West Texas Roundup

The total of the 1948-49 Level-land School Budget is just \$1,017,733.39, Business Manager O. R. Watkins revealed to The Herald this week. This nearly quadruples last year's expenditures, when the total school budget was only \$269,204.03, and is the largest total for school up-keep and operation yet reached in Levelland.

For the second time the Hockley County Herald won the best all-around weekly newspaper in West Texas cities of more than 2,000 given by the West Texas Press Association, which held its annual two-day meeting in Del Rio Friday and Saturday. The Herald won the same honor in 1946, thereby disqualifying the paper for the contest last year. A large number of outstanding newspapers are entered in the contest annually.

Fifty-three members of Company E entrained Sunday morning for Camp Hood where the boys will undergo intensive military training for two weeks. Lt. A. Sanchez, who operates a farm belonging to E. W. Williams north of Post, brought in Garza County's first 1948 bale of cotton to the Planter's Gin here Monday. The bale was not weighed as the gin is not yet in operation, the manager, Lee Davis, said.

The Post Chamber of Commerce in keeping with a custom established several years ago, will present a \$25 cash prize to Sanchez, the secretary said yesterday.

Congressman George Mahon recently informed the Midwest Electric Cooperative of Roby by wire that "REA advises approval of \$165,000 loan for 136 miles new lines and electric service. New lines in our district will be: Garza, 6; Borden, 9; Scurry, 45; and Stonewall, 2 miles." A copy of the telegram was sent to the Post Dispatch.

Jim Putty who lives on the Gladys Scales place in the Forrester community seems to have set a couple of records if not three Tuesday, when his first bale of 1948 cotton was ginned at the Forrester Gin. The bale was brought to town and placed on display at the courthouse square. As the bale has not been cut, the staple and grade has not been determined.

Slaton Swamps Brownfield Team

The initial home run was smacked far over the fence by J. Gray. Tillery led the hitting for Slaton with four doubles in six trips to the plate. BROTHER OF GEO. GREEN DIES IN OKLAHOMA

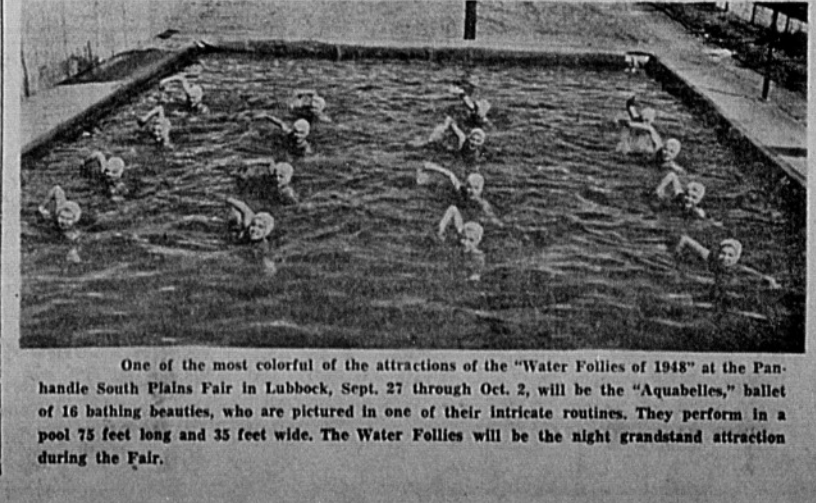

Getting Ready To House Birds

This is the time when many poultry raisers should be thinking about housing their birds for the fall and winter. Housing is an important task, one which requires plenty of preparation. If the job is well done, it means the poultry raiser has taken the first step toward achieving high winter egg production and toward giving his flock the protection it needs from disease.

Make Necessary Repairs
The first step in preparing for housing is to make whatever repairs are necessary in the laying house. Plugging up cracks and crevices, replacing broken windows, and nailing down loose boards will help eliminate drafts. Give the entire building a thorough going over and make a list of the things that will have to be done and the materials you will need to complete the repair work.

When the house is in good shape take all movable equipment outside and give it a thorough cleaning and disinfecting. Then allow it to dry in the sun.

Remove all loose litter and droppings with shovel and broom. Then take a hoe and give the floor and roosting pits a thorough scraping. Then sweep the ceilings, walls, nests and floors, eliminating all cob webs, dust, and other filth.

Clean and Disinfect
Next scrub the floor and roost areas with hot water and strong soap. And while the interior of the house is still damp spray the walls, floor, and fixtures with a reliable disinfectant. Then allow the house to air and dry.

