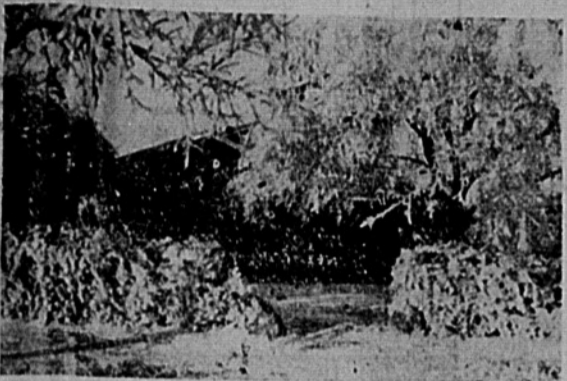

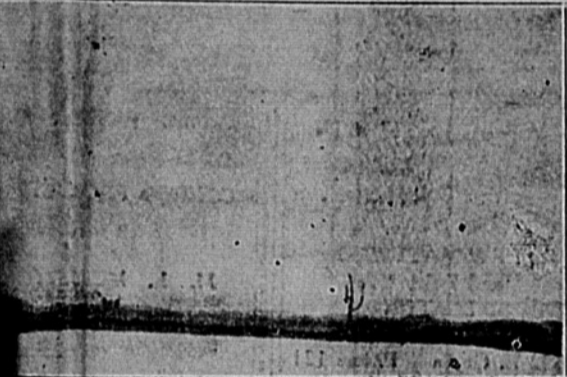
## Former Slaton Resident Missing

### BIDS TO BE HELD

Postmaster Kirby Scudder reports that bids are to be taken at an early date for quarters for the Post Office in Slaton. Information concerning the bids can be secured at the Slaton Post Office.

In the Star Telegram of June 16th an account was published of a Government report in which it stated that Lieutenant C. James Russell, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Colonel J. Russell, of San Angelo, has been reported missing in action.

Lieutenant Russell is well known in Slaton, having graduated from the Slaton High School in the class of 1936. He is the grandson of G. J. Russell of Slaton and the late S. R. Cade of the Union Community. Mr. Cade has three other grandsons in the armed services.

The following from the Star Telegram gives a graphic account of the exploits of Lieutenant Russell:

Russell is listed as missing in action, although his squadron commander, Capt. Elzie Le Doux of Eunice, Louisiana, believes that he may have made a safe crash landing, after six of his crew members left his plane by parachute.

Lt. Russell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pearl Harbor and told his parents he wanted to join the Army Air Forces. He enlisted in December, 1941, and received his flight training at Chickasha, Oklahoma, Randolph and Kelly Fields, San Antonio. His four engine training was given at Sebring, Fla.

Discussing the then recent attack operation in which Lt. Russell's plane went down, Captain Le Doux said on June 3: "While we were over the target I saw flak bursts in front of Russell's plane, which evidently damaged his ship, for that was when he began to lag behind. When he was a few hundred feet below us, I saw six Focke-Wulfs attacking him, and a few minutes later six parachutes came out. Russell's ship was still under control, with the pilot taking violent evasive action."

Captain Le Doux's tail gunner watched the "Concho Clipper" until it was only a thousand feet above the sea. It was still under control. It was believed that Lt. Russell had ordered the enlisted members of the crew to jump and then tried to save himself, his copilot, navigator and bombardier by a crash landing. He was described as one of the best pilots at this station.

### Letter From War Department Indicates Jack Turner Prisoner

Further evidence that Jack Turner, who was last heard from direct, in Java, is a prisoner in Japan, was received last Sunday by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Turner, in the form of a letter from the Chief of the Information Bureau, which was as follows:

"Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Turner, 405 South 8th Street Slaton, Texas

Dear Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Turner: "The Provost Marshal General directs me to transmit to you the following message from Jack E. Turner, which was broadcast by short wave radio from Japan.

