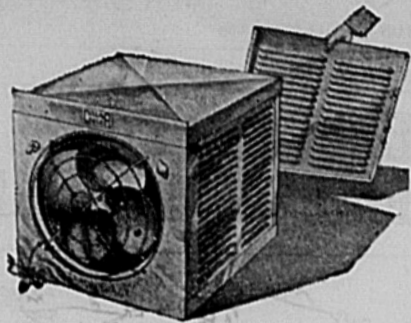


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Little Tail History

CHICK CHATS

FEW AWARE OF WORM PROBLEM

Intestinal worms are a major problem in the poultry industry. There is hardly a flock in this country that is untouched by the worm problem. And yet the vast size of the worm menace is not well-recognized by many poultrymen.

SYMPTOMS VARY
It isn't easy to tell at a glance which birds of your flock are wormy. The outward signs of worm infection vary considerably. Birds with light infections may appear to be perfectly healthy; actually a fowl is little harmed by a few worms. However, if the worms are allowed to multiply, the host bird will soon show wormy symptoms. Common among these are stunted growth, emaciation, poor appetites, and ruffled feathers.

The commonest, most frequently seen worm in chickens is the large roundworm. This worm is common to every region where chickens are raised. The large roundworm reproduces amazingly—one female may lay 50 million eggs during her lifetime. The eggs are laid in the intestines of the host chicken. They pass out in the dropping and under favorable conditions they may become infectious within 10 to 16 days.

If a chicken picks up the infectious egg, the young worm within the shell hatches in the intestinal tract and begins development in the lining or wall of the intestine.

OTHER WORMS
Among other kinds of worms that are frequently found in poultry are several species of tapeworms. They range in size from those so tiny they can hardly be seen to the big fellow, 8 to 10 inches long.

The cecal worm is another intestinal worm which is of great economic importance. It is the carrier of the organism that causes blackhead in turkeys.

TEXAS TECH NOTES

Texas Technological College has the largest summer school enrollment this year in the history of the school, W. P. Clement, registrar, reports.

Enrollment this year reached 2,779 compared to 2,704 last year. This summer there are 1,650 veterans going to school compared to 1,245 last year.

Enlargement of infirmary service extended students of Texas Technological college will be realized by the opening of the fall semester Dr. E. R. Rose announces.

Installation of diathermy and physiotherapy equipment will be completed, and possibly X-ray service will be added, he said.

The staff has been enlarged from five to six registered nurses for next year, and from four to eight nurses aides. The clinic hours will be extended to 6 p. m., an hour longer every day, with the additional staff.

The Texas Tech gymnasium, in use since 1927, is being given a face-lifting in the summer program in which \$18,000 is being expended.

The last legislature set aside \$20,000 for improvement of the gymnasium. During the winter, a new floor was placed in the coach-

Mrs. Marshall was extended a leave of absence last year due to ill health, and was scheduled to resume teaching this summer. At the opening of summer school, she resigned permanently.

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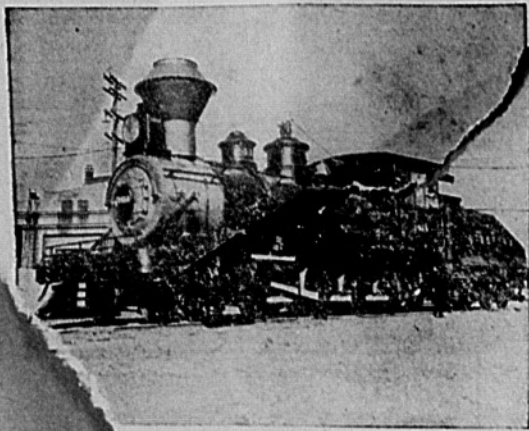

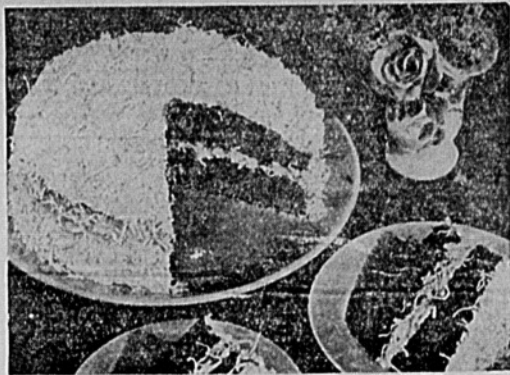

Black Magic Chocolate Cake

Ingredients:
 3 cups sifted cake flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 square unsweetened chocolate
 1 tablespoon butter or other shortening
 2 cups sugar
 2 egg yolks, unbeaten
 1 1/2 cups milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 teaspoon soda

