top of me and sometime I had it down and when I got through it was pucker and blistered, the tacks were bent and the thing in a general mess, and my wife and I in a terrible mood. My fingers were bruised and I think it was during that time that I lost some of my front hair. If you want to see how such things can be done, drop in and see the Spradleys spit tacks, or come by my house and I'll show you my methods.

If P. G. Meading develops all of the pictures he has taken over town, all of the citizens in Slaton will have had their pictures taken along with a few stray dogs, cats

and some odds and ends of scenery. I have tried to horn in on several of them but P. G. points the thing away every time I have been able to get in the front row. He took a flock of them at the Rotary Club the other day, but if he got me into any of them they are from a rear view and I do not show up best from that direction.

As I have stated before, I had much rather live in a good small town than to live in a sorry large one. In fact, I'd rather live in a small town like Slaton than to live in any fast moving larger town.

There are a great many things that are most annoying in a larger town and one of the greatest annoyances to me are the parking meters. Personally, I see no benefit or any excuse for them except as a source of revenue for the city. Another thing, the traffic lights and traffic cops on the main streets do nothing much but snarl up traffic worse than if folks were fighting it out toe to toe and eye to eye. Here in Slaton we have fewer accidents per automobile than they do in Lubbock, Dallas and other large cities and here it is every man for himself. Even when we are confronted with three traffic lights we motorists know better than to depend upon the lights. The Jackson method is to keep watching the drivers of other cars; if it is a woman driving, watch her mouth, if it is gabbing, then stop or go into reverse for she is coming on. If a man driver is coming, watch his eye; if he is not looking straight ahead, stop! get out and try to climb a tree. If it is a Mexican coming, drive over to the wrong side of the street, for he'll side-swipe you if you don't.

It is a pleasure to drive in Slaton, but watch out for the motorists in Lubbock; they'll wham you.

While there are many trials for one who tries to raise fruits or vegetables in this section, it can be done occasionally. Folks who have lived in West Texas for a long time, tell me that one does well to average raising peaches or apricots once in every six years. If this is true, then there will be no peaches or apricots in this area for at least eighteen years, for we have had peaches on our trees for the past three years. Not just a few, but scads of them.

My sweet corn is beginning to ripen and I have planted some tomatoes, beans and I'm going to have myself a good old fashioned time of stuffing my tummy this

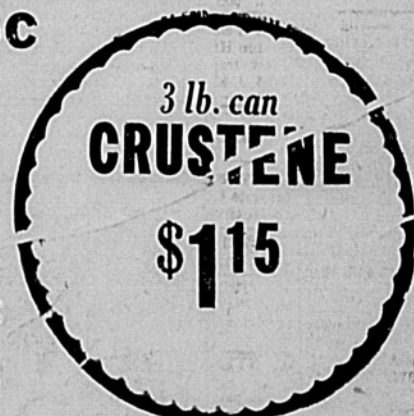

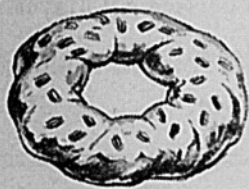

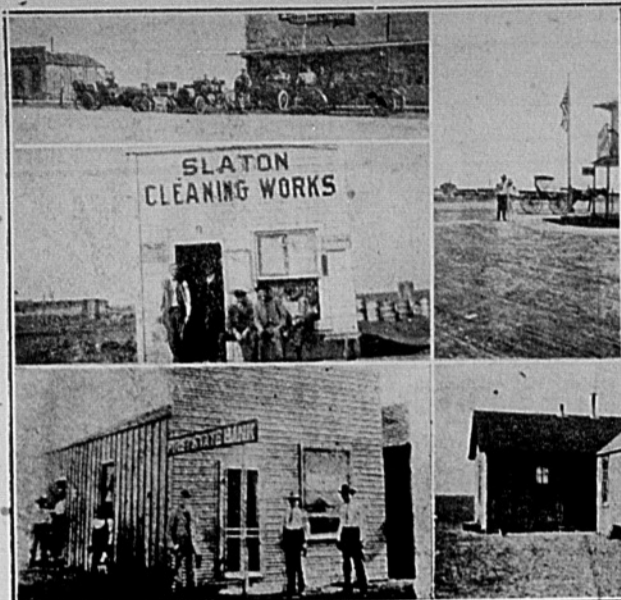

### Scenes In Slaton Thirty-Seven Years Ago

Thirty-seven years ago June 15, was Slaton's birthday. Above are shown the most important establishments of that young town. The Slatonite is indebted to Mr. J. S. Edwards for the information we have on the early days. The Slaton Cleaning Works was

owned by Mr. and Mrs. Merriweather. In front of the First State Bank are pictured Bill Knight, who was in the real estate business, Mr. Edwards, and P. E. Jordan, his cashier. In the window at the side is a man named Austin, and in the door is Dr. J. Foster Scott of Clovis, N. M., who had an interest in the original townsite, and Cash Ramey. The front of the bank was used as a townsite office. All the fixtures in the bank were hand made, they had an adding machine and a typewriter and used a bound ledger. It was very different from the bank here today with its modern posting and recording machines and loose leaf ledgers, said Mr. Edwards, but the principle is still the same, a well secured note was good then and is now.