Now you're ready to place litter on the floor. Many poultrymen cover the floor with a thin layer of sand before adding the litter. This practice, they say, prevents litter from sticking. Select a dry, absorbent litter and scatter it about the floor. It should be about 2 or 3 inches deep. Continue to add litter as required during the season.

After litter has been placed in the house put all equipment in place and get ready to bring the birds off the range.

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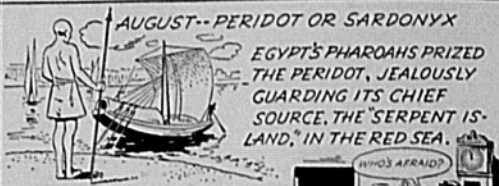

Several students from here will enter college this fall. Frances Hart has been going to Tech summer school and Guy Gentry left Saturday for a Kansas college.

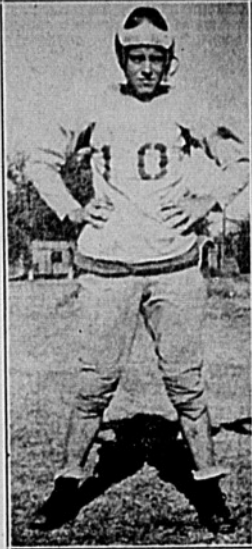

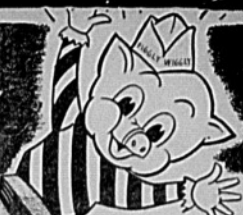

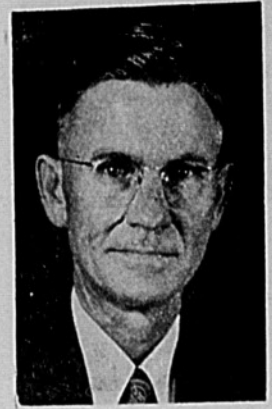

For the last two weeks I have enjoyed all the discomforts of a vacation in cold Colorado without having left the city limits of Slaton. It has all been made possible by daily reports from an old friend of ours whose home is in Fort Worth but who has been at Mink Haven on the state line between Colorado and New Mexico.

The communications come in the form of terse, descriptive sentences written on post cards such as, "Ice on the ground this morning, had to wear overcoat to breakfast," and "caught sixteen trout today, knocked a hole in my rubber boot and cut my finger," and "caught five today, fell down four times and sprained my ankle," and the last "caught ten today, my knees are so bruised and stiff can hardly walk but am still wading the river, can't understand why I do these things."

I can see the river bank strewn with beer bottles, old boots and empty cans and I can shiver with Mr. Wood in the memory of the freezing temperature that greets one as he sticks a bruised and swollen foot from beneath the cover on an August morning when by all figures and statistics the weather should be warm and cozy. How I wish I could go trout fishing in Colorado.

My appeal last week for a bellyache or two brought at least one result. A phone call from a resident in South Slaton said that his ache is the odor from the open toilets in that part of town is terrible. He would not give his name but he said that he felt that the condition is a health menace.

That every effort should be taken to keep the town cleaned up is a matter of self preservation and above all else the question of sanitation should be given every consideration at a time like this when polio is almost an epidemic in some parts of the state.

Mr. and Mrs. Hack Lasater returned last week from a trip to New York and other Eastern points and Mrs. Lasater is commenting on the events of the trip and said that every one in the large centers expected to be tipped for almost every service rendered. One time a friend of theirs tipped a cab driver only ten cents and the cabbie cussed him out for being a tight wad. At a high powered restaurant the bill was top heavy and the waiter informed the guests exactly how much he expected the tip to be.

Perhaps I might as well get in my proper class right now and be put down in the books as a tight wad for I think that the restaurants, amusement places and cab companies should pay their help enough for doing the tasks they are supposed to perform and I think the tipping habit a vicious habit, but I am sure that in case I ever get into another plush hotel and get served a dollar meal and the waiter fixes me with his fishy eye and my wife kicks me under the table I'll peel loose a grudging piece of change and donate it to the

starving waiters of the world.

