Mother has just sent me a clipping from last weeks Slatonite regarding aircraft landing on the streets of Slaton. These two incidents truly brings home the fact that Slaton really needs an airport.

Private aircraft is fast becoming the mode of tansportation, whether it be a hundred miles or a thousand. With the surplus Army Aircraft already in civilian use and many more thousands to be released, it is even more necessary that every town, city, and village, regardless of size or location have

Slaton, being located as it is, is in the traffic route through the Southwest. Many will say that Lubbock will adequately supply the surrounding territory, but just bear in mind the past week and what it brought. Believe me Mr. Jackson, it is not fun to set a ship down in a strange street of some town at ninety miles an hour and never know how, when or where you will get out.

With the GI Bill of Rights in force and many

veterans taking advantage of the flight training it gives would make a profitable enterpise either for Slaton or an individual. Any aircraft organization would put forth no end of effort and financial aid to put an aircaft at Slaton in order to have an agency there. But regardless of the cost, if an airfield at Slaton would save one life, which no doubt it would in time, then all the time, effort, and money expended would be more than justified. If Slaton is to

grow and prosper as it will, then let her people keep up too. An airfield is just one step in that direction.



GET READY FOR FALL HOUSING
Now is the time to prepare

for what some poultrymen consider a tedious task - fall

Your chickens are going into their winter home. After a summer of freedom on the range, they will spend the next several months crowded closely together in the poultry house. Under these conditions, the state of their health and the rate of their winter egg production is going to depend a lot on what you have done to protect their health and pro-vide them with comfortable

FALL HOUSE CLEANING

To help insure good winter livability spend some time cleaning and repairing the poultry house before the flock is put into it. Make sure it's sanitary by removing or destroying all of the old litter. scraping dirt and droppings from the floor, and then scrubbing thoroughly with hot water and strong soap. Give the equipment - nests, feeders, waterers - the same treatment. Then disinfect the entire interior --- equipment and all - with a reliable disinfectant.

Next examine the building closely - every square foot of the interior — for cracks or openings that might permit drafts to enter. These must be plugged. And if it hasn't already been done, why not see to it that the walls and ceilings are insulated, if possible. A well insulated house will keep your birds warmer and will eliminate the danger of sudden temperature changes. In most poultry houses it is not difficult to add an inner wall and stuff insulating material between this and the out-

Check over the ventilation facilities, too. While drafts must be avoided, the chickens do need fresh air and a good ventilation system will pro-vide it without causing extreme drops in the tempera-

PROTECT BIRDS' HEALTH

While you are corraling your chickens for housing, it is a good idea to separate the culls from the healthy birds, Eliminating them will lesson crowding besides removing non-producers that will consume valuable feed. Look over each bird for lice, too and use a good louse powder when birds are heavily infested. Some poultrymen give each chicken a good individual worming treatment at this time, and find that it pays dividends later on during the season of high egg

Fixing Up by BURTON WILLIAMS

Handy Mail Box Shelf

SURPRISINGLY few mail boxes are provided with shelves for parcel post packages, yet we get ruffled when a package gets soaked and muddy during bad weather because the carrier must place it on the ground.



An easy way to provide a shelf on a one-mail box post is shown here. Spike a short 2x4 on each side of the post at about a 45-degree angle 18 inches below the mail box arm. Brace the two arms as shown and place a board or a piece of '4-inch mesh hardware cloth across them. To provide more weather protection, nail a board or a piece of galvanized iron under the mail box arm directly above the shelf. In addition to protecting packages, such a shelf will be handy for the carrier.

If one post is to support two mail boxes, the boxes can be set at the end of 4-foot arms, properly braced, and a shelf provided by placing a board or hardware cloth helps to eliminate coating with ice or sleet.



Range for Pullets

MANY farm flock owners are reducing the cost of raising strong, healthy pullets by putting them on clean range as early as possible so they can get the full benefits of good pasture and sunshine. This practice has increased the demand for portable value shelters which are light and easy to move and economical to build.



One type of inexpensive range shelter which is adapted particularly to farm flocks is shown in the illustration. 


