## The Stage All Set For Picnic and Barbecue

As this paper is printed the stage is all set for the big two days' celebration and every detail has been completed. Nothing has been overlooked in the way of providing entertainment and for the comfort of the large crowds that will be here from every section of the South Plains during Friday and Saturday.

Possibly without a single exception every business house in town is decorated in keeping with the patriotic spirit of our citizenship and commemorating the independence of our great country. Slaton people already enjoy an enviable reputation as entertainers and in this instance her hospitality will not be exceeded by any town anywhere. Twelve or fifteen hives have been slaughtered for the barbecue Saturday, plenty of bread, pickles and other trimmings have been secured for the occasion, and if you fail to get enough barbecue the first time you are invited to come back for another "helping." 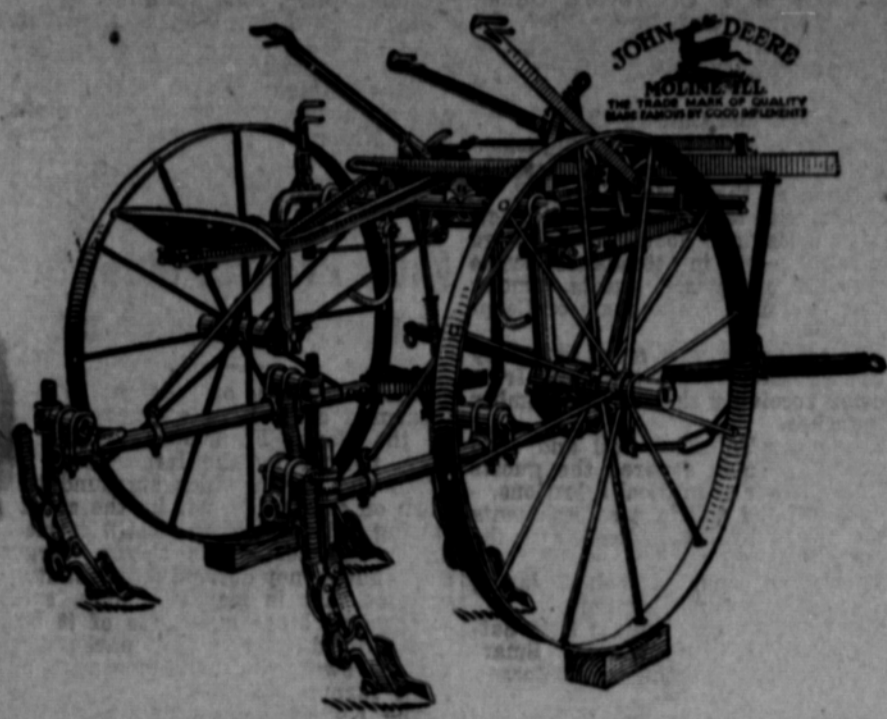

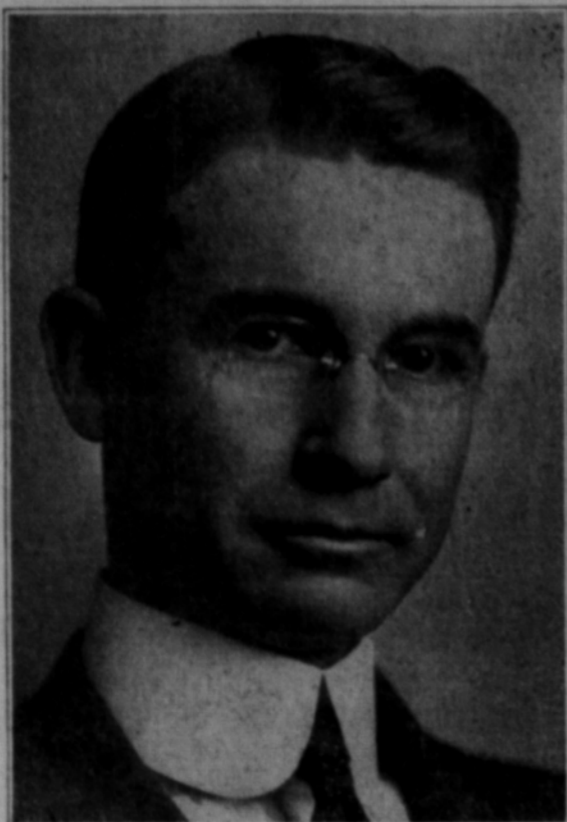

## REPRESENTATIVE R. A. BALDWIN DISCUSSES RECENT LEGISLATION

The third called session of the 36th Legislature which adjourned on June 18th was a busy one, according to Representative R. A. Baldwin, who returned from Austin last week. More than 300 bills were introduced in the House and Senate, covering a wide range of subjects. Many were local bills, and those dealing with independent school districts led the list. The difficulty in raising sufficient funds has caused many common schools to apply to the Legislature to be created into independent districts. Mr. Baldwin on request of school authorities in his district prepared and introduced twelve such bills. Tahoka and Lamesa had their district boundaries extended. Four of the bills introduced by him gave independent districts to Canyon, Idalou, Shallowater and Carlisle, all in Lubbock county. In spite of the crowded condition of the Legislative calendar, Mr. Baldwin succeeded in getting all bills introduced by him finally passed on roll call by a two-thirds vote, which means that they become effective immediately on receiving the Governor's signature.