Sift flour once, measure into sifter, add salt, and set sifter aside. Melt chocolate and shortening over hot water. Turn into mixing bowl or electric mixer bowl. Cool to room temperature. (This is important). Then add sugar and mix well. Mix together egg yolks and 1 cup of the milk; add to chocolate mixture and blend. Sift in flour, mix until all flour is dampened, then beat 1 minute at low speed of electric mixer or about 150 strokes by hand. Add vanilla and 1/2 cup more of the milk; stir until smooth. Dissolve soda in the remaining 1/2 cup milk. Stir into the batter quickly and thoroughly. (Batter will be thin).
 Turn into two 9-inch layer pans which have been lined on bottoms with paper, then greased. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Or bake in 13x9x2-inch pan 45 minutes, or until done. Frost as desired.
 Note: This cake may be mixed completely in a 2-quart double boiler. Melt the chocolate and shortening in a double boiler and cool to room temperature. Proceed with mixing as directed above, using double boiler instead of a bowl. Bake as directed above.

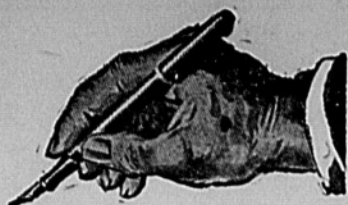

What They Write

Here is a letter received recently from China, written by Major Merle Garrigues to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Garrigues of Slaton. The Major served in China during the war and remained with the Armed Forces there after the war ended. He was joined by his family soon after the war ended.

"Nanking, China, May 31, 1948. Dear Mom and Pop,

"Well, we are real China Hands now. Last night we went to our first Chinese Opera or play. Professor and Mrs. Lee, our landlords, invited us to go with them to see the play about Hsu Hsi, the Empress Dowager who ruled China about sixty years ago.

"I don't know what was of the most interest to us the play itself or the audience. But I guess we will have to admit that the actors and actresses were about as good as you will find any place.

"The play started at 7:45, so we arrived at the theater about 7:30. The Professor had already picked up the tickets so I don't know how much they cost. We proceeded to march on down to the third row from the front where our seats were reserved. Of course, all the eyes in the theater were focussed on us since Helen and I were the only Americans in the theater. Well, we went on to our seats which turned out to be just a little bit better than an old stone park bench and were so close behind the row in front of us that we nearly had to sit with our knees doubled up under us.

As soon as we had been shown our seats, some ushers came up with the usual glass of hot flower tea that is served wherever two or more Chinese are gathered. After he had deposited the glass of tea in a small wire frame on the seat in front of us, another usher came up with a large tray of candy, chewing gum, cookies, and watermelon

seeds. We bought four small packages of watermelon seeds and one package of gum from him. The gum cost \$120,000.00, (about 10c). I don't know how much the seeds were. Just then Mrs. Lee excused herself and went outside for something. She soon came back with several more packages of gum and some candy. She said that anyone is foolish to buy the stuff inside when you can go outside and get it for about half as much.

"By now we had started looking around in the theater and watching the way other people were acting. Well, strangely enough, they were doing exactly as we were doing, so we felt right at home. The building was leaking big drops of water in many different places because it was raining very hard. All the signs, advertisements, etc., were in Chinese characters, except for the letters 'W.C.' over a couple of doors. Helen wanted to know if that meant 'fire exit'. It doesn't. It means 'water closet' or rest room to us poor ignorant Americans. And under the 'W.C.' on one door was the Chinese character for woman and the character for man was printed on the other door.