"Dear Mother and Dad: We are having another chance to write to you. I have written several times, but as yet received no answer, so I will try again. I am in good health and getting along O.K. The treatment is as good as can be expected under the conditions. The food is fairly good. The main item is rice with the meat and vegetables, along with the tea and coffee. Several of the Australians and Englishmen have received letters, but none of the Americans have yet. Write to me and let me know how things are at home. I will write more when I can. Tell everybody hello. My love to all. Your son, Jack E. Turner.

"The War Department is unable to verify this message.

"If further information from any source is received by this office in regard to Jack E. Turner, you will be advised at once."

A message was reported over the short wave radio as having been sent from Japan by Jack to his parents here several months ago.

### Supply Men To Hold Meeting

A meeting is scheduled to be held at the Hilton Hotel in Lubbock, Tuesday, June 22, at which time WPB officials from the District offices will explain the new simplified WPB regulations concerning the sale of supplies to farmers. The meeting will be open to hardware dealers, lumbermen and others who supply tools and other supplies.

### Conally And His Anti Strike Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Connally Anti-Strike bill has passed the Senate and House and is before the President.

The principal object of the bill is to keep war plants producing.

On June 12, 1942, I offered an amendment in the Senate which provided for taking over by the President and the operation by the Government of plants engaged in producing national defense articles wherever such production was impeded or hindered by strikes or labor disputes. That amendment was adopted by the Senate as early as 1941 by record vote of 67 to 7. However, it failed of adoption in the House of Representatives.

The bill was later modified and improved. The bill approaches the issue from the national viewpoint, from the war needs, from the dire necessity to keep plants going and to keep production moving to our heroic men on the far-flung battlefronts in this war. The main provisions of the bill are: (1). It prohibits any strikes in a Government-operated plant or plant seized by the Government, under penalty of imprisonment and fine.

(2) It provides for a 30-day notice of a labor disturbance in a private war plant and a secret ballot. (3) If a strike then occurs, the Government can take over and penalties will operate against any further strike. (4). It gives the War Labor Board power of subpoena and clear statutory powers. (5). It is no offense for any individual worker to quit work in any seized or Government-operated plant but penalties are provided for inducement or conspiracy with others to interfere with the continuous operation of a Government-operated war plant. (6). It authorized the President specifically to take over strike-bound plants.

Commenting on this suspension order, Dep. Administrator Ralph K. Davies said there was no alternative but to enforce the service station hours regulation.

"It is my earnest hope," Mr. Davies said, "that it will not be necessary to suspend gasoline deliveries to any other service station for violation of necessary wartime service station regulations."

### Chicken Raisers And Gardeners Having Trouble, Says Police Chief

The age old controversy between gardeners and chicken raisers has broken out stronger than usual, says Chief of Police Charley Yates. He is receiving complaints from Victory Gardeners all over town because stray chickens are damaging vegetables.

Not only are the complaints coming in about the chickens, but a number of residents have complained about the perfume from hog pens and Charley says that all hogs must be removed from the city limits, as there is a city ordinance against raising swine inside the town. There is also a city law regarding chickens that are allowed to run loose and Charley says he will arrest anyone who is not following these regulations.

This is the time of the year that sanitation must be watched, says Charley, and the health of the population is of great importance. Any carelessness on the part of poultry or stock raisers will not be tolerated, said the Chief of Police.

## Rationing Information

**SUGAR**—Stamp No. 13 valid for five pounds until midnight August 15.

**CANNING SUGAR**—Stamps 15 and 16 in Ration Book One valid for 5 pounds of sugar for canning through Oct. 31, 1943. Those needing additional sugar for canning may apply to local rationing board.

**COFFEE**—Stamp No. 24 in Book No. 1 (for those 14 or older on the date the book was issued) valid for 1 pound of coffee through June 30.

**SHOES**—Stamp No. 18 in Book 1 good for 1 pair of shoes through Oct. 31.

**MEATS, EDIBLE FATS & OILS**, (including butter), **CHEESES**, **CANNED FISH**—Each holder of Book 2 allowed 16 points per week Red Stamps J, K, L, M and N expire June 30.

**PROCESSED FOODS**—Blue K, L and M Stamps (48 points) valid through July 7.

**Mileage Rationing** **GASOLINE**—Value of each coupon in A, B and C books is 4 gallons. A-G coupons expire midnight July 21.