A letter in the mail today addressed to the "Slatonite" from a man in a post with an order for a years subscription was like a girl wishing to have her name spelled "Edythe" getting a letter addressed plain Edith. The name of Slatonite for the paper has never set too well on my stomach but I believe Mr. Powers of Post has found a name for the paper that is even worse. 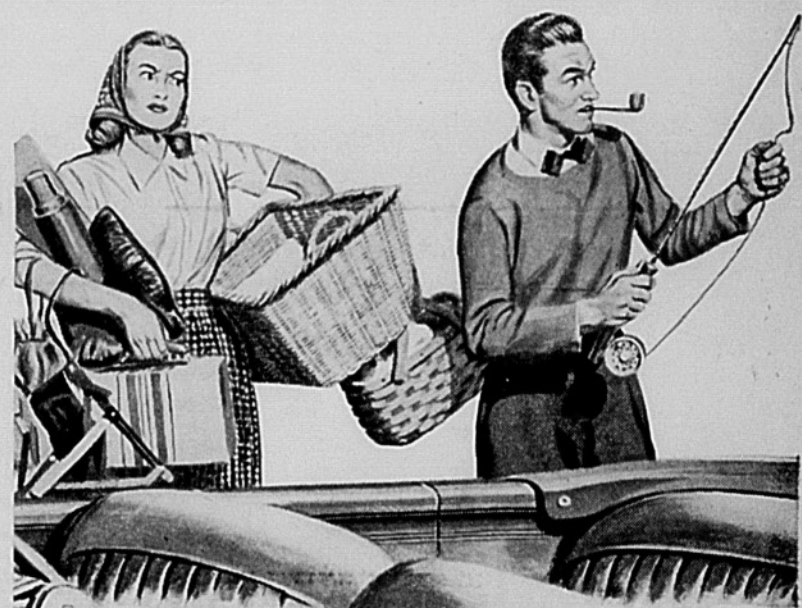

Expert Tells How To Handle Eggs

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 24—Five eggs out of every hundred are lost on Texas poultry farms because of poor handling. Hot weather has a lot to do with it, says F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist of Texas A. & M. College. And Texas still faces a long period of hot weather before things begin to cool off this coming fall.

Beanblossom has a few ideas for the flock owners that will cut down egg losses. To beat the heat, he suggests that farmers collect eggs from the flocks at least three times a day. Don't leave the eggs in the nests too long. Get them into a cool, moist room and leave them there at least 24 hours before packing them.

A wire basket allows for lots of air circulation around the eggs. It's about the best thing there is to collect eggs in. Pails, boxes or woven baskets keep the gathered eggs warm and the air out, so use a wire basket. And don't fill it all the way to the top.

The best humidity for eggs is around 85 to 90 percent and a temperature of 32 to 60 degrees. The lower the temperature within these limits, the better the eggs will keep.

Eggs take up odors easily and quickly, says Beanblossom, so keep them away from such things as lemons, onions, kerosene or mustiness.

Sunstroke and Heat Prostration
Excessive heat accidents take two forms—sunstroke and heat prostration. A sudden, splitting headache is the first warning of sunstroke, after which the victim falls unconscious. The temperature sometimes rises as high as 110 degrees and first aid should be for the purpose of bringing the temperature down. In heat prostration, on the other hand, the victim's temperature drops and he has a chilled, clammy feeling. In either case a doctor should be called at once.

Drain on U. S. Forests

Good Spots for DDT

When replacing linoleum for kitchen floors, a light dusting of DDT in the cracks of the floor and in an area six inches wide or more near the baseboard will cut down insect infestations, keeping ants and bugs and beetles from making use of the cracks in the floor as an avenue of entry into the house. When carpets are up for cleaning, it's a good idea to dust DDT under them before relaying. Another good place for DDT is under the shields and around the pipes where plumbing comes through the floor or wall.

Storing Fresh Eggs

When storing eggs, make sure no water reaches them. Water removes their protective coating and is likely to cause a strong odor.

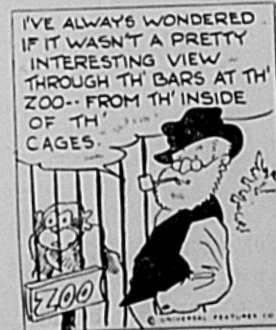

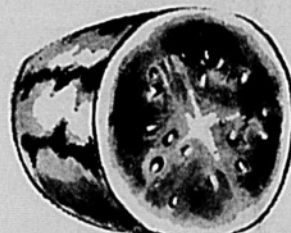

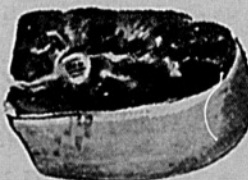
