CHICK CHATS

by Robert Huser of Huser's Hatchery DISEASE LURKS IN A CHICKEN HOUSE

Through fall and winter the average laying house is a breeding ground for disease and parasites. During this period of cold weather the birds are living under crowded condition, cooped up in an enclosure that often either is ventilated poorly or is drafty and cold.

Under conditions like these, the health of your birds is in jeopardy. Your hopes for financial gain are at stake.

Winter Is Danger Periad

At no time is good management of your flock more important than during cold weather - for this is the time when sudden heavy losses due to disease may be expected.

What are some of the things to be done to encourage better health and livability among your chickens?

First, see that your flock is not crowded. Allow for at least tour square .... of floor space per bird for heavy breeds and three square feet for light breeds: Disease is more easily spread when chickens are

Keep the litter dry and clean, removing when damp and adding clean litter periodically. Stir it ofen.

See that the roosts are clean and sanitary and that they are constructed so that the birds are unable to contact the accumulated droppings underneath the boards. It's a good idea to remove the droppings at frequent intervals.

Keep Waterers Clean

Waterers should be clean. Watch them closely and when the litter surrounding the waterers becomes damp, replace it with clean, dry litter. Be sure your birds have adequate watering space as well as enough room at the feeding troughs to avoid crowding.

Make a special effort to keep every part of your laying house sanitary. You yourself may be guilty of spreading disease when you enter the house with dirty boots or bring in contaminated feed sacks or crates. There are countless other ways for infection to gain a foothold in the house, and constant vigilance on the flock owners part is necessary if this is to be avoided. The importance of sanitation cannot be over-estimated.

Make sure there are no cold drafts in the building for they may weaken the birds to respiratory infections or possibly other diseases. At the same time the ventilation should be good enough to insure that there is plenty of fresh air at all times.

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

Subject: Is Obedience Essential to Salvation?

This question is of mutual interest to all who entertain a hope of some day walking the streets of gold. It is a question which should never have been raised in the minds of the masess. In view of the fact that God gave certain COMMANDS and LAWS; it seems superflu-ous to ask, "Is it essential that we obey them?" Why would God have given them if He did not intend that we should obey? We may attribute the confussion over this subject to an improper attitude toward the Bible. all people would study the Bible with the idea of DOING what God commands them to do, rather than trying to find a scripture that will justify them for NOT doing what is commanded, or for substituting something else, the controversy would never have arisen. If the integrity of the Bible is to be maintained, man cannot question it's commands.

> WHAT DOES THE BIBLE SAY?

(Heb. 5:8-9) "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered. And being made perfect, he became the author of ETERNAL SAL-VATION TO ALL THEM THAT OBEY HIM." This is either true or it is not true. If you are of the persuasion that one does not have to obey Christ to be saved; then you do NOT believe this passage.

(2 Thess, 1:7-9) "And to you that are troubled rest with us, when the Lord Jesus shall be revealed from heaven with his mighty angels, In flaming fire taking VENGENCE on them that know not God, and that

shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of his power." Friends, never let anyone tell you that you can be saved without OBEYING THE GOSPEL This scripture says in all plainness that you cannot. It says that Christ will TAKE VENGENCE ON ALL THAT OBEY NOT THE GOSPEL.

We were the laughing stock of all who knew us.

WHAT KIND OF BUSINESS DID BEER AND WINE BRING TO GAINES COUNTY? The business of drunkards, thugs, thieves, prostitutes and their

WHAT WAS THE EXPERIENCE OF THE COUNTY WHILE IT WAS WET? After four years of being wet we had more empty buildings in Seagraves than ever before in history. The business men joined forces to vote beer out so we could make a come back.

Our town was flooded every week-end with hundreds of drunks who, being away from home, had no respect for our women, our children, or our property. Our women and children had to stay at home over the week-end or risk hearing or seeing something extremely embarassing, if not been drunkenly accosted. WOULD WE HAVE HONKY TONKS AGAIN? YES. There is no law again at them and any promises made by local men would not keep a stranger from coming in and saying that he didn't promise not to put in a honky tonk—usually called tavern.

THINK OF THIS. DRINKING AND DRUNK DRIVING WERE RESPONSIBLE FOR MORE DEATHS EACH AVERAGE MONTH, WHEN GAINES COUNTY WAS WET, THAN THEY NOW CAUSE EACH AVERAGE YEAR in this and adjoining Texas counties.

By the return of beer to Gaines county our death rate and automobile wreck rate will increase sharply. Would you, by your vote for beer, be willing to condemn one man to death, much less help increase the over all death rate considerably?