In the door of the Slaton Post Office is Mrs. Higbee, whose husband was postmaster at that time. Top right is shown the modern conveyance of thirty-seven years ago, also evidence that Slaton was patriotic in that early day, and the gentleman and lady shown are thought to be Frank Boles and his sister. Mr. Boles owned some real estate here then. He now lives in Lubbock.

The scene at the top left we have been unable to identify. Evidently it is of a later date as some cars are pictured. Mr. Edwards tells us there were only two cars in the whole country at that time, one was a Buick owned by people named Bruner and the other was an air-cooled Franklin owned by Briggs Robertson who drove all over the country, killing a few cows, but having the time of his young life. Mr. Edwards bought Slaton's first Ford, a fine machine for \$420. It was kept well covered, used only on

special occasions for taking the wife driving. For every day use he drove the old horse and buggy.

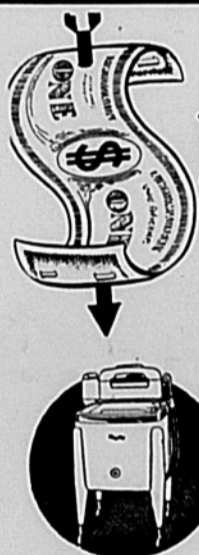

**Texas Tech Notes**

A surface irrigation method that will use up to 40 per cent less water is in experimental operation on the farm at Texas Technological College.

Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department and director of the project, said that a portable system of gated galvanized pipes replaces the commonly employed "ditch" method.

The new installation which is in fact a pioneering project for the southwestern region has been used this week in the college alfalfa fields, and is being placed in the cotton and feed fields this week.

Dr. Young said the surface pipe irrigation is estimated to save from 20 to 40 per cent of the water ordinarily lost in the ditch process.

It can be installed and maintained at about one-half the cost of the stationary concrete pipe system.

The process under trial now moves the water directly from the well through pipes to each row where individual gates are opened, allowing water to flow directly to the plants and plant areas.

Texas Tech football will be little affected by the new draft law. Players have taken advantage of provisions of the law by joining the national guard, naval reserve or ROTC to gain exemption, coaches of the Red Raiders said.

Almost half, or 20 to 42 men Coach Dell Morgan has planned using in varsity competition next fall, are within the age limits of the new draft bill. If all were to be called into service, Tech would be left with nine backs, four ends, five tackles, two guards and two centers, including eight men who do not figure high in Morgan's plans at this time.

A sizeable increase in enrollment of freshmen at Texas Technological college because of the new draft law is seen by Lt. Col. L. C. Adams, professor of military tactics and head of the college ROTC unit.

Colonel Adams points out that the draft bill gives deferment until the end of the school year to students enrolled in colleges and that participation in ROTC automatically defers prospective draftees.

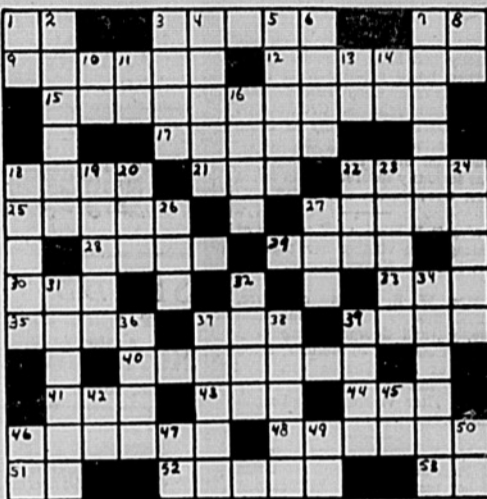

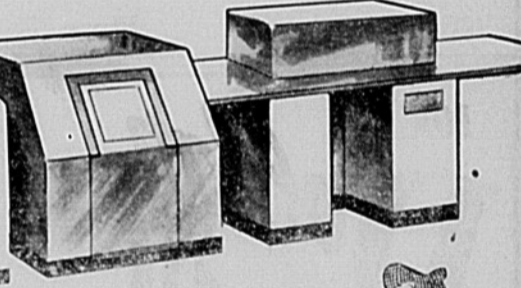