The high cost of living found excuse for many bills seeking to raise salaries. County school superintendents, four county treasurers, court stenographers and others had their salaries raised. The House and Senate bills increasing the fees of sheriffs, which contained differences necessitating the appointment of free conference committees who reported the bill on the last day of the session, and passage was denied it on the point of order that there was no quorum.

"It almost seems at times," said Mr. Baldwin in discussing legislative matters, "that some members from East Texas and the more populous counties forget there is such a place as West Texas. When the county superintendent bill was introduced it ignored the county judges of West Texas entirely. In nearly every county out here the county judge acts as ex-officio county school superintendent of public instruction, and receives such salary as the commissioners' courts see fit to allow him, not to exceed \$600 per year. I recalled the many patriotic services these men performed during the war without compensation and the inadequacy of their salaries, and I believed West Texas was entitled to recognition along with the rest of them. Accordingly I prepared and offered an amendment to the bill, providing a maximum salary for the county judge for his services as school superintendent of the county of \$900 per year. The amendment was adopted. If East Texas knew the rapidity with which our great region is settling up, and the high class of people we have out here, and if they had the slightest idea of what the West Texas of tomorrow shall be when our vast resources are fairly developed, they would not be so slow in giving to us the recognition we justly deserve. But for the present West Texas must fight for her rights and get laws favorable to her interests and industries by sheer force of argument and by making her power and importance felt at the State's Capitol."

In discussing appropriations, Mr. Baldwin stated that while more than six million dollars were appropriated, it was a general belief that the expenditures were merited and justified. The four million dollar appropriation to supplement the state available school fund will prove a great boon to many districts and materially assist in providing teachers for our rural schools. Mr. Baldwin supported the educational measures and expressed confidence that the proposed amendment to the Constitution to be voted on in November will be adopted, and that it will in large measure afford permanent relief to our distressing

financial situation in education by allowing each district to vote such tax rate as its own needs and peculiar circumstances may demand.

Among the bills introduced of importance to West Texas was one seeking to amend the tick eradication law. This met with instant opposition, because it was seen that if the bill became a law there was likelihood of its destroying the good work of years in tick eradication. The House amended the bill in conformity with the suggestions of the Texas Cattle Raisers Association and passed it, but while the bill was in the Senate the Court of Criminal Appeals handed down a decision which necessitated further amendment to meet the decision with reference to notice. The Senate amended the bill in this particular and after a warm debate in the House it finally passed there by a good majority.

Mr. Baldwin says he is making a careful study of the problem of redistricting the State, which task will be before the Legislature in 1921, and if he is re-elected, he is going to put forth some strenuous efforts to get a square deal for West Texas in this highly important matter. Some districts in West Texas have from three to five times as many people as some districts in East Texas. We are entitled to more votes in the law making department than we have.

**Much Produce Shipped From Slaton Country**

The prosperity of Slaton is not measured alone by the large payroll of the Santa Fe shops and offices here, neither by the large fields of grain and cotton which surround the town on every side, nor by the stock-raising industry which is still carried on in this section on a very large scale, but money derived from country produce that is marketed here, sold locally and large quantities of it being shipped to the city markets is rapidly swell the bank accounts of many farmers.

The Kuykendall Grocery Company reports that during the past ninety days they have shipped cream, butter, chickens and eggs to the amount of \$7,500, and that during the past thirty days they have bought and shipped \$2,000 worth of cream alone. They have been buying cream only during the past ten weeks, and it is surprising to the farmers of this section how much real cash they can realize from a product that formerly went to waste, and which they can easily save by the use of a cream separator. In this connection, it is stated that since this firm has been buying cream that the sale of separators has been stimulated.

During the past three months this firm has sold at retail to local consumers 474 cases of eggs, 600 pounds of poultry, and 2,000 pounds of butter.

All other grocers are also heavy buyers of all kinds of country produce besides supplying the local trade.

Many farmers in this section are also irrigating vegetable patches by use of shallow wells and storage tanks, and they produce nearly every known vegetable in abundance, for which they find a ready market here at good prices. During the past winter many cabbage were shipped from here to other points and commanded the highest market prices on account of their freshness and superior quality. COME TO SLATON.

Women may use any style of jar they prefer except that it must be of quart size, except for jellies. Bottles may be used for fruit juices.

All canned products, sewing, etc., exhibited should, of course, be 1920 products.