"Now it was time for the curtain to go up so a big gong was hit, the lights were dimmed and up went the curtain. The costumes were of beautiful material and were exact duplicates of the costumes and clothing worn at that time. The props were not bad either, except that they had a little model of a late model car on one of the tables. Don't know if that was an oversight or what, because they certainly didn't have automobiles like that then. I suppose the thing that intrigued Helen more than anything else about their costumes was the shoes that the ladies wore. We had seen some in the museum at Peiping, but didn't think we

would ever see anyone wearing them. It was hard to see how they could balance themselves on them, but they certainly didn't seem to have any trouble doing it.

"Along about now, someone stands up in front of us and hollers to someone on the other side of the building and they talk back and forth for quite awhile perfectly oblivious to the acting going on on the stage. I suppose they were talking about their families and crops. No one seemed to pay any attention to them, so we soon forgot them, because just now some white object flew by in front of our faces and it turned out to be a hot wet towel that an usher had tossed to a man on the left of us. After wiping his face, hands and neck, he tossed the towel back to the usher. Sometimes they use deliciously scented towels for this refreshing act. And, of course, as the play is progressing all the time, Professor Lee is busy telling us what it is all about. Every time he tells us anything, all the people near us turn and watch and listen to him speaking English, instead of watching the play.

"Then at one time, during a very dramatic part in the play, there is a terrible noise right in the seat in front of us. But it turns out to be just the lady trying to bite off a big hunk of sugar cane. And after she did succeed in biting it off, she sounded just like someone would sound eating celery at a funeral. Of course we haven't been very quiet all this time either, because we are cracking the watermelon seeds between our teeth to get the goody out of the center. And at one time Helen suggested that I look down at the floor. It was just barely possible to see the floor through all the watermelon seeds, paper, chewed sugar cane, and no telling what else.

"All the time the play was going on, people would be getting up and leaving, and other people coming in, to mention nothing of the ushers shining flashlights all over the house into the eyes of the patrons to attract their attention to ask them if they would please pay for that towel they had just used or for the tea they had just drunk. Then they have to carry on a little conversation about how much it costs and why it is so high.

By this time we have sat through four acts, it's 11:45, the play is still going strong after four hours, and we are thinking all the time that should we ever be asked to sit on another wooden seat we would scream, so we decide to leave and just guess at the outcome

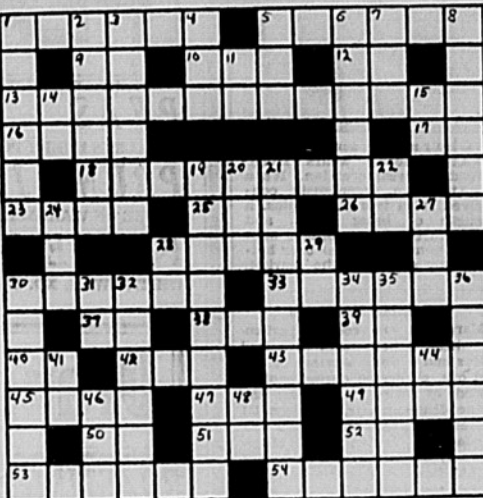

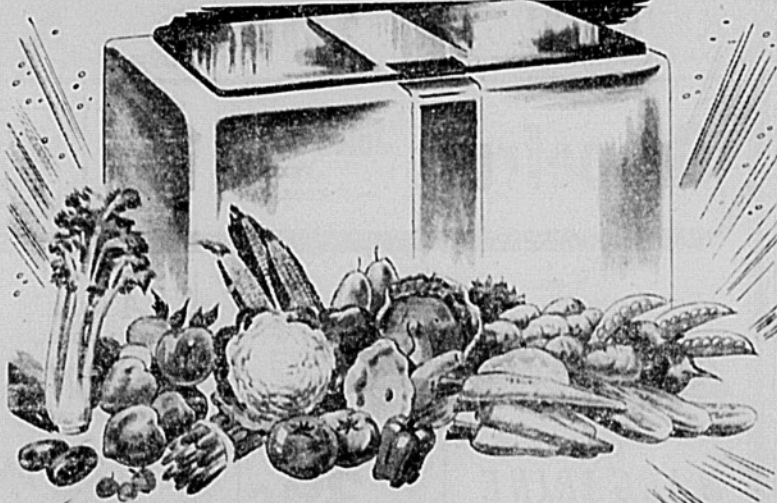