**TIRE INSPECTION**—All "A" Holders must have second official tire inspections by September 30, 1943. Subsequent inspections for A book holders will be once every six months. "B" book holders must have second official tire inspection by June 30, 1943. "C" book holders must have third official tire inspection by August 31, 1943. Next official tire inspection for "T" book holders must be made within 5,000 miles of last inspection or within six months, whichever occurs first.

**TIRES**—If official tire inspector recommends a tire replacement, apply to local ration board for the tire ration certificate. Tires will be rationed to all on the basis of tire inspections and county quotas available with most essential mileage to come first. Recaps can now be secured without rationing certificates.

**Other Rationing** Eligible purchasers needing new automobiles, bicycles, typewriters, rubber footwear, and other commodities (except farm machinery and pressure cookers) on which sales might be restricted should see their local ration boards. Persons interested in securing farm machinery and pressure cookers should see their county USDA War Board.

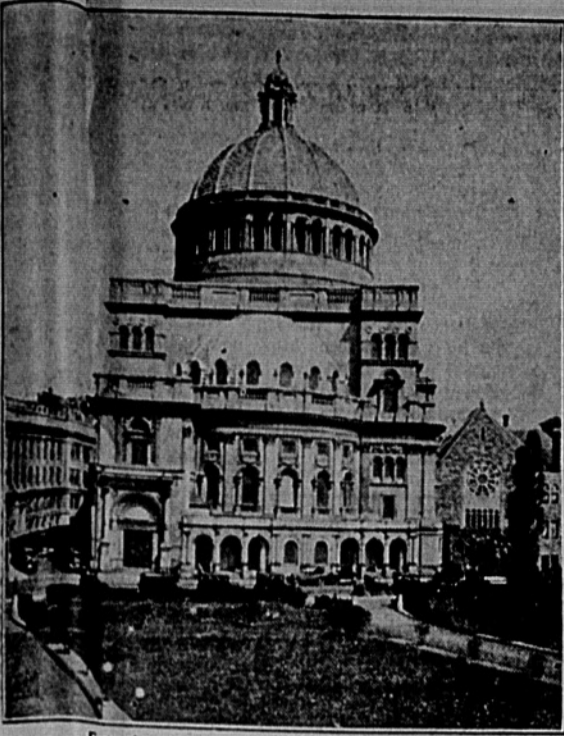

BOSTON, Mass., June 7.—The Christian Science Board of Directors today placed "prayer" at the top of the list of defensive and offensive weapons that free-thinking peoples are counting upon to win the global war against oppression and suppression.

In a statement to the annual meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., the Directors first emphasized the word "prayer," then followed with the term "miracle of deliverance" which is to be accepted, they said, as the logical answer to righteous prayer.

Thus, deliverance from the hand of the oppressor was seen by the Directors to be no miracle at all,

but rather a simple witnessing to the fact that power springs from the prayer of understanding.

"A praying people can never suffer defeat," summarized the Directors' remarks to several thousand Christian Scientists assembled in the Mother Church.

From the armed services and along the home front, the reports revealed unusual demands for church literature, hinging upon an increasing effort to bring prayer to bear upon the crucial tests of the times.

"Battles are not won," the Directors said, "through trust alone, but through intelligent, scientific, preparation and skillful execution. As we reach out to God through understanding prayer, the human

footsteps to bring our deliverance from this cruel warfare and all evil will be revealed."

"Yes, the demands of the hour are crucial," the statement said, "they are imperative; they call upon us as Christian Scientists to be instant in prayer—not just prayer of affirmation and expectancy, but prayer that demands, through spiritual understanding, that the might of right prevail now.

The Directors also announced the election of Mrs. Daisette D. S. McKenzie of Cambridge, Massachusetts as President of the Mother Church for the ensuing year, succeeding Mrs. Elizabeth F. Norwood, of Brookline, Mass.

