If your pullets are still enjoy-ing the run of the farm unselected and unhoused, now is the time to pick out all of the strong, healthy nes and put them in a clean poultry house. 



Soak the dried vegetables in hot water just long enough to plump them, and cook them in the water in which they are soaked. Thirty minutes to one hour us-

ually is sufficient for this "refreshening" period. Some dehydrated vegetables. such as leafy ones or those powdered or shredded, may be cooked

without soaking them. Drop these into hot water, seasoned with salt. and immer until tender. Use a small amount of waternot quite enough to cover the veg-

Simmer 'rather than boil vegetables. Cook them only until ten-
