Hollingsworth Is New Manager Here

Lewis Hollingsworth, who has replaced Pete Pearson as the local manager of the Southwestern Public Service Company is in active charge of the local affairs of this concern and expects to move his wife and three children to Slaton as soon as suitable living quarters are available.

Mr. Hollingsworth has been with the Southwestern Public Service Company since it absorbed the Texas and New Mexico Public Service Company several years ago in this line of business for the past ten years. He was employed at Floydada one year, at Seminole one year and for the past eight years in Lubbock. He is a young man who has had good experience in his line of work and comes to Slaton highly recommended by his employers.

Mr. Hollingsworth said that he will do everything within his power to help Slaton grow and to see to it that the people and business institutions in this area are served with all of power they need and that he is always glad to discuss power problems with any one desiring the use of it.

The Southwestern Public Service Company has greatly increased its investments in equipment and lines in this area and is in the process of construction on a 66000 volt line that will connect Slaton to a new supply at Brownfield via Tahoka and Post. When this line is completed it will give Slaton a second supply line of electricity where this section will not be dependent altogether on the Lubbock plant.

"Slaton is a fine town," said Mr. Hollingsworth, "and we expect to make it our home town."

Revivalist Says Many Need Aid

Traveling over 30,000 miles and preaching around 100 sermons, Jess Moody, 22 year old Wacoan and Baylor evangelist, accompanied by Bob Randall, a Waco musician, covered Britian, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Holland, Belgium, France, Italy, Switzerland and Newfoundland in a \$10,000 evangelistic tour that was financed by Baptists of Texas.

Just returned from four months in Europe, the young Baptist leader was ready to say the hope of the world rested in the strength of the pulpit and in Europe the pulpit is misused, often preaching Communism and atheistic doctrines. Europe is a powder keg; the gospel is the only hope.

Rev. Moody and Musician Bill Enette will hold meetings daily at the Baptist Church here beginning March 31.

Moody stated, "No matter what you hear to the contrary the people over there are starving." Just as 1200 calories a day is a deficit, so is the 600 Baptist missionaries in the world, especially in Christianity-starved, Communist-filled Europe. "I did not meet one Southern Baptist in Europe," he said. "Let me beg you, let me cry to you to help in establishing churches in Europe. We need churches. We need converts but there was no church to send them to." Contrasted to the almost non-existent Christian activities the youth leader said he believed that the Communists were the greatest missionaries in the world. Now is the time for Christians to act.

"I do not want to sound pessimistic," he explained, "but over there the people do not ask 'if' war is coming, but 'when'." More than 2,000 persons heard his message at a rally in Paris' mammoth hall, La Salle Playel, which was the largest non-Catholic meeting ever held in atheistic France.

He also spoke in Paris before 400 Communists in Le Cocq, the hall which was headquarters in the recent Paris strikes. At the close of the meeting 12 persons accepted Christ.

Exemplary of the gratitude of the people of Europe is this statement by a pastor there, "My church will not cease to reap from the Moody-Randall campaign until Jesus comes again."

In England, the youth have a terrible outlook on life: "What's the use; there's no hope; there may be no tomorrow." Rev. Moody says, "There is no doubt in my mind that if the people of Europe were exposed to Christianity and had the opportunity to see it practiced they would accept it."

MR. AND MRS. E. H. WARD ARE CALLED TO ROSWELL



New Sewer Lines Now Total 2,820 Ft.

City Secretary J. J. Maxey reports that the sewer extension between Lubbock and Garza Sts. has been completed, being 650 ft., at a cost of \$449.52. The City has also completed a short extension in the 800 block on 16th St., consisting of 280 ft. at a cost of \$176.00. Another block between 13th and 14th is under construction.

Since the beginning of this sewer extension project, 2,820 ft. of sewer lines have been constructed at a total cost of \$2,259.18, an average of 80c per foot.

Mr. Maxey also states that the engineering on W. Panhandle Ave. extension is nearing completion and the job will be started right away. The people on this street were once told that with the present system it would not be possible for them to have this service, but it is now thought that a successful way has been figured out.

