

In the proclamation, just issued by Governor Stevenson, Texans are urged, during the month of August, to conserve the existing supply of returnable deposit bottles by returning them promptly to the dealers. Governor Stevenson's proclamation points out that the general public, by returning idle milk, carbonated beverage, and beer bottles, which can be sterilized for civilian re-use, will permit the glass industry to re-use even more of its facilities for the manufacture of glass containers for food, and other items, required by the armed forces at home and abroad. #### Revival Services To Start Sunday At Methodist Church





# Unusual! Strawberry Mint Pie

ENHANCE the delicate flavor of your next strawberry pie with a little fresh mint. You'll be delightfully surprised with the result. This recipe for Strawberry Mint Pie is a sugar-saver, too, for it uses glassed syrup as part of the sweetening agent. To fill one pie-shell:

1 baked pastry shell
1 1-4 cups cold water
1 1-2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin
3-4 cups glassed syrup (red label)

Wash and hull strawberries. Drain well. Bruise mint, add sugar, salt and one cup of the water. Simmer this mint mixture slowly for 10 minutes. Soak gelatin in remaining one-fourth cup water. Strain hot mint mixture over the softened gelatin and stir until thoroughly dissolved. Add syrup and mix well. Pour the mint gelatin mixture over the strawberries and cool until it begins to set. Then pour entire mixture into a baked pastry shell. Chill thoroughly, serve with sweetened whipped cream and garnish with tiny sprigs of fresh mint. (To whip 18 per cent cream, add one tablespoon of lemon juice to one cup of chilled cream. Sweeten to taste.)

> of our major public health problems just as long as breeding places are accessible to the female Anopheles," Dr. Cox stated. "It is vitally important to public health in this state that every home and business house cooperate in controlling this menace to good health by freeing their premises from tin cans or broken bottles, or any type of rubbish in which water may stand, so that the propagation of the Anopheles mosquito can be checked."

Dengue is characterized by its sudden onset and accompanying headache and pain in the back and limbs which has caused the disease to be commonly known as "break-bone" fever. The fever is usually of short duration, but inasmuch as convalescence is extremely slow, the loss of time in recovery would constitute a hinderance to our war effort.

Malaria, like dengue, is a very debilitating disease and one from which recovery may require weeks or even months of time.

Dr. Cox stressed the importance of conserving the nation's manpower and urged that every Texan cooperate in an effort to destroy the mosquito which is responsible for the transmission of malaria and dengue fever.