The President first became interested in Christian Science in '87 during the very early days of the movement. Hence, Mrs. McKenzie became instrumental in the pioneering of this religion in the city of Cleveland. She served ultimately as Reader in First Church of Christ, Scientist, Cleveland, and as a member of its board of directors. In 1898 both Mr. and Mrs. McKenzie were called by Mrs. Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, to become members of her last class taught in November of that year.

cent of the monthly production of specified tools for commercial distributors.

Approximately 20,000 tons of barbed wire with extra long barbs made for military purposes, will be used to meet a shortage of barbed wire on farms, according to WPB. The action is part of the Office of Civilian Requirements' program to make needed supplies available to farmers. The wire shortage was aggravated by the recent midwestern floods which washed out many miles of fence.

The purchaser of a used car may qualify for a gasoline ration to operate it, even though he is unable to get a tire inspection record from the previous owner, if he can satisfy the local board that (1) No tire inspection record ever was issued for the vehicle, or, (2) The buyer had been unable to get the record from the previous owner after diligent attempt.

Five hundred million board feet of softwood lumber have been made available for farm needs by WPB and WFA under certain conditions. Preference ratings may be no higher than AA-2, ratings may not be assigned for lumber to be used in construction or repair of dwellings, or in construction subject to the provisions of conservation order L-41. Farmers apply on Form GA-201, lumber dealers on form GA-202. This order is good through September 30, 1943.

Application forms for renewal of basic "A" gasoline rations are being distributed this week, the OPA region office announced. The forms will be available at gasoline stations and other convenient locations to be announced by local War Price and Rationing Boards. After completing the portion of the form set off with heavy borders, the applicant is to mail it to his local board, along with his current tire inspection record and the back cover of his present "A" book. Renewal books will be mailed to car owners before July 21, the date on which current A coupons expire.

### On The Home Front

Photographs of children under one year of age of soldiers serving overseas or of children born after the father has departed for overseas may be sent V-Mail under certain conditions, the War Department has announced. The regulation form must not be altered in any manner and the photograph is limited in size to not more than one third of the correspondence space on the V-Mail form. The photograph must appear in the upper left portion of the correspondence space. It may include the mother or some other person holding the child.

The Victory tax, which to date has been withheld from wages and salaries, above exemptions, at the rate of 5 percent, will be included in the 20 percent withholding plan provided for in the current tax payment act, on or after July 1. Total victory tax collections as of June 5 were \$682,382,523.20.

Shoe dealers must put an official OPA sticker on shoes that are to be sold ration-free because of damage by fire, steam, water or other accidental cause, the OPA has announced. The purpose of the sticker is to protect the customer against black market shoes.

Consumer ceiling prices for frozen snap beans, corn, peas and spinach of the 1943 pack will be about the same as current maximum prices for the 1942 pack, but prices for frozen strawberries and asparagus will be increased, OPA said recently. For asparagus, the increase will be about one cent per pound, and, for strawberries, between three and four cents a pound.

To assist grain farmers in harvesting the 1943 food crops, the War Food Administration has made arrangements with ODT and OPA to assure owners of custom-operated machinery sufficient gasoline and tires to run their equipment, especially itinerant combine operators who will soon be working in the wheat harvest.

Wrenches, pliers, screwdrivers and other mechanics' hand service tools should be more generally available to farmers and home mechanics as a result of an amendment of Order E-6 by WPB. The amended order, which is designed to bring a better distribution of these tools among consum-

Thoroughly Furnished  
By the Rev. Wendell P. Lovelace, Director of WMBS, Chicago. Text: All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine (for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness; that man of God may be perfect (complete), thoroughly furnished unto all good works"—11 Timothy 3:16,17.

When we hear the word "furnished" we think of a home with its furnishings. As one steps into a home he can discern almost at a glance the circumstances and manner of life of those who live there. Likewise, the "furnishings" of our spiritual lives indicate the condition and quality of our lives. Let us think of our spiritual experiences in terms of the rooms in a house.

As we enter a home the first room into which we come, as a rule, is the living room. Here is where we meet and entertain our loved ones and friends. How is the living room of our spiritual house used? God has called us to lives of separation from evil, and while we are to seek to reach all with the gospel of Christ, He would have us fellowship only with those who know Christ.

the world offers is destructive. We must remember that as Christians our bodies are the temple of the Holy Spirit.