 NEW TESTAMENT CONVERSION

Rom. 1:16 I Cor. 9:16 Gal. 1:18

What is conversion? Conversion is not a convulsion; it does not take place in a nightmare. Webster defines the verb "convert" as "to turn, or to change." Now for a Bible definition: "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out." (Acts 3:19.) In supplying the words "turn again" for "converted," as they appear in the Revised Version, we have the expression: "Repent ye therefore, and turn again, that your sins may be blotted out." Hence conversion is a turning; a turning from the service of sin to the service of Christ.

Just what part of the sinner is converted or changed? Unquestionably every part that has been alienated from God through sin. First, the sinner is away from God as respecting his heart. (Jeremiah 17:9.) The heart of the sinner is the workshop where all the evil thoughts and deeds originate. (Matthew 15:19.) Hence, the heart of the sinner must be converted, or changed. But how? By faith (Acts 15:9; Romans 10:10.) Thus by a change of heart we mean a change of affections . . . a change that destroys the love of sin and establishes the love of God in the heart of the sinner. But a change of heart alone is not the whole process of conversion.

Second, the sinner is away from God as respecting his life; he is alienated by "wicked works" (Colossians 1:21.) But how is the sinner's life converted or changed? By repentance (Acts 3:19.) Repentance is a change of will. (Matthew 21:28-29.) But a change of life is not the entirety of conversion.

Therefore, thirdly, the sinner is away from God as respecting his relationship to the world and to God. He must be brought into a new relationship with God, Christ and the Holy Spirit. This change of state brings a man into the kingdom of God (Colossians 1:13.) But what brings about this change? (Read Galatians 3:27.) The apostle here affirms that baptism is that act which puts one into Christ. The word "into" is a preposition that denotes action out of one state into another . . . from the without to the within. Previous to baptism one is out of Christ, after baptism he is in Christ.

There are no degrees in a state; one is either in or out of Christ, just as he is either married or unmarried, or just as he is a citizen or an alien. But this translation by baptism is null and void without being preceded by the change of life by repentance. Hence, Peter said to the convinced believers on Pentecost, who inquired "What shall we do?": Repent and be baptized every one of you." (Acts 2:38.) But both the change of relationship by baptism and the change of life by repentance are null and void without a change of heart by faith. (Hebrews 11:6.) Thus we can see that baptism is the dividing line between the world and the church of Jesus Christ. Yet some would declare that it is non-essential. The act of baptism is initiatory; it inducts him who is turned or converted in heart and life, into the kingdom of God.

Obviously, we have been able to see from this study that New Testament conversion involves a change of heart by faith; a change of life by repentance; and a change of state or relationship by baptism.



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Mahon Discusses Grain Sorghums



GEORGE MAHON

Recently I have discussed with Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson and other officials of the government the possibility of developing better markets for West Texas grain sorghums overseas. Our grain sorghums are now being utilized in many parts of the world.

India is our heaviest overseas consumer of grain sorghum, and the Indians pay cash for it and complain because they are not permitted to buy more. There is a quota system in operation which

governs all our shipments of grain aboard. Recently we were successful in getting an increase in the grain sorghum quota for overseas shipment.

Exports of grain sorghum to India during the last 9 months approximate 10 million bushels. This includes March shipments which are now enroute.

I am told that the Indians grind the grain and cook it pancake-fashion on top of the stove. In Germany the Germans eat their West Texas grain sorghum in the form of a mush or gruel. In Japan the grain sorghum is milled and used as flour or is polished and used in the whole grain as a substitute for rice.

Last year the U. S. production of grain sorghum was 107 million bushels, Texas producing 68 million bushels of that amount. The largest portion of the U. S. production will be utilized for stock feed but in excess of 4 million bushels will be used for human food in Japan, Korea, and Germany, in addition to the shipments to India.

A good price for grain sorghum is a very important factor in the maintenance of agricultural prosperity in West Texas. This is true despite the fact that grain sorghum production in the Nation is relatively small compared to the wheat and corn. Last year the U. S. produced 12 times more wheat and 22 times more corn than the grain sorghum production.

Milkmaids Were Safe

In 1798 Jenner found out why milkmaids did not catch smallpox; they had had cowpox, a closely related virus. Both viruses have been seen now under the electron microscope and they look alike. Cowpox virus is only feebly virulent in man, yet when used as a vaccine, it stirs up the forces of resistance latent in the body, after which the latter persists in the system as an aroused army of defense against any subsequent invasion of smallpox.

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
