Mail Delivery May Be Difficult


Postmaster K. L. Scudder re-ceived the following letter from the Postmaster General in which he urges the American people to co-operate with the Postal Department in delivery of Holiday mail: "I ask your co-operation and through you, that of business concerns and the public in meeting a far greater postal problem that is far more serious than ever before. We have handled overseas parcels for our fighting men and now face the task of handling Christmas mail for people and soldiers at

"There is only one solution for this problem: CHRISTMAS GIFTS GENERALLY MUST BE MAIL-ED IN NOVEMBER. The number of railway cars and airplanes available are far below that of former years. More than 30 thousand postal employees have gone into the armed forces and have been largely replaced with inexperienced personnel. It will be entirely impossible to handle the Christmas mail in the last three weeks before Christmas this year. It must be spread over a much longer period of time if it is to be deilvered for Christmas.