Someone has said, "A man's character is shown by what he chooses to do when he is free to do what he chooses." In Christ we find not only full and complete salvation, but we find full and complete satisfaction.

Most houses have attics. That is where things are stored. For purpose of this study we might think of our mind in this connection. What do we store in our minds? Are our minds as well as our hearts so thoroughly furnished with the Word of God and the love of Christ that we can at any time, in any place, under any circumstances, point others to the Savior?

Every well furnished house has clothes closets, to keep garments in good condition. Garments in the Bible speak of the outward conduct of the Christian. Our Lord's garments smelled of heaven (Ps. 45:8)—everything He did reminded people of heaven. Let's have all of our "garments" in such condition that they reveal the fragrance and beauty of our Lord.

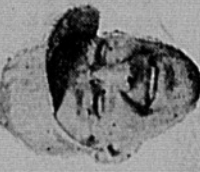

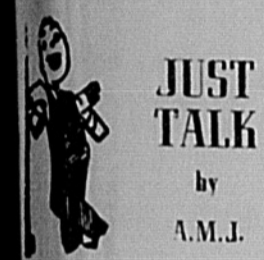

Two Ways To Can Recommended

COLLEGE STATION. — Only two methods of home canning are recommended by the Extension Service, A & M College of Texas, as being safer, preventing spoilage and retaining the maximum amount of food value, flavor, texture and color.

One method, says Winifred Jones, Extension specialist in food preservation, is to process meats and vegetables, except tomatoes and ripe pimientos, in a pressure cooker. The other method is the water bath for fruits, tomatoes, and ripe pimientos.

She explains that the pressure cooker offers the safest known method of canning the non-acid vegetables and meats because it destroys bacteria in these foods, including the most dangerous—the bacillus botulinus. If these bacteria are not destroyed in the spore stage, they may grow and later produce a toxin or poison in the food.

"The worst part of this poison is that you usually cannot smell, see or taste it, yet one small bite can cause death or severe illness, she says. The bacillus botulinus is destroyed by maintaining pressure at 240 to 250 degrees Fahrenheit. In an open or water bath the temperature of the food inside the jar never goes higher than 212 de-

grees, because the only way to get liquid higher than 212 degrees is to maintain pressure.

Open kettle canning is not recommended by the specialist because research has proved there is a greater percentage of spoilage and the food often becomes mushy in texture. It is best not to can fruit and tomatoes in a pressure cooker because they keep easily when processed at 212 degrees in a water bath. Further directions on modern canning methods are available from county home demonstration agents.

Biologist Warns Against Botulism

A poison so powerful that a teaspoonful is enough to kill 40,000 guinea pigs is not a good thing to take chances with, a leading Texas biologist has said in warning Texas home makers against the hot water method of canning for non-acid vegetables. This method does not destroy the bacteria that cause botulism.

The entire text of a statement on the subject by Dr. Asa C. Chandler, professor of biology at Rice Institute, Houston, and advisory chairman of the Houston and Harris County Nutrition Committee, has been circulated among the county home demonstration agents of the Texas A & M College Ex-

tension Service. Dr. Chandler's statement is in harmony with recommendations on home canning given by Winifred Jones, extension specialist in food preservation.

Dr. Chandler believes the chances for accidents are too great to be worth the risk if people undertake to can non-acid vegetables or meats by the boiling water bath method. "Outbreaks of botulism will almost certainly occur," he says. "It is like having rattlesnakes on your golf course. You may keep your ball on the fairways and treat the rattlesnake with impunity, but sooner or later somebody a little less careful will suffer. By comparison (with botulism) rattlesnake venom is only mildly poisonous."

Bacteria that cause botulism grow in non-acid vegetables when strictly protected from the air. Dr. Chandler says there is one case on record where the spores survived heating and germinated after 22 months. The poison produced is so deadly that a person has been known to die after eating one piece of a string bean.

Miss Jones says this evidence gives strength to the many warnings Extension Service workers have given out about hot water bath canning of non-acid vegetables.
